The Community Garden offers a fenced in area, tilled plots, water source, wheel barrow and various tools. Most often the garden plots will be available for planting in June (weather dependent).

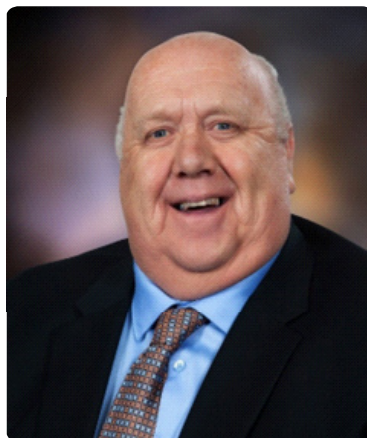

### From the Desk of Your MLA

Ross Wetmore, Gagetown - Petitcodiac

Spring 2023 is here, of that, there can be no question. We have experienced our first shirtsleeve weather and our first warm sunny Friday afternoon.

Folks living along waterways have been tuned in to the forecast for the last few weeks, in hopes that April showers will bring nothing more than an abundance of May flowers.

Of course, May 2023 will be unique in at least one respect. On May 6th, people all around the world will be watching as Charles III is officially crowned King of the United Kingdom, and his wife, Camilla, Queen.

Some will watch out of a sense of monarchist loyalty, others out of curiosity and to be part of an event as historic as the crowning of the King. There are still many in our community, and we're lucky to have them, who will remember when Charles's mother was crowned Queen Elizabeth II on June 2nd, 1953. The thirty-ninth sovereign to be crowned at Westminster Abbey. The first was William the Conqueror on December 25th, 1066.

When Her Majesty was crowned, it was a different world in many ways, but a look back shows us some familiar characters and challenges as the world continues to turn. In 1953 the world had emerged just eight years prior from the horrors and destruction of the second world war, and the Korean war which started in 1950 would end mid-1953. Dwight D. Eisenhower was President and was already five years into what has become known as The Cold War with communist Russia. In September of 1953 the UN rejected the Soviet Union's suggestion to accept the People's Republic of China as a member. We all know how that turned out and we are still dealing with these two world players in 2023. These days, Russia's invasion, and ongoing war with Ukraine shares headlines with Communist China's covert operations in Canada and worldwide.

In 1953 television was gaining traction but not every house had a set. For many decades, people had been

watching their world news on movie theatre newsreels. By the 1950's, though, newsreels were on the way out. The coronation of Queen Elizabeth was said to be the movie theatre newsreels last moment of glory. Perhaps people were there to see Peter Pan, Disney's latest film.

The big news in the world of medicine in 1953 came when Jonas Salk announced the polio vaccine. That year, Sir Edmund Hillary and Tenzing Norgay became the first men to reach the Summit of Mount Everest. And in 1953 Narcotics Anonymous held its first meeting, foreshadowing the drug crisis of today and all the misery it has brought to lives and to our communities.

The Trans Mountain pipeline delivered its first oil to Burnaby, B.C. in October of 1953. Engineering and construction of this massive project were completed in just over 30 months.

Fast forward seventy years and Trans Mountain continues to be in the news, and not in a good way. The expansion project, first proposed in 2012, and bought in 2018 for \$4.5 billion dollars by the federal government (us taxpayers), was in the news in March when the headline read- Cost of Trans Mountain expansion pipeline keeps climbing, now \$30.9 Billion.

1953 New Brunswick was led by Premier Hugh John Flemming, and our electricity needs were top of mind. The importance of hydro power generation to our grid, to complement thermal generation, was acknowledged and acted upon. In 1953 the hydro-electric dam opened at Tobique with the Beechwood Dam to follow in two years.

In 2023 our electricity needs, and where the electricity will come from, are still very much a topic of discussion and planning.

Thank you for sharing a few moments with me and looking back seventy years. I hope it has triggered some pleasant and interesting memories for you.

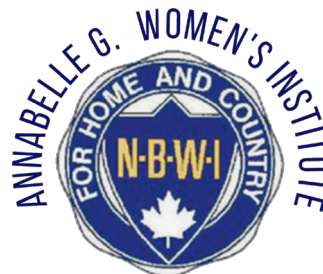

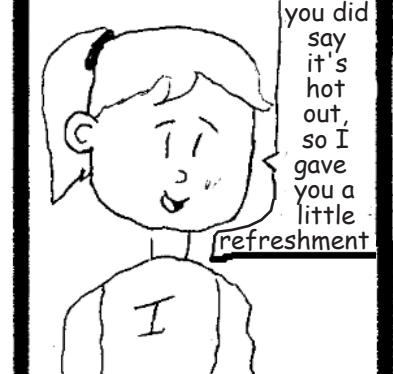

- ¾ cup white sugar
- 3 eggs (Add, one at a time, beating well after each addition)

Turn the mixture into a lined 8"x8" baking pan

Bake for about 45 minutes or until cooked at 350F

Turn out on wire rack to cool

### Where the Mayflowers Grew

Of all of nature's wonders I don't believe I've enjoyed the scent of a flower as much as that of the tiny "Mayflower". For such a little bloom, it's perfume us "intoxically beautiful" as are the pink shades of its illusive blossoms.

As a child, I looked forward to the yearly trek to the forest edges, the wood road and the greening knolls, alder swamps, and springtime groves. I ran ahead with my May-basket to search out the early "Arbutus" especially because they were hidden like treasures, often beneath the underbrush, waiting to be taken by surprise, their tendrils winding under shady pines, over trunks, across new moss, and beneath old autumn leaves; like little gems placed here and there by angels to delight the nostrils of the wanderer and lure the bare-feet of springtime foragers.

Oh! How I loved the Mayflowers. As a little girl I ran ahead of my best friend; she was an "asthmatic" during an era when puffers and modern treatments were still unheard of. She was as addicted to the lure of flora, of lush meadows, and winding arbours as I was to spending precious outings with her.

She would pause to catch her

breath now and then by an old tree trunk or lean awhile against the shady strength of a big birch, her strands of greying hair slipping out of the graceful bun as wisps of silver wrapped 'round her cheeks. She wore a wool blanket fastened by large safety pins that covered her legs and met the old boots that knew so many years. Her large frame carried her over familiar turf as eager as I to the task at hand. She knew every nook and cranny of the familiar forest ways. Her wheezing became as much a part of our outings as the soft breezes that rustled the leaves in autumn, but we were in springtime, and Mayflowers were in bloom.

I took it for granted that she'd always be there, a part of my world, blending with the landscape; Whether emptying her sap-pails in the grove in April, or transplanting flowers from the woods to enhance her front yard to make her little world a thing of beauty, she was a part of my landscape.

We were as excited at the discovery of "lady-slippers" as a miner at the discovery of a lode of gold (back then, we picked them). Where the spring woods formed a canopy over trilliums and small ferns, just waiting to stretch

their arms to greet the sunbeams.

Our Mayflower trek in springtime was an adventure, that led us through greening bogs, over deer-paths, through shafts of sunlight, over and around old wind-falls just right for balancing on. Squirrels chattered, rabbits darted and branches crackled.

As a child the familiar wheezing became as second nature to my ears as was the bird song through the springtime.

Mrs. Kay brought spring to the

world, she inhaled its fresh air and I took it for granted, for time was not on her side, I believe she knew she didn't have forever and wanted to live every moment of spring, drinking it in, savouring each moment, sharing those woodland walks, teaching me, not as a child, but as an equal. She never spoke down to me, unless pointing out a patch of Mayflowers.

Mrs. Kay died at 54. I was 10. The little cottage was lonely without her. She had a beautiful singing voice. She baked the best cookies, and old "Teddy"

sat and waited for days for her to come home. The sunlight danced sombre ballets through the windowpanes beside her chair and an old man sat beside the parlour stove with pipe-smoke swirling around his head and none of us knew what to say. As silence ushered her into the gates of Glory! In a little vase, in a quiet corner was a bouquet of dried Mayflowers.

Burdens

There seems to be more than enough hurt and brokenness in the world around us. And a lot of it is probably closer to home than we would like. It is far beyond the scope of this article to discuss addictions and mental illness, but I would like to talk about burdens.

The scripture I want to use is from Galatians 6:2-5 *"Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ. If anyone thinks they are something when they are not, they deceive themselves. Each one should test their own actions. Then they can take pride in themselves alone, without comparing themselves to someone else, for each one should carry their own load."* There is a lot that a person can unpack from this passage, but I want to focus on three words: "Burdens", "Abilities", and "Loads."

**Burdens:** A burden is a load that is too much to bear on your own strength. There are many people around us that are carrying burdens that are far beyond their ability to carry. They are in dark places and cannot get out on their own. This passage is telling Christ followers to step up and help to relieve the burdens that are holding others down. As the saying goes, "A burden shared is a burden halved". It allows the "Burden Bearer" to start to get out of their dark place and to begin to grow and stretch.

**Abilities:** Before a person can begin to help others with their burdens, they need to have a good idea of their own abilities. Don't worry about what others are doing and able to do. What can you honestly offer? It will not do anyone any good if you decide to try to help someone else when you are unable. Some self-examination is necessary and useful. Get wise advice from people who know you well. It is a great place to start. Know your true abilities, and your limitations.

**Loads:** A load is a burden matched to your abilities. It is what you can take on and manage well. It is the things in your life that you are responsible for and that you must answer for and no one else can. You cannot, or should not, put the blame on anyone else when you do not carry your own load. It is yours, and no one else's.

When properly put together, the three words can help to build a healthy society, when we reach out to help others, using the abilities we have, and when we take responsibility for our own lives and perform to the best of our own abilities.

## Pothole Season Is Upon Us

If you drive, you know Springtime not only brings warmer temperatures, it also reveals potholes born from a combination of cracking pavement and freeze-thaw cycles.

The cause of a pothole seems simple enough: heavy traffic on a roadway results in cracks forming, water gets in, freezes and expands during the Winter creating more surface pressure, and when it melts the asphalt crumbles in.

The fix, unfortunately, takes some time. A temporary fix in early Spring using cold-patch asphalt buys time until the hot-asphalt plants open around the beginning of May, after which plans are made for a long-term repair.

Should any potholes raise concerns within the boundaries of Wards 1, 2 and 4, please contact the New Brunswick Department of Transportation and Infrastructure at 1-833-384-4111 (dispatch line) or by emailing [transportnb@gnb.ca](mailto:transportnb@gnb.ca). NBDTI continues to maintain the roads in Wards 1, 2, and 4. However, we would encourage you to still inform Town Hall of your submissions to ensure we can track the requests in the Wards to assist in prioritizing requests in our ongoing conversations with DTI.

Meantime, should you notice a concerning pothole in Ward 3 (the former Village of Salisbury limits), please contact the Salisbury Department of Infrastructure and Public Works at 506-372-3243.
