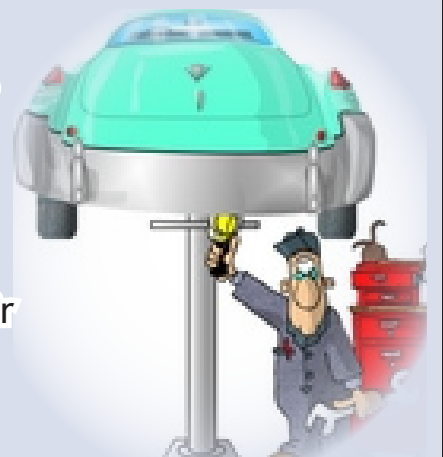

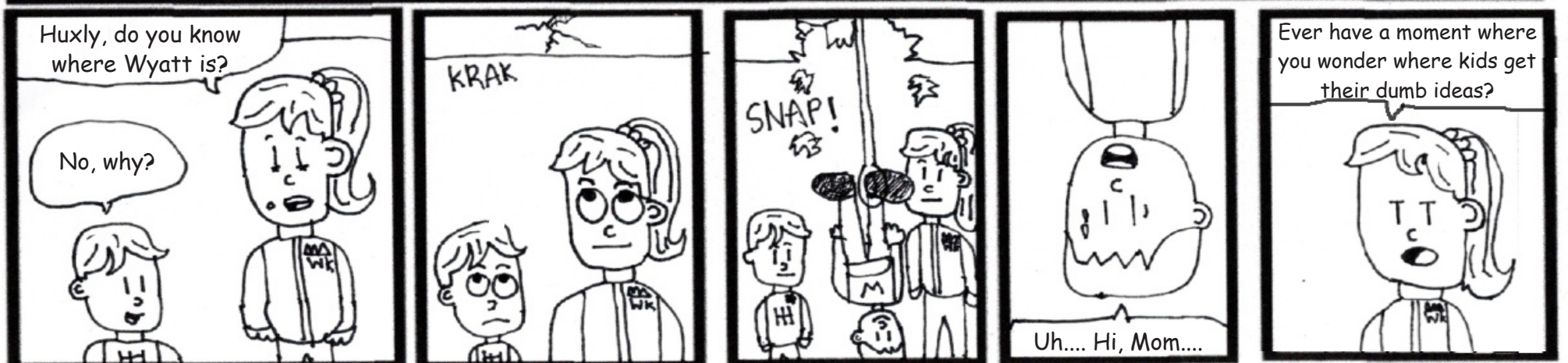

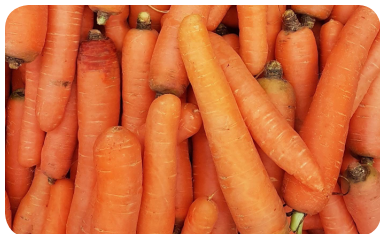

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VILLAGE OF PETITCODIAC HISTORY WALK

October 1st, 2022 was a perfect day for a walk through the Village of Petitcodiac streets to learn some of the interesting and historical facts about this place on the banks of the world famous Petitcodiac River.

A group of forty to forty-five interested people of all ages joined together on a History Walk to discover why the Village is located where it is and why it was moved here from its previous location.

The walk started where the river begins, near Mill road, just past the SPOT building. The Petitcodiac River is formed at this spot by the joining of the North River, the Anagance Brook, the Holmes Brook and the many small tributaries that contribute to form this waterway.

The first record of a sawmill at this site was in 1819 when Hugh Davidson built a mill to produce box "shooks" that were sent by sailing ships to England and the West Indies. Box shooks are thin pieces of rough sawn lumber that were used to construct different types of boxes for packing crates.

There was also a grist mill and a carding mill at the mouth of the Anagance, owned by John Steeves. In 1837 there was a saw mill on the Holmes Brook, operated by Daniel Holmes and John Burnham, look for the sign located at the Maple Street Park walking trails that shows the location of this mill.

The Petitcodiac Lumber Company produced long lumber in the mid 1800's until 1884 when the mill

burned down. At that time unfinished spool wood was shipped to Scotland from a smaller mill built near the mouth of the Holmes Brook.

Several pictures were shared by the Community Museum and Herb Holt showing the old mill, the overseer's house and the Mill pond that had been created by damming the river.

Even after the mills were no longer in production the Mill pond area was a popular location in the community. There were skating parties, picnics and fishing derbies held there. The area was so popular that according to a 1950 Petitcodiac Weekly Newspaper a demand for the following ice cream recipe was shared. "Gather together a group who don't mind a bit of hard work, borrow or bring a hand operated ice cream machine. Get some ice from the ice man on the day of the party. Bring a sack to use to chop the ice in. A few pounds of course salt will be needed as well. You will need 1 cup of milk, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon of vanilla, dash of salt, ¼ cup white sugar, ½ cup corn syrup and 1 cup of heavy cream. This will make about 4 servings."

It should be noted that there was an ice house located near the mill pond that provided all the homes and stores in the area with large blocks of ice for their icebox which was used to preserve food.

The river was a vital link to trade and communication routes with portages from the Anagance brook to the Kennabecasis River, a distance of three

to four miles, then to the Saint John River. Another trade route was located at the site of the Portage Monument and led to the Canaan river, a distance of nearly 15 miles. The rivers and portages were used in the summer months and the rest of the year if travel was necessary it was done by horse or mules on narrow woods paths. The trip from Petitcodiac to Saint John and return could take several days or a couple of weeks.

It should be noted that according to the Petitcodiac River Keepers there is more water that flows in and out of the Bay of Fundy everyday than the flow of all the freshwater rivers in the world combined.

The current iron bridge at the Mill pond was placed there in approximately 1960, relocated from the Scoudouc River mouth. The previous bridge had been a wooden one.

Other industries used the area as well, several fox ranches were located there from the mid 1800's to the 1930's when a disastrous flood destroyed the buildings and killed a large number of breeding foxes. After the loss of the fox ranches near the river they were relocated to other sites in the community, including Church Street and Spring Street.

The next stop on our history walk was the location of the SPOT building where Vicky Crossman provided us with a history of this great organisation in our community. We certainly want to thank Vicky for taking the time, on a very busy Saturday, to inform us of all this organisation does for the people of Petitcodiac and the surrounding areas.

SPOT is located on the former property of the Department of Lands and Mines. A brief history

written by Alan Goddard provided us with some very informative information, including it's previous location across from the Baptist Church in a building that housed their fire fighting equipment and truck in the basement. He also provided a list of previous employees.

As we neared the end of Mill Road, Terry Smith told us of the cheese factories that had been located there in the early 1890's due to the presence of cold water springs. Later operator/owners of cheese factories at this location included Mr Murray Hall.

Once we reached the end of Mill road we noted that the farm across from us was once owned by George F. Colpitts, Terry Smith's father-in-law, who was a bee keeper and was involved with the New Brunswick Agricultural Society. Mr Colpitts sold farm equipment for many years.

This took our walk to the former stage coach route that travelled from Saint John to Amherst known as the Westmorland Great Road. The stage ran this route until the rail way was established in 1860, with the first train going through the village at 8:00am on July 18th of that year. It stopped where a station house had been built, and the area around it was known as "the Station" for many years until the name Petitcodiac was adopted.

Next month we will continue recounting our walk and learn of many other points of interest. With some interesting information about the stage coach robbery...was the stolen strong box ever found? Look for next month's article to find out!

ELGIN WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

LIFE WITHOUT VOLUNTEERS

What is a meaning of volunteerism? It is a noun that means the principle of donating time and energy for the benefit of other people in the community as a social responsibility rather than for any financial reward.

This accurately defines the Womens' Institutes (WI). It would not exist without volunteers; they are the basis for all that we are, what we do, what we feel, and what we think as WI members. WI's were founded out of a need...a great need. The WI was originally brought to life to revitalise rural communities and encourage women to become more involved in producing food (in the UK) during the First World War. Ultimately, there have been hundreds of benchmarks and milestones along the way. The one staple is the need for and utilization of volunteers.

My mother (now deceased) was a WI member, my grandmother (deceased) was a member, my sister is a member and I recently (2020) became a member. Honestly, it was my sister who inspired me. She has been a member for over forty years. How does one do that so consistently? She will tell you that it is the Mission Statement of the WI that spurs her on. Now she is in a mentorship role (with me, her sister, in particular)

but to other young women who have increased our membership in the last year. Most recently, two young women in their early 30s joined our ranks... yes, their thirties! Both have young children and husbands and homes to run. But, the overarching reason is that they see their need to be a part of the community. I applaud them for wanting to belong to something that will pay in dividends as they navigate motherhood, small community life, and being good citizens.

To my point, life in the rural community without WI volunteers - a.k.a Women's Institute membership - would not be so cohesive. There would be no WI women to speak for the oppressed, the forgotten children, the mentally ill, the war refugees, new mothers, victims of modern slavery, victims of domestic violence, persistent public health issues, to name a few.

My other point, is to encourage recruitment. As one of the young women, who recently became a member, stated "I consider it an honor to belong and to learn from you women." You would be surprised how much these young women have to offer...and as mature women, we must be willing to mentor and to accept what they can offer.



One of the true joys of our community is that in the summer time everyone says "the summer really is the best time of year in Elgin" then when winter comes we all say "the winter really is the best time of year in Elgin"

This love of winter is often expressed by folks skating at the Eco Park's ever popular skating rink. If you're a reluctant winter-lover and find it difficult to venture out in the snow maybe you just haven't found the activity for you. Not everyone is a skater after all. If you'd prefer an activity where the risk of falling on the ice is a little smaller maybe snowshoeing is more your speed. A beautiful experience is, after a heavy snowfall to snowshoe around the Mapleton Acadian Forest trail (you'll see the sign for the trail head on the left just 4.5km down the Mapleton Road/rte 895). The silence in the forest after a heavy snowfall is something you really have to experience, and the blank canvas of snow makes birds and animal tracks really stand out (you can see who's still around in the winter and what they're up to).

If all this talk of the peacefulness of a winter hike makes you want to hibernate, maybe mountain biking is the thing that will make you wake up. If you've biked some of our trails in the summer, try one of our fat-bikes on them in the winter for a whole new experience. Some people (usually blackfly haters)

even say biking in the winter is better. If you've never been out before, or are just looking for a new place to ride, our trails are on the "Trailforks" app, see if there's some you haven't tried yet! Biking should be even better this year since the EEA's purchase of a trail groomer for the fat-bike trails.

Okay, but what if you're one of those folks who is reluctant to try new things? Have you been burned before by spending a lot of money on a new hobby only to found out really wasn't for you? Not to worry! The EEA has snowshoes and fat-bikes available to rent (pick-up available at the Elgin Country Kitchen and General Store) . This is also a great option if you already have gear and love these activities but you want to share them with friends or visiting family.

If you're still reluctant to give these activities a try, come out to Winterfest at the Eco Park where they will be set up to try for free! Elgin Winterfest which will be held Sunday February 19th and will have something for every age and athletic ability, even if your winter athletic preference is just sipping some hot chocolate around a Swedish fire log!

Would that make you happy and would you think you had a great relationship? Probably not. But what if your child was in the habit of coming to you to share with you their good times, their desires, their joys, how much they loved you, and their needs. Wouldn't you feel a part of their lives and special to them?

That is what prayer is. It is a conversation with our Creator God. And to make it even better, God knows us so well, he already knows what we are going to say, but He loves us so much that he wants to hear us say it in our own personal way. (Matthew 6:7&8 “And when you pray, do not keep on babbling like pagans, for they think they will be

heard because of their many words. Do not be like them, for your Father knows what you need before you ask him”.)

In some ways, prayer is frustratingly simple. It is not about the formula, the number of words, the kinds of words or the sentence structure. It is about a heart looking for the lover of their soul. In days gone by, the Priest in the temple was the only way the people could talk to God. God was not pleased with that. It was not enough for Him. He wanted each one of us to speak with Him on a personal level. He wanted a personal relationship with the people He created in His own image. That is why Jesus came. He gives us a way to reach out to Him in Love and to trust Him with our lives.

So maybe this year is when you discover prayer in a fresh way. Maybe out in the woods, or watching a sunset, or in a fishing boat and you want to share that awesome moment with someone. Share it with God. He is the one who gave it to you.

TEMPORARY FIX FOR MAIN STREET/MCNAUGHTON BROOK CULVERT

The New Brunswick Department of Transportation and Infrastructure (DTI) spent time in January working on a temporary fix on Route 106 in Salisbury where it crosses McNaughton Brook. The one-lane bridge replaces a culvert that failed due to erosion from a Fall storm.

The bridge will keep traffic moving at the location until DTI can conduct permanent repairs later in the year. The Town of Salisbury continues to work with DTI for updates on repairs to this provincial infrastructure, and both the Town and DTI appreciate the understanding and patience of residents and motorists.

A NEW ERA BEGINS FOR SALISBURY!

The new governing entity of Salisbury is the result of province-wide local governance reform by the New Brunswick Department of Environment and Local Government. This new governance model took effect on January 1, 2023. Under this process, the former Village of Salisbury merged with surrounding communities in the neighbouring Local Service Districts to form a new town.

While this is a new system of governance, the various communities located within the township will retain their individual community identities; therefore, mailing addresses will not change. FOR RESIDENTS OF WARD 3 ONLY (FORMER VILLAGE OF SALISBURY BOUNDARY)

UTILITY (SEWER) OPERATING ACCOUNT

The 2023 sewer rate is \$325.00 per unit, unchanged from 2022.

After March 1st, interest of 2% per month will be added to all overdue accounts dating back to the time of billing in January.

OVERDUE SEWER ACCOUNTS

Salisbury By-Law No. 45 (the Former Village of Salisbury By-Law, which remains in effect for Ward 3 residents), Relating to the Collection of User-Charges for the Sanitary Sewerage System, allows for the placement of court judgments (liens) and/or the disconnection of services on overdue accounts. Arrangements for payment plans with respect to delinquent accounts must be made.

New Brunswick SPCA will provide Animal Control services for Salisbury again in 2023. Please direct any dog-related complaints or inquiries to New Brunswick SPCA at 1-877-722-1522.

For information on stray or lost dogs, visit the New Brunswick SPCA Animal Protection Facebook page <https://www.facebook.com/newbrunswickspca>. Also, a reminder to those with dogs in Ward 3 (the former Village of Salisbury limits) that Highland Park and the Wetland Trail are NOT "dog parks," that is, dogs must be kept on leashes in public spaces such as these areas. Allowing your dog to run loose is a violation of By-law No. 41 (Animal Control By-law).

The municipality, and especially the wildlife, thank you for your understanding with regards to this.

DOG TAGS

Your 2023 Salisbury Dog Tags (for residents of Ward 3, the former Village limits) must be purchased by the end of March to avoid paying a late fee (a \$15.00 penalty will be added to the regular registration fee for tags not bought before April 1st). Registration fees are: \$10.00 for spayed or neutered dogs (this, factoring in the late fee, will increase to \$25 on April 1st); or \$30.00 if not spayed or neutered (this, factoring in the late fee, will increase to \$45 on April 1st).

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of three (3) months shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against distemper and canine parvovirus and must repeat this process every two (2) years thereafter. Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of four (4) months, shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against rabies and every three (3) years thereafter. In order to buy a dog tag you must show an official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital with the breed, colour and name of dog showing on receipt, as well as the veterinarian hospital tag number.

*** NO ONE WILL BE ISSUED A DOG TAG WITHOUT THE OFFICIAL RECEIPT. ***

Dog Tags can be purchased at either the Municipal Office (located at 56 Douglas Street) or at Silver Fox Veterinary Medical Centre.
