From the Desk of Your MLA Ross Wetmore, Gagetown - Petitcodiac

If life is a highway, 2023 is parked right in the middle of everybody's road and there's no avoiding it.

With Christmas now in the rear view mirror, our focus is on what lies ahead. I hope the New Year holds exciting prospects for you along with much peace and goodwill.

2023 already has a couple of large milestones looming.

On May 6th the coronation of His Majesty King Charles III will be held.

As well, sometime in 2023 India will surpass China as the world's most populous country. The people in these two countries combined, account for over one third of the world's population.

Here in New Brunswick, our population has surpassed 800 000 and is forecast to continue growing. Fredericton is expected to pass Saint John as New Brunswick's second most populous city.

It's been my habit in our year end/year ahead communication to take a look back at some of the important legislation that was passed in 2022.

The intimate partner violence legislation, is intended to help people at risk of intimate partner violence make more informed choices.

Missing persons legislation passed which is designed to assist law enforcement agencies in locating a missing person in instances where no criminal investigation is underway.

We also brought forward legislation designed to get skilled

newcomers into the workforce sooner, particularly in areas where we have the greatest need, like health care.

In 2022 we saw fuel prices take a wild swing upward, particularly diesel and furnace oil. As a result, legislation to reduce the volatility of energy prices was introduced.

Child welfare legislation was also passed, which is focused on a child-centered approach and early intervention as we modernized protection and support for young people.

Our government passed the New Brunswick First Procurement Strategy and Action Plan, which aims to support local businesses and expand the province's economy.

We also introduced minimum wage protection for persons with a disability.

For the first time in 38 years, government is investing in the construction and renovation of public housing units, and it's a big investment-over 102 million dollars.

Perhaps the biggest action item of 2022 was local governance reform. As we embark upon 2023, newly elected mayors and councils will be meeting and moving their communities forward.

I wish for us all a New Year filled with kindness and caring.

In closing, I would suggest that your acts of kindness may not change the world, but they may change a life.

SARCOPENIA, NOT CANCER, BUT A DEADLY WORD



Can you improve muscle mass even as you age? As Mickey Mantle, star player of the New York Yankees, remarked, "If I knew I was going to live this long, I'd have taken better care of myself." Such is my worry in my 99th year.

I was recently having more difficulty getting up from chairs and recalling patients who admitted they could no longer stand up from the toilet seat. They had slowly developed "sarcopenia", weakened muscles from aging that robs one's independence.

Sarcopenia begins at about age 45 and causes skeletal muscle mass and strength decline at a rate of about one percent a year. By age 65, people who spend most of their time inactive on the sofa watching television have lost half of their muscle tissue! Losing muscle mass equates to getting weaker.

Deteriorating muscles mean less and less mobility. Moreover, weakened muscles are a risk factor for serious injuries, such as from a fall. The harder collapse can make head injuries more likely, for example. For the elderly, this can sometimes mean death in a matter of days.

Women should take great precaution. Why? Because they tend to start out with and maintain less muscle mass than males. More women also live longer than men, so there's more time to develop sarcopenia.

What did I decide to do about sarcopenia? Certainly not make the mistake of Mickey Mantle and wait too long. Nor is it a good idea to start the wrong type of exercise.

For instance, there's no sense in rushing out to purchase running shoes. Research has shown that joggers are

not protected from sarcopenia. In fact, people who were runners in their youth can be at greater risk of sarcopenia if they don't take up exercises that focus on preservation of muscle and bone. Running is not the answer for the aging body.

I am glad to know this as I've never seen a happy jogger. Rather, they always appear as they're about to leave this planet.

The best defence against muscle loss is good nutrition and moderate weight training. For years, I've kept small weights on my desk. I'm careful to focus on consistency, not infrequent bouts of lifting too much weight in a show of strength. Research has shown that through moderate weightlifting, people between 62 and 72 years of age can double their strength in 12 weeks of training.

It's a problem though when boredom sets in with lifting weights. Yet the growing challenge of getting up from a deep sofa can motivate a new routine. I decided to try another method to fight sarcopenia.

I remembered that years ago Charles Atlas, an expert in bodybuilding, created a following of famous people who swore by his method. Joe DiMaggio, the New York Yankee baseball player, was a fan. And who would be foolish enough to pick a fight with another follower of Atlas, heavyweight boxing champion, Joe Louis?

Atlas called his technique "Dynamic Therapy" (DT). I decided to find out how it would affect my biceps muscles.

The good news is there's no need to purchase equipment. Very simply, DT, now called isometric exercise, pits individual muscles against each other, again and again. Just clench one fist, then the opposite one, and push against each other for 10 seconds. You can do this simple exercise several times a day. I noticed improved strength in my biceps within one month.

Don't wait until you can't get up from a chair. Maintain your strength and enjoy better quality of life.

skates as stepping on wood or concrete with blades can cause serious damage. However, a set of skate guards will add extra protection against any dirt or rocks tracked in by winter boots from causing dents or chips to the blades. This is especially imperative as skaters move up and rely more heavily on their edges for spins, jumps and footwork; not to mention the price of skates and blades as your skater progresses! Just don't forget to take them off before stepping on the ice...most experienced skaters will tell you they learned this lesson the hard way!

When practice is over and it's time to put the skates away you must make sure they are properly dried after removing them. This can be done with any absorbent towel or a leather shammy. Remove any snow and ice from all

areas of the blade and boot. Ensure you've given the blades a thorough wipe down of any, and all water left behind. Condensation can form on the blades as they warm up to room temperature, so wait a few moments and give them an extra wipe down before putting them away in the bag. Now, let's talk Soft Guards! Soft guards, also known as "skate buddies" add protection to your blade from incurring any damage while travelling from the arena to home while in your bag. However, once home, soft guards should be removed and skates left in an area where the blades can air dry. The reason for this is any moisture or condensation left behind on the blades and left inside the soft fabric can cause rust to form, thus ruining your (potentially expensive) skate blades!

Each practice, first start by visually inspecting both the blades, boots and even laces. Take the time to do a quick inspection of the blades, check for any chips or dents that may interfere with yours or your skater's balance when on the ice. Also check for sharpness, you can do this by checking each edge (side of the blade) with the back of a thumbnail. When gently rubbing the nail against the blade there should be a small amount of nail shaving (caution: do not do this with a fresh Christmas manicure!) Next, ensure boots are in good condition and not pulling apart in any areas such as the sole, heel or blade. Ensure laces are in good condition, no tears or fraying such as ones that may be made by the slice of a rogue blade.

Once skates are inspected and all laced up it's a great idea to put on a pair of skate guards before heading to the ice surface.

The arena does have protective rubber mats, which your skater should always stick to when wearing their

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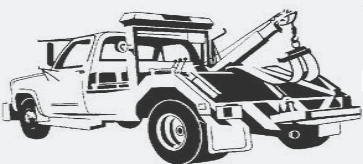
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BUTTERNUT VALLEY SWEARS IN NEW COUNCIL

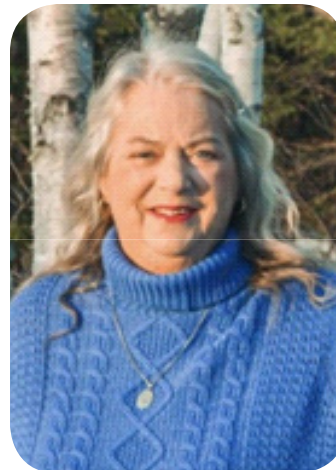

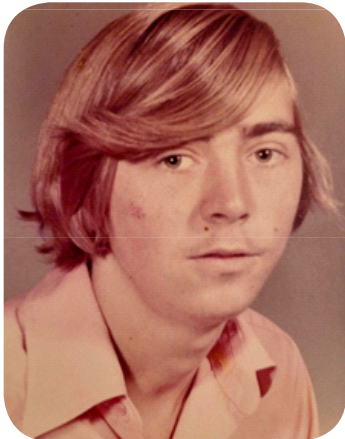

Jesus replied, "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for service in the kingdom of God." Luke 9:62

For Residents of Ward 3 Only: (Former Village of Salisbury Boundary)

2023 SALISBURY SEWER BILLS

Salisbury sewer bills for residents of Ward 3 (that is, the former Village limits) will be mailed out this month to residents living within the serviceable boundary for municipal sewer service.

The sewer rate for 2023 in the Village of Salisbury is \$325.00 per unit.

Interest working out to 2% per month will be added to all overdue sewer accounts beginning on March 2nd.

The interest will be calculated from the date of billing in January.

2023 SALISBURY DOG TAGS

2023 Salisbury Dog Tags must be purchased by the end of March to avoid paying a late fee (a \$15.00 penalty will be added to the regular registration fee for tags not bought before April 1st).

Registration fees are: \$10.00 for spayed or neutered dogs; or \$30.00 if not spayed or neutered.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of three months shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against distemper and canine parvovirus and must repeat this process every two years thereafter.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of four months, shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against rabies and every three years thereafter.

In order to buy a dog tag you must show an official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital with the breed, colour and name of dog showing on receipt, as well as the veterinarian hospital tag number.

NO ONE WILL BE ISSUED A DOG TAG WITHOUT THE OFFICIAL RECEIPT

NO OVERNIGHT STREET-SIDE PARKING DURING THE WINTER (SALISBURY BY-LAW NO. 23)

For the purpose of snow removal, no person shall stand or park a vehicle on any highway within Ward 3 of Salisbury between the hours of 1:00AM and 7:00AM from the first day of November in any year until the first day of April in the following year.

KEY RESPONSIBILITIES:

The Skilled Labourer provides support with the day-to-day operations of the Infrastructure and Public Works Department ("IPWD"). Key responsibilities include, but are not limited to:

- Embody the local government's values and leads by example to create and sustain an organizational culture where everyone is safe, valued, and respected;
- Operates equipment and tools in a safe and efficient manner according to all relevant legislation, policies and procedures;
- Assists with the operation and maintenance of the wastewater treatment plant and collection system;
- Assists with snow removal from sidewalks, parking lots, trails, and access roads;
- Cleans equipment and tools as scheduled and/or required;
