Cyclists will be converging on race day from all over Canada for the opportunity to pit their athletic ability against Elgin's magnificent terrain. Elgin is in the heart of the Southern Highlands of New Brunswick, and as locals know it's a region replete with beautiful views of rolling hills, fields, forest and the stunning Pollet River.

If you are up for what has been touted as "the toughest mountain bike

race in Atlantic Canada". Go to sign up for the race on our raceroster.com page and maybe you could be one of the top 25 racers and win a coveted Tour of Elgin belt buckle. The climbs are awesome (some as high as 1100 feet), frequent, and riders can expect course levels to challenge all levels of mountain bike skills. If you don't think you're up for the 120km marathon why not try one of the 80km, 40km, or 20km distances? If those awesome climbs are a bit too impressive for you don't worry, there is also the e-bike 40km race.

If you've never raced before there's no reason not to give it a try. The Tour of Elgin takes place on a wellmarked course that will cover different types of surfaces with limited pavement. It includes sections of double track trail, dirt roads, and lots of fast flowy single track. If you're a young person interested in racing, sign up for the kid's 20km race, registration is free!



A "Not-To-Do List"

Tired of being told what to do?

If so, you will like our column. Gardeners are generally busy doing stuff. But there are some tasks that just are not necessary, some are a walk backwards.

Here is our list of Not To-Do's which will guide you to your most productive garden outcome:

- Fertilizing. Resist. Do not fertilize your permanent plants in the second half of the season, ie. now. Most plants will have taken what they need from the soil and an additional boost of nutrients can result in soft new growth that is susceptible to winter dieback. Focus on long-term soil fertility by adding compost and mulching heavily for happy, healthy plants come fall. Note that tender annuals can be fertilized any time all season long as they die with first season frost anyway. A fall lawn fertilizer, which is important, should be lower in nitrogen (which promotes green growth) and relatively higher in phosphorus (to promote healthy roots) and should not be applied until late October or early November.
- no sense. You drink when you're thirsty, right? Plants are like people, which is why putting your in-ground sprinkler on a timer is a waste of water and may lead to over watering. Apply water less frequently, and deeper to train your plants to put down deeper roots. Note needs for water. Astilbe does not like


- Do not garden naked. We have tried weeding in flip flops, and it never goes well. We wear cloths in the garden for protection: from the sun, prickles, soil, and stinging nettles (do not think too much about this, but stinging nettles while gardening naked?). Americans in Seattle have other ideas. They created a day called World Garden Naked Day, which is always the first Saturday in May. The British have enthusiastically embraced this idea. Pruning while naked? Strictly forbidden.
- Landscape fabric. Sometimes called weed barrier fabric. We believe that this is false advertising. When you lay down the polyester spun material that allows water through and in theory no weeds, you are inviting weeds to germinate and root into the fabric, which is course and tough as nails. The results are not weedless gardens but gardens full of weeds that are difficult to pull out of the 'weed barrier' fabric. It IS useful for use under interlocking brick and to line a retaining wall, holding back excess soil and grit.
- Cut your lawn. Of course, you will cut your lawn when it is needed, but when is it needed? We say, not until it grows above 7 or 8 cm tall. The taller the grass blades the deeper the roots. Most Canadians cut their lawn too often and too short.
- Do not forget the garden Scheduled watering makes furniture. You placed a bench in the extreme end of the garden as it looks good there. When did you last sit on it? Shut your eyes and listen to the wind in the trees, the bird song in the bushes, the buzz of bumblebees in your bergamot? There is so much more activity going on in your garden than you will ever realize, that perennial plants all have different until you stop long enough to observe it with all your senses.

What not to do in the garden? Work. We do not mean ever, but from time to time, work is done even when there are endless jobs still to do.

Here's recommendation: Mark sowed a garden of "hummingbird flowers" in his yard with his four-year-old grandson Conrad last fall (McKenzie Hummingbird and Wildflower mix, \$14.99). This year it exploded with poppies and a variety of other bright, pollinator-attracting flowers. When you stand next to it, as Conrad does every time he visits, you slowly become aware of the myriad of mason bees, bumble bees, unidentified flying objects and yes, even hummingbirds that are a cinch to overlook while

you are in motion.



The Cleveland Clinic, a leading cardiology centre, says heart disease is seven times deadlier for women than breast cancer. Build up of plaque in the heart's arteries contributes to the death of one in every three women, more than all cancers, chronic respiratory diseases and accidents combined.

But heart disease kills even more men. This fact and the historical focus on heart disease in men means most people are unaware of the risk factors a male disease as it occurs in men

or pain in the jaw, neck, upper back or arm. These problems may be mistaken of cardiovascular disease, for a panic attack with fatal delay in diagnosis.

Suppose a family member or friend is good diagnostician and immediately calls 911. Even then, studies show that an immediate electrocardiogram or stress test is less likely to reveal the typical indicators of heart attack.

Even if a woman has an early diagnosis of coronary attack and survives, a bypass operation may be required. But enough. Family and friends need to work she has twice the risk of dying during on weight reduction together. the surgery or shortly thereafter.

a daily 81 milligram dose of aspirin may help. But since aspirin can cause gastrointestinal bleeding, always discuss this medication with your doctor.

Remember that obesity leads to type 2 diabetes which in turn increases the risk of heart attack. Gaining weight alone is easy; losing weight alone is hard. But if obese, losing weight will improve health. Good strategies and support groups help. Sheer will is probably not

Have your blood pressure checked. One-third of heart attacks in women could be prevented by controlling blood pressure.

If blood cholesterol is elevated, cardiologists will recommend cholesterol-lowering drugs. But discuss this with your physician, as there are effective and safer natural options.



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



In March and labour leader Peter J. McGuire, who organized a similar parade in New York City on 5 September that year. Unions associated with the Knights of Labor Prime Minister Sir John Thompson and and the American Federation of Labor received royal assent in July 1894. in both Canada and the United States

Canada: Labour Day (French: Fête du subsequently promoted parades and Catharines, Halifax, Ottawa, Vancouver and London during these years. Montreal declared a civic holiday in 1889. In holding picnics and parades since 1880 to celebrate the anniversary of their union, the Provincial Workmen's Association, first organized in 1879. In on the Relations of Labor and Capital in Canada recommended recognition of April 1894, unions lobbied Parliament to recognize Labour Day as a public holiday. Legislation was introduced in May by

more from my children than I've ever taught them. I've watched them grow and mature from that first trip down the lane, to their trip down the aisle. I've seen a mind-set that put my own to shame, but their father and I taught them that "what doesn't kill you will make you stronger", and "necessity is the mother of invention".

If my young ones wanted something and it wasn't either Christmas or their birthday, they worked for it, or went without it. They had learned the value of money, and that "not having it" was "no shame" unless you were lazy.

One Christmas we decided to buy our 2 oldest sons 22's. After Hunters safety courses they were eager to try them out. Our poor old mailbox was so full of holes that the mail lady refused to leave mail, as she kept cutting her arm on the inside of it. We replaced it, with a warning to the culprits. So "number 2" son decided to jokingly aim his rifle at the lightning rod on the barn, and saving "you think I can hit that lightenin' rod?" - Oh! Oh! Another lesson learned, (this time in the woodshed).

My children remember when we were "struggling", and when coming up the lane, my son smelled pancakes cooking. He yelled, "Oh no, not pancakes again?!" He came into the house and got his gun, and headed out across the raod to the woods. He brought back two rabbits, skinned and cleaned them, and presented them to the cook (that would be me), and proudly said, "Here, cook these." I was pleased, and he brought and God help the next generation. two rabbits in each day, either shot or

snared; Bless his heart! I cooked them. One for stew, and the other to be ground in the old hand grinder, mixed with mustard, and put into school sandwiches.

If there's anything I've learned (and school days taught "me" as much as my children) it's that lessons are learned outside the classroom more than inside (and sometimes on their backsides).


