We are excited to share that to date, the Community Garden has harvested and donated 335 lbs of fresh-from-the-garden produce to seniors, S.P.O.T., and other community organizations! This year saw Esther Hall make Mustard Pickles and Vicky Crossman make Garlic Dill Beans. The harvest will continue with beets, carrots, pole beans, potatoes and the last of the cucumbers, which Karen Hall-Middleton and Cathy Drury were quick to cover up before the first frost of the season landed.

The highlight of September was the Orchard Pathway Grand Opening, held at Maple Park on September 17th. This project, led by Karen Hall-Middleton has involved an army of volunteers and sponsors, started over



18 months ago, with the successful submission for a Horizon's Community Innovation Grant. Since that time, so many people have contributed to the success of this project - to everyone who played a role, including those who joined us to celebrate the Grand Opening - Thank You! Thank You! The Life of Queen Elizabeth II



Princess Elizabeth Alexandra Mary was born April 21, 1926, at Bruton Street, the London home of her maternal grandparents, Claude and Cecilia Bowes-Lyon.

Her Majesty has sat for 200 official portraits over her lifetime. The first one ever taken was in 1933, when she was just seven-years-old, by Anglo-Hungarian artist Phillip Alexius de Laszlo.

Before she became Queen Elizabeth, in 1945, Princess Elizabeth joined the Auxiliary Territorial Service as a subaltern and learned to drive and service vehicles. Five months later, she

was promoted to junior commander. She volunteered as a truck driver and mechanic during World War II. This made her the first female member of the royal family to serve in the Military, the British Armed Forces. On VE Day, she joined the street parties in London, inconspicuous in her military uniform. Later, as the monarch, the Queen was head of the British Armed Forces.

In 1947, on her 21st birthday, touring South Africa, in a radio broadcast from Cape Town, she committed herself to a lifetime of public service devoted to the Commonwealth.

She married Prince Phillip, Duke of Edinburgh in 1947, he passed away 2021. According to British Heritage, Princess Elizabeth purchased the material for her wedding dress using ration coupons and returned donations sent from women around the United Kingdom.

Princess Elizabeth first visited Canada November, 6, 1951, accompanied by her husband Philip. There was tremendous popular interest in the princess as it appeared to be a glamorous young royal couple who could modernize the monarchy. They were the first royal couple to visit Canada via transatlantic aircraft rather than ship. They attended several Canadian pastimes, hockey game at the Maple Leaf Gardens, Calgary Stampede, and

Is Now the Time to Quit Alcohol?



Alcohol in moderation can be good for your health. We have written dozens of articles on the topic and an entire section of our website is dedicated to the topic. In short, there are plenty of good reasons to enjoy a drink at the cocktail hour. But is there a time for quitting altogether?

Some people think so. And the idea seems to be catching on.

You may have heard about the "sober curious" movement. Coined by writer, Ruby Warrington, being sober curious is about enjoying the benefits of an alcohol-free lifestyle. It has nothing to do with achieving sobriety after problems with alcoholism.

Some efforts are short-term, like "Dry January" and "Sober October". These trendy campaigns are often paired with charitable causes.

But over recent years, more and more people, especially young professionals, are making a deliberate choice to abstain from alcohol - not for a month, but as a lifestyle choice for the long term. Their online tributes to the benefits of not drinking are compelling.

Despite the list of reasons for healthy moderate drinking, they are celebrating a new list of all the reasons for not drinking at all.

In terms of good health, they point to higher energy levels, better sleep, healthier livers, and lower risk of heart disease. But they are also attributing their position on alcohol to a more authentic engagement with friends and family, as well as with the world around them.

In some countries, the

growing numbers of teetotalers are having an economic impact. In Japan, for example, the sober-curious younger generation is rejecting past customs of heavy drinking after work. This trend has resulted in tax revenue from alcohol sales declining by 50% since 1994. Although neither the tax agency nor the liquor industry will point to it, Japanese life expectancy from birth climbed from 80 to 85 years over the same period.

There are other tax-related correlations between alcohol consumption and societal health trends. When governments increase taxes on alcohol, traffic fatalities decline. So does the rate of violent crime. The spread of sexually transmitted diseases is reduced. There are fewer cases of cirrhosis of the liver.

In other words, people are highly price conscious about alcohol. When it costs more, people purchase less of it.

This may be the ultimate reason why now could be an optimal moment to quit drinking.

With everything getting more expensive, cutting alcohol from the shopping list may help ease the squeeze on the pocketbook. According to 2017 Survey of Household Spending,

the average Canadian household spends about \$1,100 per year on alcohol.

In the U.S., a whopping 63% of people aged 21-25 drink alcohol. Whether it be school expenses or early-career wages, it's easy to see the financial motivation for sobriety.

But is the sober curious movement as good for the old as it may be for the young? Sir William Osler, famed Canadian physician and one of the original four founding professors of Johns Hopkins Hospital, remarked, "Alcohol is for the elderly what milk is for the young."

But never forget about moderation. And know that moderation is surprisingly easy to exceed.

Adult men should not exceed two standard alcoholic drinks a day. Women, due to their smaller size, should not exceed one drink a day. A standard drink means a 12oz. or 341 ml beer with 5% alcohol, or a 5 oz. or 142 ml glass of wine, or 1.5 oz or 43 ml shot of 40% spirits.

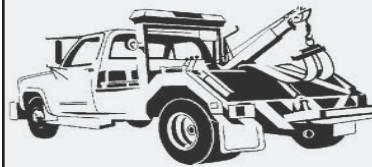

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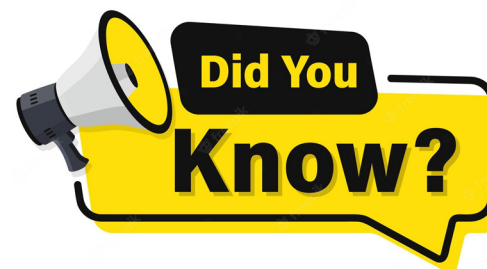
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A Bit About Moncton:

**2022 Fire Prevention Week Campaign**

Join NFPA® in celebrating the 100th anniversary of Fire Prevention Week™ (FPW). This year's FPW campaign, "Fire won't wait. Plan your escape™", works to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe from home fires.

Today's homes burn faster than ever. You may have as little as two minutes (or even less time) to safely escape a home fire from the time the smoke alarm sounds. Your ability to get out of a home during a fire depends on early warning from smoke alarms and advance planning.

Fire Prevention Week is observed each year during the week of October 9th to October 15.

About Fire Prevention Week

Since 1922, the NFPA has sponsored the public observance of Fire Prevention Week. In 1925, President Calvin Coolidge proclaimed Fire Prevention Week a national observance, making it the longest-running public health observance in our country. During Fire Prevention Week, children, adults, and teachers learn how to stay safe in case of a fire. Firefighters provide lifesaving public education in an effort to drastically decrease casualties caused by fires.

Home Fire Escape Planning and Practicing

It is important for everyone to plan and practice a home fire escape. Everyone needs to be prepared in advance, so that they know what to do when the smoke alarm sounds. Given that every home is different, every home fire escape plan will also be different.

Have a plan for everyone in the home.

Children, older adults, and people with disabilities may need assistance to wake up and get out. Make sure that someone will help them!

Smoke alarms

Smoke alarms sense smoke well before you can, alerting you to danger. Smoke alarms need to be in every bedroom, outside of the sleeping areas (like a hallway), and on each level (including the basement) of your home. Do not put smoke alarms in your kitchen or bathrooms.

Choose an alarm that is listed with a testing laboratory, meaning it has met certain standards for protection.

For the best protection, use combination smoke and carbon monoxide alarms that are interconnected throughout the home. These can be installed by a qualified electrician, so that when one sounds, they all sound. This ensures you can hear the alarm no matter where in your home the alarm originates.

Importance of Fire Prevention

In a fire, mere seconds can mean the difference between a safe escape and a tragedy. Fire safety education isn't just for school children. Teenagers, adults, and the elderly are also at risk in fires, making it important for every member of the community to take some time every October during Fire Prevention Week to make sure they understand how to stay safe in case of a fire.

We have everything from apps to videos to printables and much more, make sure you have the resources you need to keep your family, and your community safe.

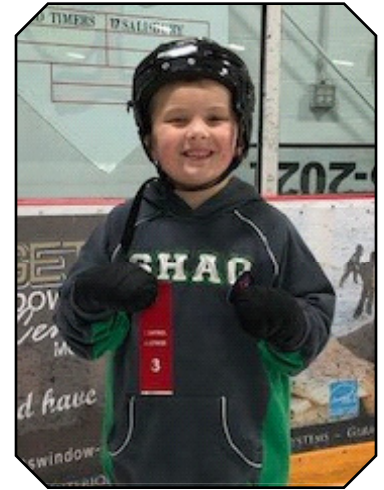

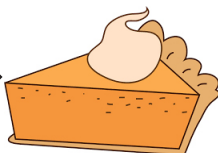

a square dance at Rideau Hall. After her return to the United Kingdom, she reflected on her time in Canada: "I am sure that nowhere under the sun could one find a land more full of hope, of happiness and of fine, loyal, generous-hearted people. They have placed in our heart a love for their country and its people which will never grow cold and which will always draw us to their shores." They were welcomed to New Brunswick by well-wishers who flooded into the communities they visited, and by the Premier, D.L. McLaren. In Fredericton they attended a reception, the Princess read a speech at the Parliament Buildings, and later visited the University of New Brunswick. They also visited Moncton. New Brunswick was at the end of their month-long tour of Canada, that took them from Coast to Coast.

Over her 70 years on the throne, Queen Elizabeth made 22 official visits to Canada. The year 1967 was Canada's centennial year and the Queen was

here for the celebration on Parliament Hill. The Queen said on her last visit to Canada in 2010, "That this country felt like a home away from home."

Elizabeth II became queen of Great Britain and Northern Ireland on February 6, 1952 following the death of her Father King George VI. She was Queen of the United Kingdom from February 1952 until her death September 8, 2022 (96 years) at Balmoral Castle, Aberdeenshire, Scotland, United Kingdom. Elizabeth II was crowned Queen at Westminster Abbey on June 2nd, 1953 and made history at that time by becoming the first monarch to be crowned head of the 54 nations of the Commonwealth, including Queen of Canada. Her coronation dress included symbols from the Commonwealth realms, with embroidered maple leaves representing Canada. Her reign was 70 years and 214 days, the longest of any British monarch (surpassing the nearly 64 year reign of her great-grandmother Queen Victoria), and the second longest recorded of any monarch. The longest reigning monarch in history was Louis XIV, King of France, who ruled the country from 1643-1715 (72 years 110 days).

Queen Elizabeth was the first monarch to be crowned in a televised coronation ceremony, except for the sacred anointing of the monarch with holy oil. Her coronation took place in Westminster Abbey. An estimated 277 million people, around the world watched the coronation on television, many whom had purchased their first television set for the occasion.

On October 14, 1957, Queen Elizabeth II became the first sovereign to open a session of Canada's parliament in person. She read the Speech from the Throne, a duty usually undertaken by the Governor General, her representative in Canada. In her 1957 Christmas broadcast, the queen reflected on the historic moment, stating "Last October I opened the new Canadian Parliament, and as you know this was the first time that any sovereign had done so in Ottawa. Once again, I was over whelmed by the loyalty and enthusiasm of my Canadian people."

The Queen passed away at Balmoral Castle, her summer residence in Scotland, where she had spent many of their family gatherings as a young girl.

The Queen's death has made it necessary for many changes to be made, to name a few: God save the King is already being sung; and key oaths and titles have changed. The Canadian stamps, currency, and wall hangings could take a more gradual transition, it will take time for images of King Charles III to be prepared for their places there.

The funeral of Queen Elizabeth took place at Westminster Abby on September 19th, 2022 and people of the world bid their farewells to a historic monarch.

PUMPKIN & PINEAPPLE MUFFINS

Preheat oven to 375F.

In a mixing bowl mix:

- 2 ¼ cups flour
- 1 teaspoon soda
- ¼ teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/8 teaspoon ground cloves
- ½ teaspoon cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon salt

In another bowl:

- Beat 2 eggs
- Add 2 cups white sugar
- 1 cup pumpkin
- ½ cup oil and mix well

Stir into the flour mixture, just enough to moisten

Now fold in ½ cup well drained, crushed Pineapple.

Put in well oiled muffin pans and bake for about 20 minutes, or until toothpick comes out clean.

Makes 14 muffins in my pan.

WHAT IS IT LIKE TO HAVE QUEEN ELIZABETH AT YOUR WI MEETING?

The late Queen Elizabeth was President of the Sandringham WI branch and always attended the January meeting. She joined the WI in 1943 and took over as President following the death of the Queen Mother. Her grandmother, Queen Mary established the Sandringham WI in 1919.

Other royal connections to the WI include Sophie, Countess of Wessex and member of the Bagshot WI, Queen Consort Camilla is a member of the Tetbury Evening WI and Princess Anne is an associate member.

The following is written about the Sandringham WI January meeting

where they keep things normal and relaxed when the Queen attended.

"When the Queen comes to the meeting, she is with her lady-in-waiting and we meet her at the door, greet her and then bring her into the hall." The Branch secretary reads the minutes and the Queen signs them. "Her Majesty then gives a speech on the various endeavours she has been working on throughout the year, which we follow up with another speaker and a vote of thanks."

"After that, things become a little less formal, and the Queen enjoys the chance to meet the whole group and hear about their year." "We also have exhibition tables, which the Queen has often participated in. The Palace sends something for us to display."

"The Queen then relaxes and talks with fellow WI members over tea (and cake), and three members sitting with her."

"In this time of change and uncertainty, I think the WI's traditional values of playing your part through education and public debate are just as important as ever. By helping women to improve their lives and the lives of those around them, the WI is playing a valuable role in both the local community and nationally."

Urgent Request

Have you ever sent a birthday card to someone after their birthday? A lot of us must have or there would not be so many greeting cards on the rack that apologize for our delay.

In the garden, there are deadlines that come and go, mostly unnoticed. Like bulb planting and growing a great looking lawn. What they have in common is that both tasks require our immediate attention.

Here are our top tips for both a great looking lawn and early spring flower garden, so you can enjoy a successful spring garden season relaxed and ready.

Lawn

If you want a guarantee that your efforts will produce the best-looking lawn, lay sod. In the remaining weeks of fall, sod will put down new roots and prepare itself for a long, Canadian winter. Grass is a cold season crop, which is why we do not recommend that you lay it mid summer. It is now a bit late to start grass seed as there is not enough time for it to germinate, put down root and anchor itself for the winter. If you do spread grass seed now, some of it will no doubt survive the winter and come up next spring.

Fertilize all grass, new and established, any time now using a slow release, fall formula.

Summer Bulbs

The plants that grow from a fleshy root, like dahlias, gladiolas, tuberous begonias, and canna lilies need to be removed from their containers or the ground where they were growing all season. Shake off loose soil, wash the roots of the giant tubers with a sharp blast of water from the end of a hose and allow to dry in the sun for a few days.

Store them in a craft paper leaf bag with clean straw or shredded newspaper for the winter. Place them in the coolest, darkest part of your house, but keep them frost free until later winter (for tuberous begonias) or early spring (for all but the gladiolas) when you will bring them upstairs and start them in the warmth of your living quarters. Gladiolas get planted directly in the garden soil in May.

Holland Bulbs

There are two reasons why you should plant Holland bulbs now, for spring colour.

1. There is only one shipment of bulbs that arrives at your retailer. Once they are gone, they are gone. Best get yours soon.

2. Some bulbs need several weeks to put down roots before the hard frost of late fall. Daffodils, narcissus, and jonquils are in the "plant now" category. Tulips, frankly, are so indestructible that you can plant them as late you want (or can, given that hard ground frost will likely prevent you from digging the ground at all by late December).

Many bulbs fall into an "in between" category that can be planted later. Hyacinths, crocus, scilla, and many of the smaller bulbs will perform well next spring planted any time between now and early November.

When you plant spring flowering bulbs be sure that the ground is well drained. None enjoy wet feet. We recommend that you dig in generous quantities of compost and play sand to open clay-based soils. Clay is nutrient-rich, but the soil particles are so dense that water cannot move through it efficiently. The results can be rotten bulbs and a no-show come spring.

We do not recommend that you add fertilizer when you plant bulbs. Nutrients are packed into each bulb, enough to get it off to a good start come spring, unlike a seed with limited nutrient resources due to its size. This is part of the miracle that makes bulb growing so much fun. If deer, squirrels, or other vermin enjoy eating or otherwise destroying your spring flowering bulbs, we recommend that you stick with

the tried and true: daffodils, narcissus, and jonquils. They are mildly toxic and have a sharp taste that most problem pests will leave alone. Of course, we cannot speak for the squirrels that have a mind of their own. Squirrels have no rules.

A great looking lawn and garden starts by meeting this important deadline. Happy Thanksgiving.

A SETTLEMENT

I live in a Settlement - named so because years ago a family homesteaded in an area, giving its name to the stretch of road, river, farm and locale. It was henceforth referred to as a "Settlement", a place where people stopped to build a home and lifestyle where a well deserved peace was adhered to after a day's work. The settlements (and there are many abounding); Steeves, Wheaton, Colpitts, Kinnear, and a lot more. Over the years we take the title for granted. Some started as the millwright took up his stock and trade, and after years of homesteading changed its name from "Mills" to "Settlement", not just a place of employment but a "bedding-down", family kind of place where a school, church, and maybe a little store gave the residents a feeling of security, of family, of settling down, so to speak.

There's something about "settling" that gives one a sense of permanency. A case is settled in court, an argument reaches an understanding, a decision becomes finalized, or a house becomes a home.

I thought about such things as I tried to gain a bit of perspective on the slant of my old floors. My mind was doing a number on my comfort zone as I grumbled about the fact that since 1963 I have not lived in a house where the floors (in one room or another) didn't have an uneven slope.

I've owned three homes that I dearly loved, but if a level was placed on the kitchen or livingroom floor, the bubble would always be off centre. A ball dropped would roll, or a table would lean.

I pondered a bit and came to the conclusion that over the years our foundations have "settled". We would have maintained pristine, museum-like, head-aches of perfection, showpieces that came at a "much too costly" price; but somehow got lost in the beautiful frenzy of "living". We were never willing to sacrifice the comfort of home and familiarity at the expense of perfect decor.

While it's important to take care

of one's things, it's equally important to feed one's soul with all the things that colour our world with beauty. Which is still "in the eye of the beholder". So I lift my eyes from the crooked doorways, heaved floors, and chipped tiles to the windows of my soul and I see a panorama of summer rainbows, autumn flame, winter banks of swirling snow, cozy fireside and the promise of spring in all its glory.

I will not dwell on the woodwork I am too weary to paint (procrastination is my temporary address), but the Settlement I live in is a house that is weathered by time, memories, life and "yes", even "neglect" because I am a dreamer. I dream of flowers, butterflies, children, the songs of old men, the tears of old women, and the laughter of my husband. I love rocking chairs, and family dinners with lots of dirty dishes because I'm reminded of God's bountiful goodness. So my house is a settlement, and like God's beautiful world with its valleys, breezes, sunbeams, and music, I am resigned to its terrain.

I saw on my kitchen windowsill, the little ants who somehow managed to come inside once the ladybugs had gone to sleep. I looked a little further afield and caught sight of a mother bear followed by three cubs (yes, three) running across my field of vision. I sat on my verandah and made eye contact with a lone coyote and meanwhile, on the edge of the woods, fawn and doe grazed. Overhead hawk and eagle soar. The bluejays, crows, and finches add variety to my landscape, and under my feet lie the floorboards of dancing feet and barefoot children, and memories of paws of four-footed softness, step silently across my settlement.

And in the shadows, and prisms of sunbeams is my best friend. He's smiling and He chuckles when the "slant" leaves me a bit dizzy, and He whispers, "sit awhile and dream, 'tomorrow's' another day". I lean on Him and sigh: "You had me at 'tomorrow'. You see "My Lord is a dreamer too".

SALISBURY IS NEW BRUNSWICK'S MOST ACTIVE COMMUNITY!

Salisbury was named the most active community in New Brunswick following the annual ParticipACTION Community Better Challenge, a Canada-wide competition with national and provincial prizes for top communities.

The Village organized a number of events in June to encourage residents to get active, including a kick-off event at Highland Park, a pickleball tournament, a number of additional fitness classes, and more.

Salisbury tracked 11,000,000 minutes of physical activity that month with over 400 residents participating.

With the win came a provincial prize of \$15,000 from ParticipACTION.

"This is the second year that our community has participated in the Community Better Challenge, and the buy-in amongst residents, businesses, and organizations for this new annual tradition is a testament to our sense of pride in being such an active community," said Mayor Robert Campbell when the winning announcement was made.

"Our community demonstrated their eagerness to explore our recreational facilities and get moving- from pickleball and walking to kayaking and yoga, our residents did it all and showed their passion (and competitiveness!) in the process. I look forward to celebrating being New Brunswick's most active community for 2022 as we plan on how we can become Canada's most active community in 2023!"

ACTION BEING TAKEN ON OVERDUE SEWER ACCOUNTS

The Village of Salisbury continues to actively pursue payment of overdue municipal wastewater accounts.

As per the By-Law No. 45, Relating to the Collection of User-Charges for the Sanitary Sewerage System and By-Law No. 45-L, to Amend the Collection of User-Charges for the Sanitary Sewerage System, the Village is increasing its collection efforts including with court action and, in extreme cases, disconnection of service.

Holders of accounts in arrears are urged to arrange for payment plans with Village Administration in order to avoid court judgments and/or shut-offs.

The Village Office remains available to assist with any inquiries for residents with outstanding accounts.

The sewer rate for 2022 in the Village of Salisbury is \$325.00 per unit.

Interest working out to 2% per month is added to all overdue sewer accounts, calculated from the billing date in January.

ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLE USE IN SALISBURY *IMPORTANT UPDATE*

The Village of Salisbury would like to provide residents with an update on the ATV (off-road vehicle) By-law.

While Village administration continues to work toward considering certain routes for ATV access, the process of creating the by-law has been postponed due to the timing of municipal reform and its impact on the creation of by-laws.

Where this region will be a new municipal entity in the new year, this ATV by-law would need to be re-introduced with the newly-elected Council.

The timeline could not be guaranteed because of the required Provincial approvals for roads not under the jurisdiction of the current Village; specifically New Brunswick Route 112 (Fredericton Road, River Road) and NB

Route 106 (Main Street).

In the meantime, the process of creating the ATV street access by-law will continue with the intention of bringing it before the new council in early 2023 for its consideration.

This will ensure that the by-law can be done properly and consider the public input received from stakeholders and residents via a survey, as well as through a planned public consultation session, and not need to be re-introduced.

The Village is committed to working with stakeholders on ensuring there is safe access for those using our trails and accessing services.

As a reminder, use of ATVs on streets in the Village of Salisbury is NOT permitted at this time.

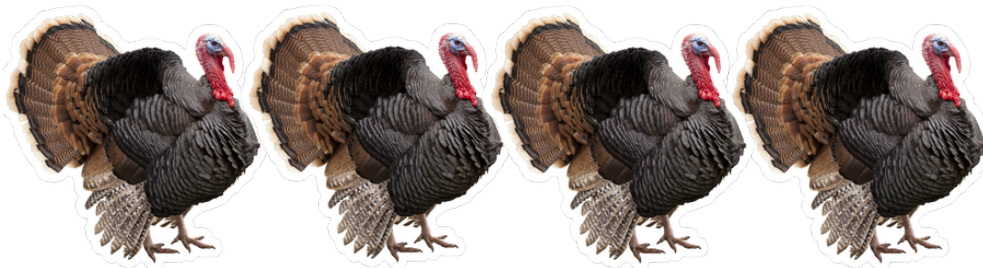
