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

Community Of Three Rivers Has a Great Opportunity for Our Gardening Enthusiasts

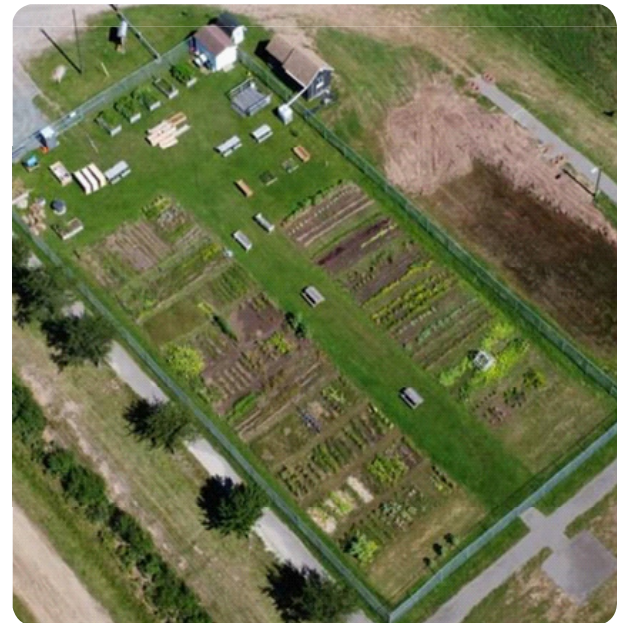
The Community Garden, located at 42 Maple St in Petitcodiac has garden space available.

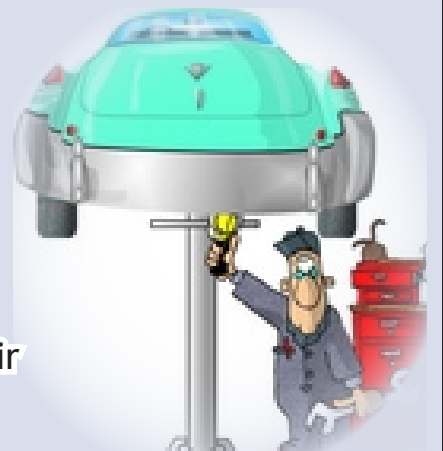

Summer is a time to relax, slow down and take in the amazing beauty of the province of New Brunswick and surrounding areas. It is important to rest, spend time with loved ones and reenergize. Unfortunately, for organizations like Urban/Rural Rides that are dependent on volunteers, when vacation time rolls around, the capacity to help others diminishes as resources are stretched thin to make sure everyone gets a chance to have a much-needed break and vacation. This shortage is even more evident in areas where a large portion of the industry is seasonal. Many of our dedicated volunteers return to work

If you would be willing to help seniors and low-income individuals access these life essentials by providing rides, please contact Urban/Rural Rides. Clients schedule their rides with the ride coordinator who then calls volunteers in that area to see if they would be available to do the ride. Volunteers can volunteer as much or as little as they wish and are reimbursed for their mileage.

Help strengthen your community by helping those most vulnerable who need a ride and a friendly conversation. You never know, you may make a new friend.

We owe a tremendous debt to the members of graduating classes from around 1900 and around 1920. They went and fought and won two world wars, the second will stand for eternity as a testament to how dreadfully humanity can behave.

The 1997 movie Contact, released before our grads were born, describes humanity as "capable of such beautiful dreams and such horrible nightmares".

This year's graduating class has experienced their share of each.

In their lifetime technology, and the immediate access to information has robbed them of the time to gather their thoughts.

We live in an age of up-to-the-millisecond news and information.

This year's grads were toddlers when Mickey Mouse Clubhouse, Roblox, Nintendo Wii, Spotify and Twitter were launched.

It may not be my place to say which has done more to advance the cause of peace, love and understanding, but I'm thinking it isn't Twitter.

Around the time they started school, the Space Shuttle program ended, Bin Laden was shot, and North Korea's leader died and his son took over. The Sandy Hook school shooting happened. Of more interest to our future grads at the time, Candy Crush was released.

Maybe the neatest thing they heard about being done by a person was when Felix Baumgartner broke the sound barrier without a vehicle. He travelled almost 840 mph in a skydive from 25 miles high. It was on the 65th anniversary of Chuck Yeager breaking the sound barrier in a jet. Think about that. It took us 65 years, but we figured out how to do it without a jet.

Around the time our current grads hit middle school Donald Trump was elected president.

Islamic terrorists murdered 22 with a bomb at an Ariana Grande concert in England.

In Saudi Arabia, the last country on earth to forbid women from driving, women were allowed to drive.

As high schoolers, they have lived through the COVID pandemic, watched as Russia attacked Ukraine and witnessed the death of a monarch.

They have seen a lot, heard a lot and experienced a lot so far in their young lives. Let's hope they have learned a lot, too.

A lot about those three most important topics I referred to earlier in this dispatch. Peace, love and understanding. At least let's hope they have learned enough for now.

If watching war has taught them to despise war and seek peace, they have learned enough.

If experiencing hate has taught them to love one another, they have learned enough.

And if they have learned that peace and love can be found through understanding and they seek to understand, they have learned enough.

I would leave this year's graduates with a couple of short lines from Gordon Lightfoot and his 1983 song *Salute*:

You got a lot more livin' to do
And a lot more lovin' too

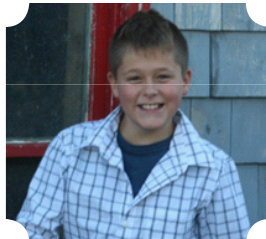

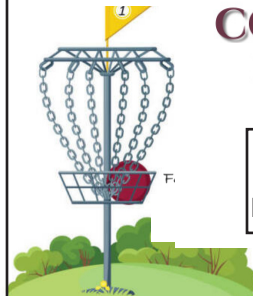

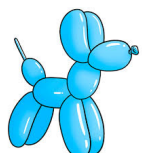

SLOW COOKED SALMON FOR TWO

In a bowl place 1 teaspoon of baking-soda add enough water to cover the salmon,

wash the salmon, then dry it with paper towel.

In a frying pan put 2 tablespoons of cooking oil.

Turn the stove on low to heat the pan. Place the salmon, skin side down on the pan.

Squeeze juice from half an orange and half a lemon over the salmon.

Pour 2 tablespoons of maple syrup over salmon

Brush the top side with 1 Tablespoon of oil.

Sprinkle salt, pepper, dried parsley, lemon zest over the top

Lay slices of the other half of the oranges over top.

Cover pan, do not turn salmon while cooking

Cook slow until fish is flakey or a temperature of 160F

To Roast The Salmon In The Oven Set Temperature At 300f

Increase maple syrup to 3 tablespoons and top with crushed (very fine) potato chips.

Do not cover pan when roasting in the oven.

Bios for each of the members of the Class of 2023 follow (in alphabetic order):

DONALD BEST: Donald is a 14-time Maritime Truck & Tractor Pulling 2wd Modified champion, a 6-time Owner champion in the 2wd Modified Class, and multi-time winner of the Truck Puller of the Year award. He has built every truck he has driven, competing for 40 years at events all over the Maritimes, Quebec, Maine, and Massachusetts.

DARRIN & ANN BUTCHER: Darrin started setting up cars at just 15-years-old and continues as an integral part of sons Cole and Jarrett race teams at the shop and at the track. Ann is always working behind the scenes with planning logistics and at-the-track. Besides being directly involved with their team the Butcher's have supported racing through sponsorships

and as a Director and president for the Maritime League of Legends. Their charitable efforts often intertwine with racing and include Special Olympics and Make A Wish.

GLEN COLE: Glen was a snowmobile champion in the early 70s. He was also an avid drag racer at Raceway Park, running a Dodge Dart. In the 80s he helped in the opening of East River Speedway in PEI.

LINWOOD GIBERSON: Linwood started racing in 1965 at Seabreeze Raceway (Lawrencetown, NS - just outside Halifax), then a dirt track - winning the championship there in 1968. In 1969 he was the Modified class champion at Halifax Dartmouth International Speedway. He stopped racing in 1970 due to a back injury but has continued contributing to motorsports through sponsorship.

ROGER LEBLANC: In 2015 he set a new world record for the longest wheelie on an ATV - 11.8 km. He holds numerous other Guinness World records, including most people of an ATV wheelie, longest triple ATV wheelie, longest tandem triple ATV wheelie, and longest wheelie on a UTV.

NATHALIE RICHARD: She is the most-decorated North American rally co-driver, was inducted in the Canadian Motorsports Hall of Fame in 2020, is a 10x North American champion, 5x Canadian champion, 3x US champion. Nathalie is an executive and founding member of Women in Motorsports Canada and has hosted TSN/RDS broadcasts of Canadian Rally championship events. Her racing career started in 1999 and spans over two decades, mostly competing with her brother, Pat until he retired in 2014 for health reasons. Nathalie continued driving after that at major rally events worldwide with various co-drivers.

SCOTT SINCLAIR: Scott started his motorsports journey as a child growing up on a farm - building cars and fixing any machinery that needed fixing. He's owned close to 70 cars and is still adding to that number. His first foray into motorsports was drag racing then moved to motorcycles. At just 20 years old he worked in San Diego on Ferrari cars for the movie Ferris Bueller's Day Off. He has built numerous race cars. He has done motorsports photography for several years and his work has been featured in trade magazines. He is the PEI Director for the Maritime Motorsports Hall of Fame. 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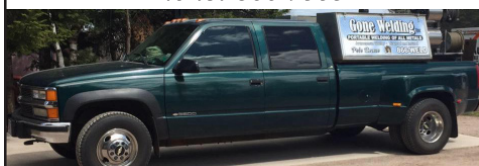

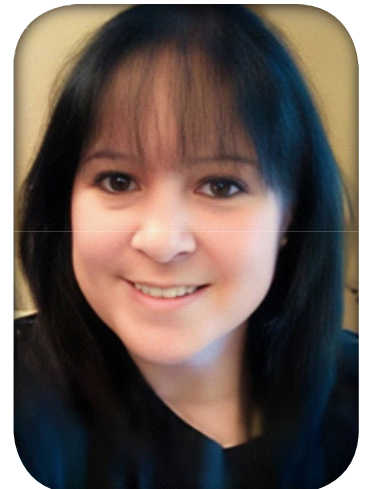

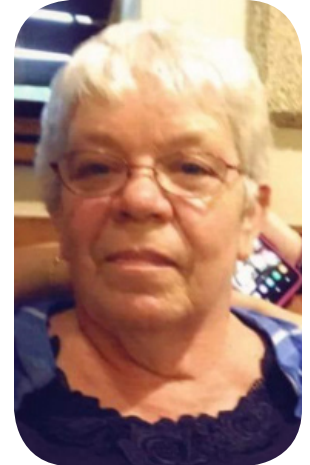

Town council news

Salisbury Town Council has had a busy start to the month, approving three new by-laws for the community, as well as departmental policies, contracts, finalizing a land purchase, considering a rezoning request, entering into a grant agreement, and receiving the green light for a much-needed sewage infrastructure project in Ward 3.

Regarding the infrastructure project, Provincial and Federal funding through the Integrated Bilateral Agreement (IBA) will allow for the stabilization of a berm that protects the Petitcodiac River from the sewage treatment facility's polishing pond. While the Ward 3 utility account will cover approximately \$26,000 of project costs, the contribution from Ottawa and the Province will cover 93 per cent of the total bill, \$232,000 and \$129,000, respectively.

Also approved by Town Council on May 8th was a three-year annual grant of \$5,000 from Ward 3 to the Salisbury Farmers and Artisans Market at the big red barn on Main. The market, which has undergone significant growth, has become a very popular draw for shoppers.

Plans continue to progress for a new fire station for Salisbury Fire Rescue. JOST+ Architects has been retained for professional services for the project. Land was previously secured for the development on Main Street, Salisbury. Meantime, Council has ratified new policies for Salisbury Fire Rescue concerning Recruitment and Attendance.

Town Council has agreed to consider a rezoning request for a property located at the corner of Homestead Road and Route 112, just



beyond the Ward 3/Ward 1 boundary. The applicant is asking for the property's zoning to be changed from Rural Area to Commercial-Industrial. There's a plan for a trucking depot/warehouse with office space. A public hearing has been scheduled for June 12.

A long-running logistical headache in the village ward is being rectified. Plans for a couple projects along Bleakney Road led to an agreement to purchase a strip of land from CN. Bleakney encroaches on CN property, forcing the municipality to pay the railway for pricey permits whenever doing any roadwork here. A quick negotiation has resulted in the Town securing the property it needs for \$20,000 plus tax, which is only slightly higher than the permitting fees.

Three new by-laws for Salisbury have received third and final reading from Town Council -- By-law No. 5: Respecting Driveway Culverts and Entrances; By-law No. 6: Respecting Sewerage and the Collection of User-Charges for the Sanitary Sewerage System in Salisbury; and By-law No. 7: Building By-law. Salisbury Town Council next meets on Monday, June 12, 2023, at 7:00 pm. The meeting, to be held in Council Chambers at 56 Douglas Street, is open to the public.
