### A How-To for Saving the Bees

Sometimes, we make simple problems complicated. Attracting pollinators to your garden should be straightforward but it gets complicated by plant types, blossom times and the pollinators you want to attract (lots of honeybees, fewer wasps).

experts in the field, Lorraine Johnson and Sheila Colla. They have seized upon the recent surge of interest in habitat restoration and native plant gardening with their combined decades of expertise. Their new book titled "A Garden for the Rusty-Patched Bumblebee: Creating Habitat for Native Pollinators", with beautiful illustrations by Toronto artist Ann Sanderson, is the perfect handbook for anybody wanting to approach their garden with an ecological bent without getting lost in the weeds (garden joke).

Think of the rusty-patched good bugs in the world. The ones that help to pollinate and fertilize 1/3 of the food we eat.

bee? The once-common native bee has been in decline since the 1980's along with many other native species. Their problems relate to the decline of communities. The last known rusty-

Mark Cullen is an expert patched bumblebee sighting in Canada was by the author Sheila Colla in Pinery Provincial Park in 2009. In 2012, it was the first native bee in Canada to be officially designated as endangered. This is a handbook for creating habitat to bring the rusty-patched, and others like it, back from the brink.

> Johnson and Colla guide the reader through a thoughtful journey in the first half of the book of why native pollinator habitats are so important to the gardener and how to create them. This book is accessible, enjoyable and is worth revisiting for the 'a-ha' moments you are bound to experience as you read

The second part of the book Thankfully, Toronto has its own details native plants are so important to pollinator species and explains why they are. The unique co-dependencies between native plant and native pollinator are surprising as they are important. With the importance of habitat and native plants well established, the book then lays out exactly how you can start your garden for the rusty-patched bumblebee. Site preparation, design, plant selection and maintenance are all laid out in such simple terms that you will find yourself running to the yard to get started.

If you aren't already an avid bumblebee as a euphemism for all the native plant gardener, this book will be the revelation that opens a whole new world of gardening to you. For many long-time gardeners, Johnson and Colla Why the rusty-patched bumble offer a complete re-education on a world of plants you thought you knew. Drawing on Johnson's deep knowledge on the topic, this is as complete a guide to gardening for beneficial nature that we habitats which support native pollinator have encountered. Here are some of our favourites which will be going into our

gardens for the rusty-patched bumblebee:

Jackin-the-Pulpit (Arisaema triphyllum) is attractive to Ben especially for his heavily shaded woodland garden. Jackin-the-Pulpit has a specialist relationship with pinklegged tiger moth and goes well with other native woodland flowers such as great white trillium, wakerobin, wild geranium, baneberry, wild blue phlox, and mayapple. You can pair native plants like wine and cheese.

- Canada Goldenrod (Solidago canadensis) is a full-sun, fallblooming "former weed". Until recently, that is how it was viewed by many, but as we learn more, we appreciate its ecological value and natural beauty. The list of specialist relationships is long - in fact, it's hard to find a garden plant that supports more native bees and butterflies.
- Little Bluestem native grass with a lower growing habit of only 50-60cm height. Perfect nature.

for smaller gardens. Reddish brown florets with reddish leaves that will stand upright through the winter are two ornamental properties. It hosts common wood-nymph butterfly and various skippers, which are flying insects somewhere between moths and butterflies, which include dusted, cobweb, ottos, Indian, swarthy, crossline, and Leonard's (all beneficial).


Fainting, otherwise known medically as syncope, is defined as a loss of consciousness followed by spontaneous and therefore have many side effects. recovery. 

After August, Council will return to its regular practice of holding regular public meetings on the evenings of the second and fourth Mondays of each month.

### 2022 SALISBURY DOG TAGS - LATE FEES IN EFFECT

of April 1st, late fees have been in effect for 2022 Village of Salisbury Dog Tags. Factoring in this \$15 increase, registration fees are currently:

\$10.00 + \$15.00 late fee = \$25.00 for spayed or neutered dogs

\$30.00 + \$15.00 late fee = \$45.00 if not spayed or neutered.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of three (3) months shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against distemper and canine parvovirus and must repeat this process every two (2) years thereafter.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of four (4) months, shall have such dog(s) and other hazardous materials. vaccinated against rabies and every three (3) years thereafter.

In order to buy a dog tag, you must show an official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital with the breed, colour and name of dog showing on receipt, as well as the veterinarian hospital tag number.

### \*\*\* NO ONE WILL BE ISSUED A DOG TAG WITHOUT THE OFFICIAL RECEIPT. \*\*\*

Since April 1st, tags have only been available for purchase at the Village Office, 56 Douglas Street.
