Elva's family sang and played music together on a regular basis. Music has been an everyday part of her life, playing for birthdays, anniversaries, house parties and shows at local halls any excuse to get together for a tune.

Over the years, Elva has been involved in organizing and performing at many music benefits. She has also sung for many funerals and played at seniors



homes in the local area.

Elva fondly remembers the fun times she had with her music students while giving lessons on beginner guitar, keyboard, fiddle, piano, mandolin and dobro. She always shared her enthusiasm for music with her students.

In 1968, Elva joined the Sussex Town and Country Orchestra, sharing the stage with many talented musicians and forming lifelong friendships. They travelled throughout New Brunswick playing many shows and always having a wonderful time. From 1975 to 1987, she was the Orchestra's acting secretary.

Elva spent many wonderful weekends taking part in the open mic music at Jim Smith's "Old Mill Bluegrass Campout" at Lutes Mountain, NB.

August 15th, 1998, she traveled to Saint John, New Brunswick for the NB Old Tyme Fiddle Orchestra concert (founded by Winston Crawford & Jim Gerrior), where one hundred fiddlers performed.

With the help of friends and son Len Kelso, Elva has recorded three CDs, which include some of her

compositions.







They have worked tirelessly to have the arena up and running as soon as possible this season. There have been a number of comments both positive and negative concerning this year's arena start up. I would like to point out most of the facilities and programs available to us in Petitcodiac are the results of people getting up off their chairs and banding together to fill a need. Case in point, is the Petitcodiac Valley Golf Course, the Petitcodiac Arena, the newest soccer field, the PRS Playground, the Motor Sport Hall Fame, The Westmorland County Agricultural Fair, SPOT and the Petitcodiac and Area Garden Club, to name a few. It is your right to have an opinion and to voice that opinion. I just urge you to have the correct facts before doing so.

Councillor Murphy has also informed us the hiking and walking trails at Maple Street are now flagged by colour. A new sign with a map of the trails will be erected at the community garden with the distances of each trail marked on the map.

A large Petitcodiac thank you to McCully Landscaping for the tremendous job they did on the outdoor rink. The large outdoor rink at the Maple St. Park is almost completed. We will be electing one councillor from each ward and one at large for a total of four councillors. A new Mayor will be elected by an at-large vote. This new Mayor and Council will take over from the existing council on January 1, 2023. Mix-up creates confusion

Mix-up creates confusion for some voters increased by less than 15 per cent. on where local government elections are taking place next month

 $FREDERICTON\,(GNB)-Residents\,preparing$ for local government elections next month in their communities may receive a letter this week from Elections New Brunswick mistakenly indicating they are not having an election. While others, not having an election in November, may get the opposite message.

A mix-up in the name on files sent to the vendor who printed the content and packaged the envelopes for Elections NB resulted in over 260,000 households being sent the wrong election message. "The mistake, introduced after the files were sent to the supplier, was not caught by us during the proofing process," said chief electoral officer, Kim Poffenroth. Information about the Nov. 28 local government elections is available on the Elections NB website. In addition, Elections New Brunswick is publishing an insert next week in all the daily newspapers and flyer bags, delivered to people's homes, indicating where elections are taking place and all of the positions up for election.

"Voters who live in areas having an

election will be sent voter information cards by us in mid-November, indicating when and where they can vote," said Poffenroth.





Wartime Sugar Savers

These practical, wartime recipes have been "tested and approved" in Canada's Kitchen. Some are old, some are new, but all are voted good. Designed to stretch your sugar ration, each recipe calls for only a moderate amount of sugar. For example, in each of the dessert recipes, not more than ½ a cup of sugar is used.

Butter rationing has been taken into account in these recipes. A few of them call for the use of small amounts of butter, but it is only included where the butter flavour is especially desirable.

Tips to Save Sugar

-Don't experiment with your sugar ration ...use tested recipes. -Add sugar to stewed fruit after cooking and while it is still warm, you will find less will be needed.

-Bake the sweeter fruits in the water in which they have been soaked, little or no sugar will be needed for sweetening.

-Use a plain sugar syrup (equal quantities of sugar and water boiled until sugar is dissolved) or one from canned fruit to sweeten cold drinks, if sugar is used in hot beverages stir until it is completely dissolved.

-Add raisins to cooked cereals for a change, this saves sugar in sweetening.

-Watch where the sugar goes in your home, how much is used in cooking, on cereals, tea, coffee, cut down where it is needed least.
