## Mayors Honoured With Commemorative Medals

The Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Medal was created to mark the 70th anniversary of Her Majesty's Accession to the Throne as Queen of Canada. The medal honours residents of New Brunswick who, like Her Majesty, have been exemplary in their service to others.

The medal was awarded to approximately 3,000 New Brunswickers who have made a significant contribution to the province.

In April, Horizon Health Network will begin the process of a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) for Salisbury, Petitscodiac, Havelock, Elgin and surrounding area. The focus will be on a broad range of factors that impact health, including social, environmental, and economic issues; also recognizing that there are differences within and between groups of people in assessing what makes them healthy.

"The item pictured is called (in the trade), a hydrometer - there used to be two different ones available, one for the engine coolant and one for the battery fluid - they work off of density.

A hydrometer for the Engine indicates the freezing and boiling points of the coolant while a hydrometer for battery fluid indicates the specific gravity (hence the density)."

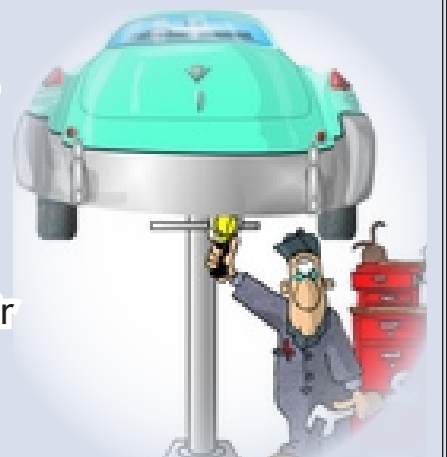

**Flyball Dog Sport Returns to the Petitcodiac Arena**

Flyball Agility Maritime Express (FAME) will be hosting our annual spring flyball tournament for the second year at the Petitcodiac Arena. Flyball is an action-packed sport featuring two teams at a time going head-to-head. Each team consists of four dogs racing in a relay format over four jumps to retrieve a ball and returning over the jumps. The height of the jumps is adjusted in each race based on the height of the smallest dog on the team. The course is 51 feet long and so each dog races 102 feet. Teams must complete the course without the dogs missing a jump or dropping their ball. Teams are in different divisions based on the speed of the team and the speeds range from 16

to 23 seconds. All dogs are welcome to play this sport and so fans will get to see a lot of different types of dogs. Teams at this tournament will be from all three Maritime Provinces.

The tournament will take place Saturday and Sunday, April 22nd and 23rd starting at 9:00am and ending around 3:00pm each day. The public is encouraged to come and watch the racing and there is no admission charge. **RCMP's Online Crime Reporting (OCR)**

gives New Brunswickers (in RCMP areas of jurisdiction), an alternate way to report certain non-emergency crimes without calling the police, or visiting a detachment.

*Online crime reporting is not meant to replace other forms of reporting crime. Always call 911 in an emergency. RCMP non-emergency line is 1-888-506-RCMP.*

**How does it work?**

- Visit OCR website at <https://ocre-sielc.rcmp-grc.gc.ca/en>
- The easy-to-use website guides you through a series of questions to give police information about your incident.
- At the end, you will receive an email confirmation with an incident number and a report, which can be used for insurance purposes. The entire report takes about 15 minutes.
- All reports submitted via OCR are reviewed by the RCMP, and are entered into the RCMP's record management system.
- A police officer will contact you if more information is required.

**Why should I use OCR?**

- Available 24/7
- No need to visit or call a detachment
- Provides report that can be used for insurance purposes
- Contributes important information to assess crime trends

**What can I report using OCR?**

- Mischief/damage to property under \$5,000
- Theft under \$5,000
- Lost property

**Do NOT use OCR if:**

- Stolen property includes firearms, credit cards, or personal identification (e.g. driver's licence or passport).
- The value of stolen or damaged property exceeds \$5,000.
- There are witnesses or video evidence of the crime.

Incidents that do not meet the criteria for OCR are directed to the RCMP's non-emergency line 1-888-506-RCMP.  
Call police or 911 immediately if the incident is still in progress, or if it is an emergency.

**Filing a false police report is a crime.**

As per the village's by-law, dogs are not permitted to run at large and must be on a leash when off the owner's property. Also, if a dog defecates on any public or private property other than the owner's property, it is the owner's responsibility to remove it immediately!

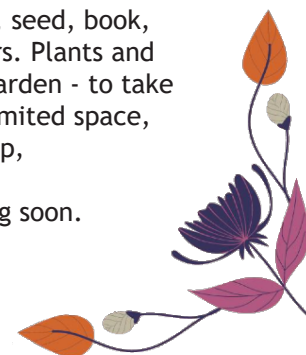

## WHAT A DOG'S NOSE KNOWS

What a wonderful world it would be if people could be as generous to humankind as dogs. Regardless of our faults, dogs provide unfailing loving care. A new study suggests dogs may be able to use their sniffing powers to know when someone is having a really bad day.

Who knew there is an aroma to being stressed, but dogs seem to detect it. In this, they have a huge advantage over humans. The nose of a dog has 220 million smell cells compared to a meagre 5 million in humans.

The powerful sniffers of dogs have long been effective in detecting cancer. A report years ago in the British Journal Lancet reported that a woman's dog repeatedly sniffed at one mole on her thigh but ignored others. When wearing shorts, her dog had tried to bite off the mole! She presented the issue to her doctor. The diagnosis was a malignant melanoma.

We now know that cancers contain alkanes and benzene derivatives which are not present in healthy tissue. Scientists have shown dogs can detect either a single chemical or a combination of them.

Bloodhounds have a reputation as the best in tracking down criminals. But other breeds, like poodles, are suited for medical careers. Studies show that dogs are right 99% of the time in diagnosing cancer. Another study showed that dermatologists and plastic surgeons were right just 66% of the time!

Clara Wilson, a doctoral student at Queen's University, Belfast, School of Psychology, is one of the authors of a new fascinating experiment. She set out to learn if your dog, or in fact anyone's dog, could smell your level of stress.

Wilson collected samples of sweat and breath from thirty-six people before and after they faced a difficult math problem - with a time difference of just four minutes. Apparently these people were not mathematicians, as the numerical test induced a faster heart rate and raised blood pressure. Four dogs trained in selecting scents from a line-up were then put to the task. The dogs accurately identified the samples taken from "stressed" participants, ignoring the "relaxed" samples from the same person.

"The research highlights that dogs do not need visual or audio cues to pick up on human stress," Wilson explains. "Dogs can smell stress from breath and sweat alone, which could be useful when training service dogs and therapy dogs." We know that dogs can offer great psychological support to people afflicted with anxiety problems. They also help those recovering from a traumatic injury.

But there are times, such as the death of a loved one, when the degree of stress in a dog's brain is overwhelmingly apparent. For instance, Dave Ross was a police dog handler who lost his life. His

German shepherd, Danny, attended the funeral. It was apparent to all that the dog was whining while lying at the casket. We don't know the nature of that German shepherd's anxiety. But one thing is certain. The dog was not begging for a bone. Man's best friend was hurting.

Future science will dig deeper into the workings of a dog's nose and brain. The foundation for such work has been laid by pioneering scholars like Marc Bekoff, Professor Emeritus of Ecology and Evolutionary Biology at the University of Colorado Boulder. His brain imaging work with animals shows evidence of their abilities to feel grief, fear, love, and compassion.

### VILLAGE OF PETITCODIAC HISTORY WALK

(continued from pg. 9 of last month's issue)

Hello again from the Three Rivers Community Museum History Walk.

First I want to apologise for an unintentional omission in last month's article, the Mayor's name for terms 2012 to 2021, Gerry Gogan. My sincere apologies to Gerry's family and his many friends in the community.

Last month's issue left us at the now vacant parking lot where the Fire Department was located until the new building was built.

The next stop on our walk is the office of Dr Nayak who came to Petitcodiac from Moncton in 1974.

Across the street is the location of the former Lounsbury's Garage. Many families in the area purchased a car or truck from the friendly staff over the years.

Next location of historical importance is the former home and office of Dr Richardson who moved from Nova Scotia in 1929 and continued his practice until 1980. During that time he served three years with the 14th Field Ambulance Company in World War Two.

And now the reason for the bird cage. Many former patients of Dr Richardson will remember the parrot he had in his waiting room. This parrot had a VERY colourful four letter vocabulary.

Some of his patients either laughed or blushed at the bird, my remembrance of the parrot is a bit different. At the age of four my parents took my younger brother and myself to visit the Doctor. He brought us into the office and informed our parents that we both had to have our tonsils out. Being curious I paid attention to what this man was saying. He was giving my parents dates and times we had to be at the hospital when the parrot started on a very long, very loud four letter word recital. I remembered clearly that the Doctor was saying that tonsils had to come out, the bird was swearing like a sailor, my mother covered my ears and all I heard was tonsils out, ears and next week.

Following our surgeries, I woke up, looked at my brother, then checked my ears... if, my four year old mind told me, tonsils had to come out by taking your ears off, I wanted to be sure the Doctor had put them back on, my brother's were fine and mine felt secure... Oh the imagination of children.

This brings us to the cement

bridge crossing the Petitcodiac River and at this location we left the Great Westmorland Road, Stagecoach Route, which continued along the current Renfrew Street, and we crossed the bridge, built circa 1949, replacing a steel bridge that had been damaged by flooding.

We saw that the river was coming back to its original life following the removal of the causeway near Moncton.

Noted areas included the waterfowl walking trail, the old railroad bridge that carried trains to Havelock, the location downriver of the Portage location and Monument and the World Famous Tidal Bore.

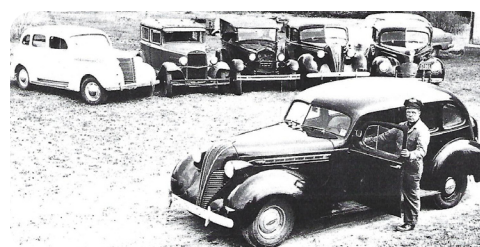
Once safely across the bridge we continued to the Petitcodiac School parking lot.

At this location other points of historical interest include the location of Drury Brothers trucking, before they moved to the former Mann garage on Main Street where Scotia Bank is now. Drury's started a Trucking business in 1931, with three brothers, Leslie, Selwyn, and Wilford. During the Second World War, two of the brothers Selwyn and Wilford served overseas. Leslie continued the business delivering goods to and from the local War Plant and trucking coal, wood and general to stores, farms and homes.

Next to that location, which later became a snowmobile shop, was the garage run by Alton (Booie) Jackson. He had a unique collection of 170 Hudson automobiles. He collected Model T's, Model A's and some general motors products. When he retired the Irving owned facility moved in 1996 to the current location on Smith Street.

Rogers Greenhouse, formerly located next to the Havelock rail line operated from circa 1967 to circa 2012, growing plants and flowers for many gardens in the community. A lot of property owners still have plants growing that were started by Mrs Rogers and her family.

Our group then turned and learned some of the history of the Petitcodiac School. According to the program from the official opening (which took place May 28th 1951), many noted individuals from Provincial and local governments as well as the school board at the time, were in attendance. These include: A.F. Saunders - Chairman, H. L. Adams - Secretary, and board members - Bert Beckwith, Thomas Bleakney, Kenneth Bishop, Ralph Colpitts, Harold

Fletcher, and Owen Gilmore. The program also notes the safety aspects of building construction at the time, including the use of fire resistant materials in the classrooms. Asbestos chalkboards, a new safety feature at the time, today recognised as hazardous materials.

Beside the school S.&S. Well Drilling ran their business until approximately 1998.

The last location on our walk for 2022 has a family history in the area. Still called Fawcetts by many, the location of Kent Building Supplies has seen many changes over the years.

Henry A. Fawcett moved his first saw mill to the present site in the spring of 1931. Three years later a matcher and resaw were installed for the manufacture of clapboards and other types of wood siding. A disastrous fire in 1947 destroyed the buildings and machinery, except for a small office building. By the end of 1947 a new sawmill and carpenter shop had been built, powered by electricity. In the spring of 1949, Mr Fawcett's son George Coleman joined the business and a further expansion was done to include all types of building materials and hardware. A second warehouse was constructed in 1951 and a new planing mill in 1956. In 1968 H.A. Fawcett and son took over the operation of the Texaco Garage and Service Station on the corner by the mill. In 1931 the property comprised nine acres with one sawmill and a small office building, later growing to 40 acres, with 15 buildings and a combined floor space of 46,500 square feet. Kent purchased the business circa 2009, and is still a valued business in the community.

At the conclusion of our walk, we were all invited to an open house with tea and sweets at the Maritime Motorsports Hall of Fame. All of the group enjoyed the delicious treats and the tour of the Museum. A BIG Thank You goes to Angela and her Staff.

Many of the articles, programs, maps and pictures are available for viewing at the Petitcodiac Community/War Museum, in Petitcodiac.

Some pictures were loaned only for the day of the walk and were returned to their owners. Thank you for those, they were certainly of great interest.

This year's walk in the fall of 2023 will include poodle skirts and saddle shoes... interested?

Just keep your scarf about

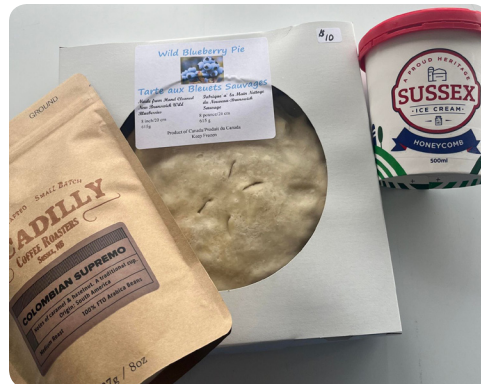

Communities such as Chetwyn, Prince George, 100 Mile House were visited with a final destination of Vancouver Island. Another wheel dipping occurred but this time in the Pacific Ocean near Victoria.

Overall, the Coasters 2022 tour was quite the adventure! His footprints leave reminders of the promise of springtime, not just in our hearts, but over the valleys and greening hills of life, and his robe sweeps across the broken dreams and makes them live again as the scent of "lily of the valley" fills our senses.

His hands were first to feel the beating hearts of the unborn, be it dove or man-child, and as long as seasons come and go his hands will control April as his loving reassurance reaches out and draws me closer to his heart.

Registration fees are:

For spayed or neutered dogs \$10 +  
\$15 late fee = \$25

For dogs not spayed/neutered \$30 +  
\$15 late fee = \$45

In order to buy a dog tag you must show an official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital proving your dog's vaccinations (eg. rabies) are up to date.

**OVERDUE SEWER ACCOUNTS**

Salisbury By-Law No. 45 (the Former Village of Salisbury By-Law, which remains in effect for Ward 3 residents), Relating to the Collection of User-Charges for the Sanitary Sewerage System, allows for the placement of court judgments (liens) and/or the disconnection of services on overdue accounts.

Arrangements for payment plans with respect to delinquent accounts must be made.

Since March 2, interest has been applied to any overdue Salisbury sewer accounts. Interest is 2% per month and is applied at the beginning of each month to all overdue accounts dating back to the January billing date.
