Congratulations to Kaitlyn Lutes and Karley Keith who were selected by World Performers Canada to dance on the national dance team representing Canada at the World Dance Cup in Braga, Portugal. The competition will take place in July, 2023.

Karley Keith (age 13) and Kaitlyn Lutes (age 13) attend A.K.A Dance studio located in Petitedcodiac, NB. Directed and taught by Alanna Munford, A.K.A

Dance opened in the village in 2013 with recreational dance classes and introduced competitive dance classes in 2017 and adding an assistant teacher Sarah Rourke to the studio. Karley Keith joined dance in 2013 and began competitive dance in 2017. Kaitlyn Lutes joined dance in 2018 in recreational and competitive dance.

New council members have been busy adjusting to their new roles. They have been participating in virtual Local Governance Orientation sessions to learn their leadership responsibilities and understand the effects of the new reform and how it impacts our new community borders.

Council Meetings are held on the first and third Wednesday of every month and are subject to change. Council may hold only one Regular (Public) Meeting during each of the months of June, July and August. If a meeting is to be rescheduled, the public will receive 24 hours advance notice under Public Notices on the community website: threeiversnb.ca

Meetings are open to the public and are located at the Municipal Office on 63 Main Street, Petitcodiac.

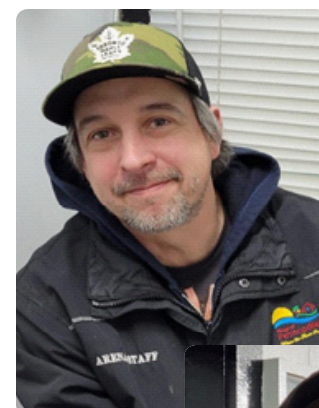

The Petitcodiac Arena Crew

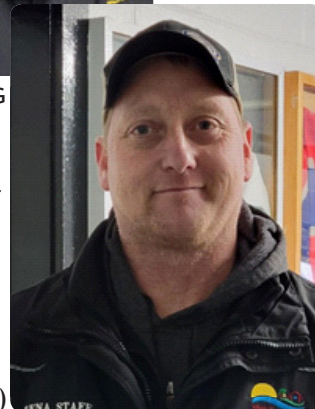

and jacks-of-all-trades. They are always there to help when needed.

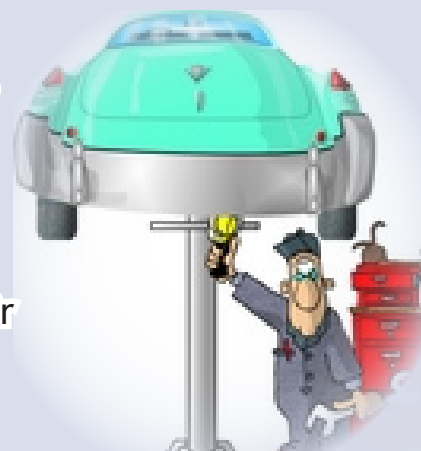

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VILLAGE OF PETITCODIAC HISTORY WALK

(continued from pg. 9 of last month's issue)

Before we continue with the History Walk, I want to take a quick moment to thank Canyon Hawkes for his countless hours of research and his valued assistance on the day of the walk. Another person who volunteered her time and friendly smile, was Margie Douthwright, our "Vanna" for the day, Thank you both!

To continue with our walk we are at the corner of Mill Road and Main Street. The location of the Westmorland Great Road, since the 1790s, surveyed and well travelled on foot or horseback. The road ran from Saint John through the Kennebecasis Valley to Sussex Vale. Then on from there through Portage Vale and Anagance to Petitcodiac where it crossed to the north side of the Petitcodiac River to run through Salisbury. From Salisbury the road circled around the "Bend" (as Moncton was called at that time) and continued through Fox Creek to Memramcook. Then to Dorchester, and on to Westcock via the old Frosty Hollow Road, to St. Anne's Anglican Church down the Queen's Road to Middle Sackville, over to LaCoup via the High Marsh Road, to Point de Bute Road as far as the Missiguash River, then into Amherst via the Eddy Road.

Stagecoaches would leave Saint John at 7 o'clock every Monday morning making the following stops: Ketchum's - Hammond River Bridge, Haye's - Norton, Cogle's - Sussex Vale, Walter's - at the portage (Kennebecasis), and then stop overnight at Halstead's - Humphrey's Corner, located near the portage on the Petitcodiac.

The Stage coach route was replaced in 1860 by the railroad. The first train through was at 8:00AM on July 18, 1860, and the roadway continued to be used as a wagon and freight road until the invention of the motor car. It then became the main two lane road from Nova Scotia to Saint John and points west. The two lane highway was first paved in 1937.

Research revealed that there had been a stage coach robbery in 1850. Three men were investigated in connection with the robbery, notably one of these men was dressed as a woman and had "blackened his face". These three men were Isaac Brown, David Faulkner, and Dickson Burn, but since there was no proof that these three were the actual robbers they were released. The exact location of the robbery was believed to be between Portage Vale and Petitcodiac, with no record that the strong box was ever recovered. It would have contained payroll for many businesses, factories and mills along the route.

Our group continued down Main Street with a few places of historical interest being noted including the location of fox ranches, and a garage owned by David Taylor. This garage, built in 1953 as a White Rose service station by Roy Brown was bought by Lloyd Taylor in 1959, and then changed to an Esso station. The garage then operated as an Irving garage from 1963 or 1964 until approximately 1986.

Our next point of interest was the location of the railroad spur line that served

the mills. This location is now used and maintained by the local ATV Club.

A brief note was given to the Humphrey house and the current Fawcett home, before our group paused at the former Doctor Mellish home where we showed a sketch of the Baptist church that was located on the site.

Across the street from that the next stop on the history walk was the former home of Doctor Caldwell, a practicing physician in the community from 1940 until his retirement in 1962. His home later became the restaurant "Two Brothers Dining Room."

Many were surprised when it was revealed that a bottling factory existed in Petitcodiac until 1896. This factory bottled water from a spring in Butternut Ridge, near Havelock where the plant was later moved to. Before the railroad, large freight wagons transported the spring water in barrels to the bottling facility.

Next on the tour was a brief mention of the home of Doctor Lockhart, noting that this part of our history will be in the 2023 walk.

We then stopped for a well deserved water break in front of the Petitcodiac Fire Department. The history of the local Fire Department was related to us by Gerald Jones, former Fire Chief who is writing a book on the history of the Petitcodiac Fire Department. I am one of many who is looking forward to his book to being completed. Thank you Mr Jones, I know we all learned a lot.

The current home of the Fire Department and Village Office was built in 1984, and while we were there the village office staff shared a list of previous Mayors:

1980 to 1992 Curtis Rogers (4 terms)

1998 to 2001 Jim Holt
2001 to 2008 Gary Armstrong (2 terms)
2008 to 2012 Peter Saunders (2 terms)
2012 to 2021 (2 terms)
2021 to 2022 Daniel Pollock
2022 to present Peter Saunders (3rd term)

Thank you for this listing.

The group of walkers was then treated to the sight of a vintage chamber pot...with a hole in the bottom of it! The purpose was to lead up to our next location, the property next to the Village Office where the Stagecoach Route turned to follow the river, known now as River Road.

This location, beginning in 1875 when Mr William Bray opened his business, was the tinsmith's shop for many years. The next owner was Nathan Steeves, and after his death the shop was converted to a private family home. At that time it was much less costly to repair a pot or pan than to buy a new one, and besides repairing all types of pots and pans they sharpened knives and replaced broken handles on pails.

As we continue, we pass the former

office and home of Doctor Rice the local dentist who opened his practice in 1946 after returning from the war.

We then came to the vacant lot where the first Village Office and Fire Department were located in the former Davidson Garage. Upstairs in this building were offices and a meeting room where Petitcodiac's first kindergarten classes were held. We were shown one of the original hand pumps that were used to fight fires, a special thanks to Doug Rogers, fire calls were sounded by the village "fire horn" and many folks recalled what their call signal was.

Ours was "15," one long, five short. In 1968 the first two-way radio system was put into use, consisting of a bass, radio, and three truck radios. The fire "cart" that was used in the Village to fight fire was donated to the Maritime Motorsports Hall of Fame and Museum and can be seen there.

We are almost at the end of the stagecoach road. Continue following along on our walk in the next edition of the Local News and Views where we'll find out what a bird cage has to do with local history and folklore!

Urban/Rural Rides completed their first official rides in the new expansion areas of Western Valley and the Northwest Region on February 15th. Volunteers and clients are excited to see the service operating in regions that struggle for transportation solutions. Urban/Rural Rides, using volunteer drivers, offers an affordable transportation option to assist people in accessing medical appointments and other essential life services.

What started as three small groups operating in Southeast NB - Rural Rides, Tele-Drive and the drive program of the Volunteer Centre of SENB has seen record growth since they decided to merge and work together as Urban/Rural Rides. The first phase of growth was to expand service to the entire Southeast NB area encompassing all of Albert and Westmorland Counties. In 2021, Greater



Fredericton Social Innovation contacted Urban/Rural Rides to expand and offer service in the greater Fredericton area. Expansion continues there with 5 municipalities in the region currently receiving service.

In 2022, the Province of New Brunswick assigned transportation as a mandate of the regional service commissions. The Western Valley Regional Service Commission and the Northwest Regional Service Commission then began to look for ways to provide transportation in their regions. Watching the expansion into the Fredericton region prompted both commissions to reach out to Urban/Rural Rides to expand and offer the same service in their regions as well.

The recruitment and preparation of volunteers began and both services officially launched in February 2023. Now, as the client base builds, recruitment will be ongoing to keep up with the demand.

The board and staff of Urban/Rural Rides are very excited to be able to assist those in need of transportation throughout all four regions. Since their inception, the goal has been to continue to promote and encourage creative and effective ways to solve the lack of transportation alternatives for residents of New Brunswick, and in particular, senior residents.

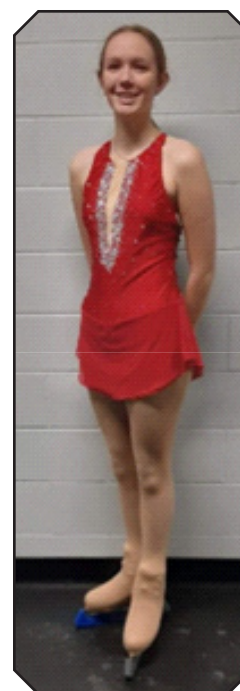
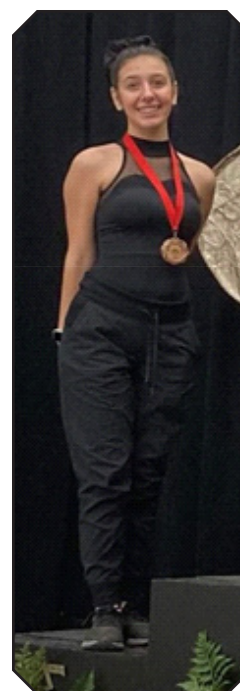


PETITCODIAC AND DISTRICT FIGURE SKATING CLUB

INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY (IWD) - MARCH 8: A BIT OF REALITY

IWD has its roots in labour movements that originated in the North America and Europe during the early 20th century. Though hugely political, we should not forget the overarching themes and goals of the original movement and on into the 21st Century which for the most part was equality. This article will not address any of the political rhetoric but try to focus on what we should never forget which is that everyone is created equal and should have a chance to live in peace and harmony.

According to the Human Rights Index 2014, the top ten countries exhibiting the most egregious violations of human rights are: Nigeria, Yemen, Myanmar, Iraq, Afghanistan, Somalia, Pakistan, Congo, Sudan and Syria - this country tops this list. The abuses against humans are horrible, but the abuses against women and children are very unsettling. The abuses include, but not limited to, human trafficking, rape (of women and female children), violence and societal discrimination against women, female genital mutilation (FGM) and other forms of cutting and mutilation, honour crimes (killing and beating of women) without legal recourse, children being forced into soldiers, child labour, child sex slavery, commercial sexual exploitation of children, food and medical aid deprivation, use of children as suicide bombers, forced child marriage, forcing women to be covered head to toe,

infanticide, and many, many more. (<https://www.therichest.com/> (2014)). Insider Monkey lists eight other countries that violate human rights. Note that those who rank these countries may use difference barometers to determine the worst but the point is clear.

We like to commemorate IWD but what are we really commemorating? You can be assured that of the women who suffer and die, and whose children suffer and die at the hands of their abusers, would give anything for moment's peace and to know they can awaken tomorrow having enough food to feed their children, to be free from fear of rape and marginalization, and be able to celebrate with us. Let's think more deeply about the meaning of International Women's Day and remember the women who have no knowledge that the world commemorates women. Equality is a foreign term to most women in the world. There are several organizations that work to support and empower women in the countries mentioned above. Once such organization is The Federated Women's Institutes of Canada (FWIC) which is a national organization that advocates for national directives in health, poverty, food safety, environmental preservation and community support. We can support women locally and through the FWIC as we remember those who are trying to survive under very difficult circumstances.

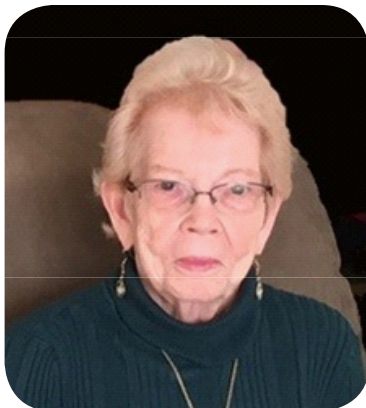

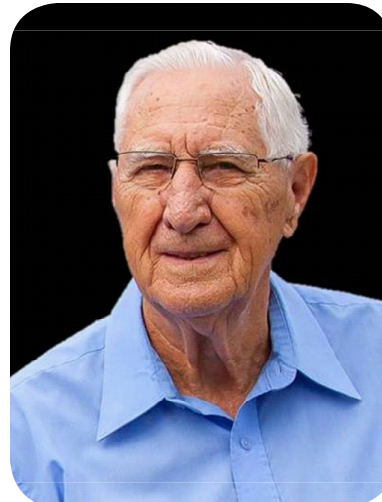

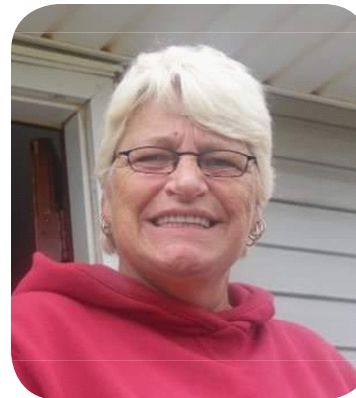

We wait for test results; storms to abate; the end of summer heatwaves; and winter storms to stop. We wait through heartache; madness; disappointment; and pain.

We wait and wait for His return. And "ever so patiently" He waits for ours.

ENSURE YOUR WEEKLY GARBAGE IS ACCESSIBLE

Weekly collection of garbage works best when we as residents ensure that the collector, who is often working alone on the garbage truck, can easily and safely access the garbage bags that we place roadside.

Please ensure that the bags are accessible and not buried in snow.

If they are in a receptacle or bin, ensure that the correct bags are in there.

The growing popularity of permanent-style bins at the ends of driveways has resulted in a few concerns as of late:

1) Some residents are treating these bins as personal dumpsters by putting all bags in them each week, regardless of colour. Please ensure that the bags to be collected that particular week are on top and are easily accessible. It is not the collector's job to sort through your bin.

2) Ensure that these bins do not fall into disrepair. There have been cases of broken boards and exposed nails, which are a safety hazard for the collector.

3) Please keep the bins clean, as they can attract pests. Rats nibbling on bin contents have been reported.

FOR WARD 3 (FORMER VILLAGE OF SALISBURY BOUNDARY): SEWER BILL INTEREST TAKES EFFECT IN MARCH

After March 1, interest will be applied to any overdue Salisbury sewer accounts (in Ward 3 - former Village).

Interest is 2% per month and is applied at the beginning of each month to all overdue accounts dating back to the January billing date.

The 2023 sewer rate is \$325.00 per unit, unchanged from 2022.

NO OVERNIGHT STREET-SIDE PARKING DURING THE WINTER (SALISBURY BY-LAW NO. 23)

For the purpose of snow removal, no person shall stand or park a vehicle on any highway within (Ward 3) of Salisbury between the hours of 1:00 am and 7:00 am from the first day of November in any year until the first day of April in the following year.

DOG TAGS - LATE FEES GO INTO EFFECT IN APRIL

Your 2023 Salisbury Dog Tags (for residents of Ward 3, the former Village limits) must be purchased by the end of March to avoid paying a late fee (a \$15.00 penalty will be added to the regular registration fee for tags not bought before April 1st).

Registration fees are: \$10.00 for spayed or neutered dogs (this, factoring in the late fee, will increase to \$25 on April 1st); or \$30.00 if not spayed or neutered (this, factoring in the late fee, will increase to \$45 on April 1st).

In order to buy a dog tag you must show an official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital proving your dog's vaccinations (eg. rabies) are up to date.

Dog Tags can be purchased at either the Municipal Office (located at 56 Douglas Street) or at Silver Fox Veterinary Medical Centre.
