Local swimmer selected for New Brunswick Swim Team for Canada Games

Eoghan Keeler, a Grade 11 student at PRS, was recently selected after trials to represent Team NB at the upcoming Canada Games which will take place in August in Niagara Falls. Selection onto this team is an honour that very few achieve, and he has been training diligently for a number of years now, resulting in his selection after having won the final of the 200 Metre Butterfly event at the Canada Games Team NB selection trial which took place in the Aquatic Centre in St. John from Thursday 5 to Sunday 8 May. He also made several other finals at the trials.



Club in 2014 at the age of 9. A year later his brother Brendan (then aged 7) joined him. They progressed through the ranks, competing at swim meets around the province.

Eventually Eoghan made qualifying times for higher-level competitions, and also qualified for a

team made up of high-ranking swimmers from various teams around the region, Team BEAST. He went with them to Montreal to compete against higher levels of opposition in an Olympic-sized swim pool (50 metres long) in 2019.

Spring is such an exciting time for Gardeners and the Petitcodiac and Area Garden Club has been gaining traction on what promises to be our busiest season yet!

Let's start with the Community Garden. Preparations are underway for planting and a huge thank you goes to Dennis Middleton for keeping the weeds and grass mowed back. There is still time to reserve your personal 10'x40' garden plot or a raised garden bed. Just stop by the Village Office, prior to June 13th with your \$10 refundable deposit and pick up your key. Raised beds are ready for planting now, with all tilling expected to be complete mid-June, weather permitting.

Plans are underway for our first Community Garden Open Day, with the theme of Live the Garden Life, as part of the 2022 Year of the Garden in Canada. This event will be held on National Garden Day, Saturday, June 18 from 11am - 1pm. There will be fun for the entire family including youth planting seeds to take home, music, AKA Dance Studio demonstration, as session successful growing in a raised garden, and more. We will also leave with Red Sunflower that will be ready for planting, in celebration of The Year of the Garden.

Graduation is just weeks away meaning final exams are imminent. I did not trouble textbooks with my company very much when I was in school, but I want to send best wishes for those who are studying hard. Congratulations to the Class of '22 graduates and those moving from one grade to another.

On May 28th The Westmoreland County Agricultural Fair is holding their annual fundraiser at the fair-grounds starting at 9am. The 2022 edition of the fair will be held from August 4-7. Thank you in advance to the many volunteers who will make this another memorable event.

By the time we next communicate it seems likely the spring sitting of the legislature will be concluded. Some very important legislation has been introduced this spring and none more important than milestone legislation protecting children and youth.

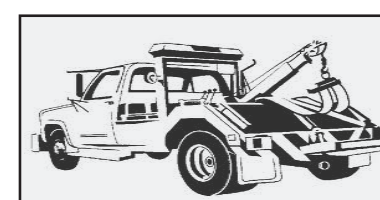
The 2022 budget details have been examined over the past few weeks in committee sittings. Increased investments in health, education and social services were explored by members of the legislature.

Beginning June 1 under the Canada-New Brunswick Canada-Wide Early Learning and Child Care Agreement begins. Families with preschool-aged children at designated New Brunswick early learning centres and homes can expect an average 50 per cent reduction in out-of-pocket fees.

On May 5th we learned that New Brunswick and Nova Scotia will be hosting the 2023 World Junior Hockey championships. This good news for the Moncton area comes at a time when Saint John and area prepare for the Memorial Cup hockey tournament starting June 20. We have a long and strong tradition as hockey fans and supporters here in New Brunswick and I expect big turnouts for both hockey tournaments.

I would close by thanking all New Brunswickers who are making people from Ukraine feel welcome and cared-for. Thank you for your continued support and kindness.

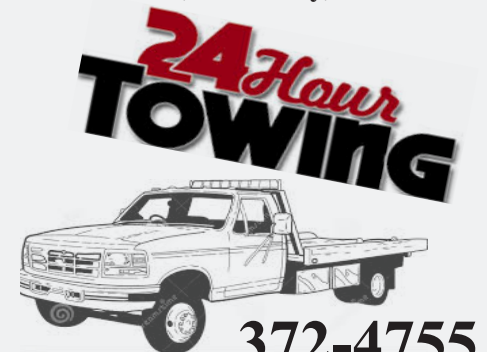

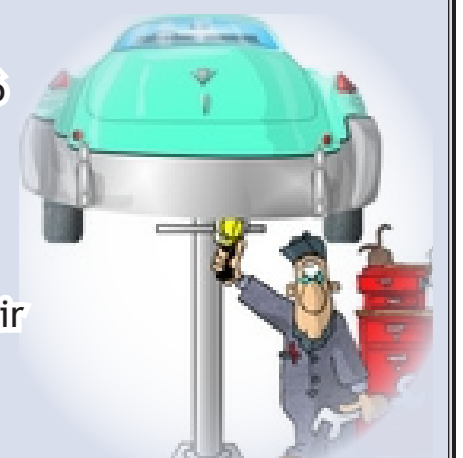

Oldest Running Race in Canada

The 58th running of the River Glade International, June 17th and 18th is being dedicated in memory of 2 promoters, owners, operators of River Glade Speedway, Ernie McLean 30 years and Pat Rodgers 10 years. The 1965 local drivers were rookies racing on asphalt while the Pinecrest Speedway, Ontario drivers had been racing on asphalt for some years.

The top 10 finishers were: John Shirtliff, Caleb Dunn, Donnie Beers, Ray Carson, Dave Fawcett, Walter Dunfield, Bob Wolthers, Larry Horsman, and Don Biederman. Note on Biederman, he qualified for the 1966 Daytona 500.

The Purse for that very first International was \$1,310.00, with Shirtliff taking home to Toronto \$400.00 for the 75-lap race.

This race started as an Anniversary event to celebrate the first race held on August 22nd, 1964, at River Glade Speedway. The race has continued over the years and top Canadian drivers have won this historical race. It has had many format changes, from being a one day 75 lap race to having 2 day and even 3 day events. The number of laps has gone from 75 to twin 50's and twin 100's. The purse has kept increasing each year. The 2022 International will be a 2-day event, held Father's Day weekend, Friday, June 17th with a 100-lap Street Stock, Four Cylinder Mini Stock and Women on Wheels divisions followed by a two hour Super Late Model

Pro Stock practice. Then on Saturday, June 18th, the show will begin with the Heart of a Champion Hot Rod Classics powered by Conrad Bros; the Bandolero division; and then the Super Late Model Pro Stocks will race 150 laps for the largest purse ever in an International with \$7000.00 to win; the Late Model Sportsman will do a 100-lap with the winner taking home \$4000.00. In all the total purse could reach well over \$40,000.00 dollars for that 2-day event.

In the planning an autograph session is scheduled. There will be a mandatory caution on lap 43 to commemorate the car number that Ernie used, and on lap 30 in the Super Late Model Pro Stocks in commemoration of Pat's number he raced with.

The event will draw previous racers of the River Glade International, as well some of which will be racing in this event. The winners of 2021 were Super Late Model Pro Stock Cory Hall and Late Model Sportsman, 5 time winner, Laurie Cormier. Both of these drivers have registered for this event.

All persons who wish to enter the Petty Raceway pit area must use the electronic waiver. This is a ONE-TIME waiver signage for the entire 2022 season. You must have a smart phone for the waiver submission. When you arrive at the pit ticket booth you can show your waiver submission on your phone. You will find the electronic waiver link on the Petty Raceway Facebook page and web site.

EQUINE CAMPING: Starting in June there will be 7 box stalls (10x10) for your horse to relax in after a day on the trails. Each stall has a pea gravel bed

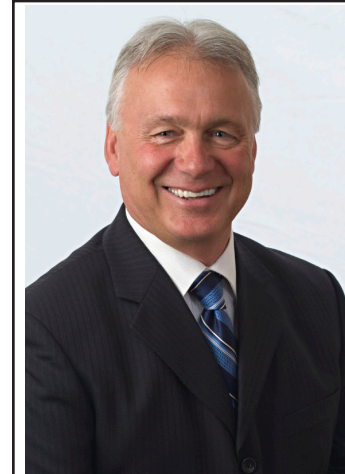

CLASS OF 2022 ANNOUNCED

NFLD. 1968 was president of Seabreeze Stock Car Club. 1970 President of Nova Scotia Stock Car Association. Tom was a welder/fabricator, built racecars and equipment for other car owners. Most notable he built wheels for both race cars and street vehicles, totaling more than 10,000 wheels.

EVERETT "Layton" JOHNSTON - Raced stock car from 1965-1979. PEI Stock Car Association Triple win Aug 1969. Labor Day Free for all Trophy '68. Triple win 1968. 2 Benefit Races trophies 1968. Over the course of five years built, maintained and ran seven cars with great consistency. Rarely missing a race and finishing near the front of the pack regularly. In 1969 alone, between 26 races at the Charlottetown and Freetown race tracks he accumulated nine wins, nine seconds & seven thirds.

MICHAEL (Glenn) MacLEAN - Glenn started racing in 1979. 2005 his son, Matthew, started racing Jr. dragster; his daughter, Danielle, raced her Camaro; in 2019 grandson, Carter, started racing Jr. dragster. Glenn's driving skills, car building and tuning knowledge put him in the Winner's Circle the majority of the time. He has raced in Atlantic region as well as IRHA and NHRA events in the USA. From 1984-2017 he won seven 1st place in Maritime season points and three 2nd place. From 2016-2019 he won five 1st place Wally Trophies in NHRA National Open. He has received multiple other awards.

MIKE MCCARVILLE - Mike started racing at Oyster Bed Speedway when he was 18. However, he soon moved from driving to working under the hood. He was one of the members of Kevin Harvick's

pit crew when Kevin crossed the finish line to claim the NASCAR Sprint Cup Championship title at Homestead Miami Speedway in 2014. Mike is the shock specialist responsible for determining which set-up is best to use for each track. There is a lot of travel and a lot of hard work. He loves stock car racing and has spent a lot time at race tracks.

KANDY MITTON - Kandy started drag racing around 1997. She was Secretary/Treasurer for the ADRA association for 10 years; one of the Olympic torch runners from Moncton to Saint John, that was used to light the Olympic cauldron on February 12 in Vancouver for the start of the 2010 Olympic games.

Kandy is the first female in Atlantic Canada to place in the top three in any Super Pro Points Series. First woman to win the Atlantic drag racing Association Super Pro Class Championship for 2015. Kandy defeated five super pro cars in six rounds of racing to earn the top eliminator honors. Her achievements in Drag races are many. Kandy had a 2-year TV series on Rogers TV "2FAST4U" it highlighted 13 high schools across New Brunswick, She was one of just 6 female drivers, and 1 of 2 Canadians chosen for the brand-new Caged Heat Series, with half-scale stock cars in-doors on a 22-foot-high oval track. Perhaps her highest award will be on May 28 this year in Toronto, when she will be the only woman of 16 inductees to be inducted into the Canadian Motorsports Hall of Fame.

ROBERT (Bob) RILEY - Bob started racing in the early 70s at Atlantic Speedway as a driver/car builder, but soon realized driving was not his first love; he enjoyed the role as builder,

chief mechanic and team owner. Over the years he had drivers such as: Bobby Yuille, Jim Hallahan, Kenny Cameron, Jr. Kelly, Frank Fraser, and his son Mike Riley. In 1983 Bob was a member of the MASCAR tour. In 1985 Bob's Team (Riley Racing) won the MASCAR Championship with Jr. Kelly driving. Frank Fraser took over as the driver of the 50-car winning many events. In 1997 his son, Michael Riley took the wheel winning Rookie of the Year and finishing 11th in points. Bob retired in 2005.

THE ROACHE BROTHERS (DONALD & GARY) - Donnie & Gary were known as the Roache Bros. Racing Team, they built cars and had someone else drive for them...Ron Manual, John Dalrymple, Bill Jones, Junior Kelly, Charlie Kane, Lennie Curry, Ross May (a pitman for Don Biederman), Paul Lewis, Brian Northrup, Bobby White and Cy Harvey. These drivers were in the winner's circle on many occasions. Lennie Currie had a lot of good finishes including winning the Atlantic Speedway International 100 in 1978 and in 1979 he had an overall 4th place finish in the Riverside 250. Some of the tracks that they had cars at were Seabreeze Speedway, Atlantic Speedway, Riverside Speedway and Maine's Oxford Speedway. Donnie passed away a few years ago. He was well respected by his peers. He loved stock car races. Gary spends time in their race shop daily, it has been transformed to a Maritime racing history.

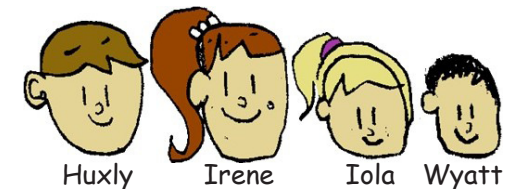

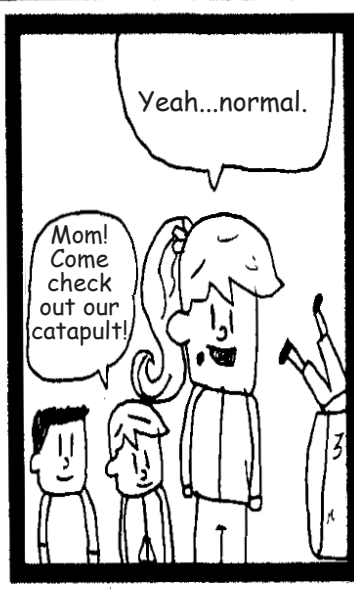
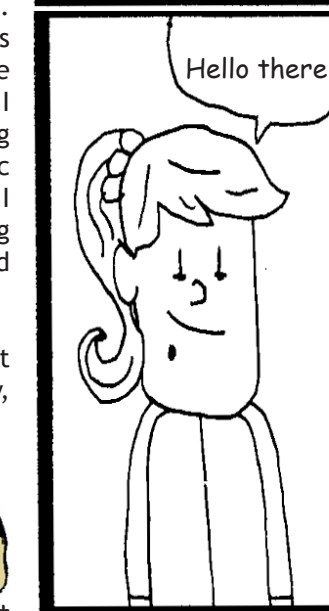

Change is coming to our community, and to communities all over New Brunswick.

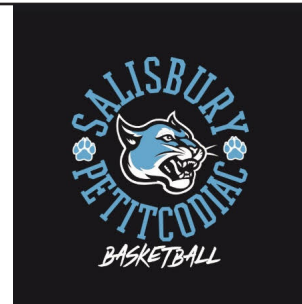

2022 SALISBURY DOG TAGS LATE FEES IN EFFECT

As of April 1st, late fees have been in effect for 2022 Village of Salisbury Dog Tags.

Factoring in this \$15 increase, registration fees are currently:

\$10.00 + \$15.00 late fee = \$25.00 for spayed or neutered dogs

\$30.00 + \$15.00 late fee = \$45.00 if not spayed or neutered.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of three (3) months shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against distemper and canine parvovirus and must repeat this process every two (2) years thereafter.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of four (4) months, shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against rabies and every three (3) years thereafter.

In order to buy a dog tag, you must show an official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital with the breed, colour and name of dog showing on receipt, as well as the veterinarian hospital tag number.

NO ONE WILL BE ISSUED A DOG TAG WITHOUT THE OFFICIAL RECEIPT.

Since April 1st, tags have only been available for purchase at the Village Office, 56 Douglas Street.

Meantime, New Brunswick SPCA is once again assuming Animal Control duties for the Village of Salisbury. Please direct any dog-related complaints or inquiries to NB SPCA at 1-877-722-1522.

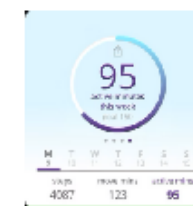

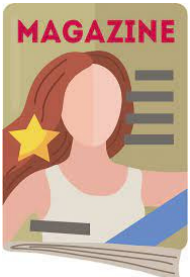
