



But Christmas Eve t'was difficult To sleep you see, because I'd hung my empty stocking To be filled by Santa Clause


I tried to stay awake until I heard him on the roof I yawned and nodded off instead And never heard a hoof

PreCanSkate and CanSkate. Now let's level test days. talk about figure skating. And our Christmas Showcase!

Stage 4 CanSkate badge (there are six badges in total), they are eligible to move to the Jumpstart program. Jumpstart is the transition between CanSkate and the Figure Skating program. Jumpstart skaters are still technically Can Skaters and will continue to work on the elements for the remaining two badges. They are on the ice with skaters that are in the StarSkate program - more about that in a moment. Jumpstart skaters work in group lessons and are always supervised. They also start working on things that they will need as they finish their badges and move out of Jumpstart and into the StarSkate program. As Jumpstart skaters are still technically CanSkaters, they wear their helmets.

After your skater has finished their Stage 6 badge, they then move into the StarSkate program. There skaters will learn dances, skills and free skate elements - the jumps and spins that are so exciting. There are tests in these streams starting with Star 1 and going to Star 10, then Gold level tests. In Dance, there are Diamond level dances just a bit more confusion there are also Artistic Free tests that skaters can take. The Artistic tests start at Star 5 level. Skaters will progress through the levels at their own rate. At the lower levels, the coaches can assess the skater when they feel the skater is ready. Eventually, skaters need to be assessed by higher

Last month we talked about level judges and will need to test at high

In the lower Star levels, skaters continue to have some group time After a skater has gotten their and will also start to learn to work independently. Your skater will also need private lessons. These can start at the Jumpstart level. Parents arrange private lessons with the coaches. Typically, a skater will have a primary coach, but it is common for a skater to see more than one coach, particularly at higher levels. This is something that would be discussed between parents and coaches.

Finally, there is equipment. skaters need stretchy, comfortable clothing that they can move in easily. The clothing should not be baggy. Baggy clothing can easily be caught by a skate blade and could cause a bad fall. The most important piece of equipment however are the skates and the blades. Skates need to provide support and should be fairly stiff from side to side but allow the skater to bend a 'bit' forward at the ankle. Blades need to be rust free and still have a rocker. Skates do not have to be new and it is quite common, especially for younger skaters who are growing, to have second (or third or fourth) hand skates.

So, now that you know a bit after the Gold level dances. And to add about figure skating, we are planning a Christmas Showcase this year. Our Jumpstart and up skaters will be performing in it. It will be on December 21 at 5:30 pm. There is no charge to come watch and we hope to see you there. Please watch our Facebook page for any updates on the showcase.

What Have We Learned in 30 Years?

This month entails a visit to the Gifford-Jones archives. What follows is an excerpt from a column on diabetes published thirty years ago. What has changed in society? You be the judge. November 1992:

Diabetes results from an abnormal handling of food by the body. Normally some food is converted into a sugar called glucose. This stimulates the secretion of the hormone, insulin, which acts as a "key" to allow glucose to enter the cells. Glucose is then used as "fuel" to provide energy.

There are two types of diabetes. Type I is inherited. It usually occurs before 30 years of age. In these cases, the pancreas produces little or no insulin. It's believed that the immune system in some people gradually destroys the pancreatic cells which produce insulin.

Type II normally strikes after age 40 and these patients are often grossly overweight. The pancreas still produces some insulin, but it's like a tired, overworked horse that's been badly treated for many years. The little insulin produced is also less able to penetrate the cells, a condition called "insulin resistance".

Too many people have been misled by Sir Frederick Banting's discovery of insulin in 1921. This hormone, like a blanket that puts out a fire, prevents diabetic coma

diabetic coma and eventual death. But insulin cannot extinguish the smouldering diabetic ashes which may cause a variety of catastrophic complications later in

This smouldering condition affects the large and small arteries of the body. Like plumbing coated with rust, the arteries become narrowed. This is known as atherosclerosis. Prime targets are the coronary arteries resulting in premature heart attack.

Diabetics also suffer more often from diabetic retinopathy. The arteries at the back of the eye become more numerous, weakened, and often rupture releasing blood into the vitreous chamber of the eye. This causes adhesions which tug on the retina and may cause detachment of the lining which sends images to the brain.

About 30 per cent of Type I diabetics and 5 to 10 per cent of Type II diabetics develop chronic renal disease. High blood sugars cause degenerative changes in the nerves triggering numbness and pain in the feet. Damage to blood vessels and nerves also causes impotence in males. must ask themselves a paramount question. Is self-indulgence worth this terrible price? If the answer

losing pounds becomes a delicate balancing act. Blood sugar must be controlled while at the same time shedding pounds.

Prevention of Type II diabetes by controlling weight gain is the only sensible route. A first step to avoid obesity is to buy a scale. The next is to step on it every day.

Avoid sugar like the plague. The problem is that hidden sugar wears a coat of many colours. It's disguised in packaged foods, cereals, and soft drinks. Indirectly it's a major source of obesity and Type II diabetes. Don't compound the problem by adding more sugar to your food and beverages.

Eat whole grain foods such as pasta

along with fresh fruits and vegetables. These foods slowly release sugar into the blood following a meal and place less stress on the pancreas. Exercise, exercise, exercise.

Outdoor Salt

Don't expect help from the government or public health associations. They'll protect you from dirty restaurants, but not from Type II diabetes. Their failure to take an aggressive stand on this matter is the most flagrant lapse of responsibility in the history of medicine.





> All trees are native to Canada, planted according to strict planting protocols that ensure maximum chances of survival.

> The genesis of the idea started here, in this column, more than 8 years ago, when Mark wrote about the value of a healthy urban tree canopy.

> That column generated the interest of 14 not for profit tree planting organizations that met for two years to discuss what they could accomplish by working together. Forests Ontario and Landscape Ontario took the lead in a campaign to reforest the Highway of Heroes, 170 kilometres of highway between the Coroner's office at Keele Street and the 401 and CFB Trenton.

While its offices have moved, the RW department will continue to make use of the storage space at 62 Douglas Street.






