They will all meet in St. John's Newfoundland and travel across Canada to Victoria, British Columbia. All the vehicles are driven not trailered.

Village Council News

Council recently met with Plan360 concerning storage containers in the village. Information concerning what other areas do or do not do with storage containers was discussed. Council is seeking further information through Plan360 concerning storage containers within the village limits.

At our last meeting Council decided not to install any more speed bumps within the village. Opinions within the village seem split, with some residents wanting them and others not so much. Council believes speed bumps are not the solution to this problem. Increased RCMP presence is the obvious cure (I know the comments being made about that statement). To get increased presence we need to contact the RCMP more often. This can be done either online or by phone.

The tender for the Petitcodiac Fire Department's new Fire Rescue Unit has been sent out. Our 2001 Fire Truck has been removed from service because of frame issues.

The gas tax projects were awarded to Browns Paving Of Sussex. They will be paving East Main St., Third Street, the small section between the end of Hooper Lane and the beginning of Maple Street. The last project will be the repair and re surfacing of the section of West Main St. in front of the Scotia Bank

I want to thank Mr. Wilbur and his Essential Skills Class at Petitcodiac Regional School for the great job they did building benches, picnic tables and arbours for the Maple Street Project. Also congratulations and thank you to the Petitcodiac Garden Club for their activities on June 18.

I want to congratulate the Kiwanis Club of Petitcodiac on hosting the first Petitcodiac Regional School Grad Banquet since Covid began. The Kiwanis club awarded four-\$1000 scholarships to students of PRS. Prior to Covid, the Kiwanis grad banquet had been a part of the PRS graduation exercises since 1948.

Parents and teachers should be very proud of this year's graduating class. The dinner was well attended, the students were well behaved, well dressed, enthusiastic and a delight to spend the evening with. A great time was had by all.

Taste and See

Psalms 34:8 says, “Taste and see that the LORD is good; blessed is the one who takes refuge in him.”

It is interesting that the writer uses the sense of taste to describe our testing or seeking of God. I was thinking of this and thought about our different senses and concluded that “taste” has fulfilment and satisfaction.

In high school, we would often “suffer” from the smell of a local bread bakery. It didn’t matter if you were hungry or not, but when the smell of the fresh bread baking came through the windows, you longed for some. To smell the bread was not enough. You wanted a

taste.

I am afraid that many of us today may be satisfied with just the “smell” of God, and we don’t want too much of it either. There is no longing. That is a sign of a heart turning cold.

I would encourage each of us to work on our desire to “taste” God. Jeremiah 29:13 says, “You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart.”

Take time to remove yourself from the cold busyness of life and work to seek and “taste” God. You will find that he is indeed good, fulfilling and satisfying, and well worth the effort.



Can Carpooling Work for You?

With the unprecedented cost of gas and the rising cost of everything due to inflation, many find that just being able to afford to drive to work is too expensive. It is hard to believe there are many who cannot afford to drive to work but that is the reality.

Carpooling may be a great option if you regularly travel to work or for errands, others may be traveling at the same time to the same area. It is good for the environment to have less vehicles traveling. Carpooling is also a good way to reduce commuting expenses by sharing the cost of traveling to work or to shopping with someone else. Sharing a ride is also a way to meet people and make new friends.

However, there are things that should be done to make sure it is an enjoyable and economical option for all involved.

Here are some carpooling tips: Determine the pickup locations and times in advance and be punctual.

Establish who is driving and when. If carpoolers are alternating who is driving their car, make a schedule at the onset of each month to avoid confusion and frustration.

How much and when? The cost and when payments are expected for riders who are contributing financially to the ride but not using their vehicle in rotation need to be clear and up front. Is a passenger is paying daily, weekly or monthly? Is payment is expected in advance or after rides have been taken? What is the policy if someone missed a day due to illness? The method of payment should also be clear. Is e-transfer acceptable or is cash preferred? For those contributing financially, it is important to pay your driver on time.

What can you do in the car? Establish clear boundaries. Can riders eat, drink, smoke, talk on their phones, engage in conversation (some people like quiet time in the morning on the

way to work)?

Who controls the radio? Not everyone has the same taste in music. Public radio might be a good compromise and it substitutes for conversation first thing in the morning when many are not keen on talking.

Establish a late policy. How long should a driver wait for a passenger? Establish an agreed upon amount of time and if someone is past that time, it is understood they are on their own.

Make a back up plan. Cars can breakdown, people can get sick. Plan for what happens if the driver is unable to complete the rides on any given day. If you are the driver, drive safely. Observe the rules of the road and do not speed. Remember, you are not alone in your vehicle. Your passengers are trusting you to get to the destination safely.

What about safety?

Carpooling with someone you don’t know that you found on a public bulletin board can be a bit intimidating. However, there are steps you can take to reduce risk. Since a carpooling relationship is generally one that last for several weeks or months, unlike a one off ride with a cab service, you will want to have an idea who you are spending all that time within the vehicle.

You can ask for references. Ask to speak to a couple of people who know the person you are going to carpool with. Are they trustworthy? A good driver? Punctual? Honest? Do they follow the rules? Would they let their mother drive with them? Drivers, you can do the same. You have a right to feel safe with whoever you have in your car.

Taking a picture of the car and license plate before you get in and maybe even the driver and sending it to a friend can give some peace of mind. Let that friend know where you are going and when you expect to be there and text them to confirm the ride went well. This will no longer be needed once you get to know your rideshare partners

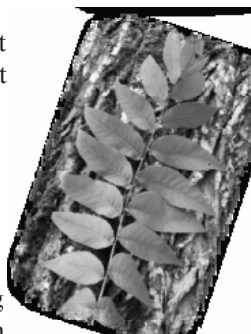

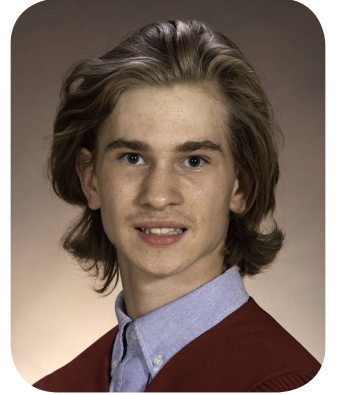
