From the Desk of Your MLA Ross Wetmore, Gagetown - Petitcodiac

On June 28th, Scott and Lindy Brown's dairy barn in Portage Vale burned down, killing 33 of their 36 dairy cows. A devastating blow for this young farming family. They had been milking for the past five years. Since the fire, the community has rallied around the Browns, including a go fund me page: **SUPPORT FOR SCOTT AND LINDY BROWN.**

The page has many comments of support and encouragement for the Brown family along with testimonials of Scott and Lindy are such good neighbours and community members. It is always heartwarming to see the outpouring of love and kindness from a community when tragedy has struck some of their own. It is in our nature to want to turn bad into good for others.

I am hoping to have good news sooner than later regarding our new Petitcodiac Community Health Centre. Patience has sometimes (often times) been a difficult thing to maintain when pushing for timelines on this critical health infrastructure and healthcare delivery for our people. Please stay tuned and please stay patient.

Many folks all around our province watched and worried as the

wildfires out west and up north brought devastation and destruction beyond imagination for many areas, impacting family and friends. Of course this past May we had our own brush with wildfires, along with Nova Scotia.

While we have zero control over natural causes of fires, we have one hundred percent control over human causes. Smoky the Bear's message never ages. Only YOU can prevent forest fires. For the past couple of weeks, kids have been telling adults-

Don't use the 'S' word...
The one that ends with 'chool'.
Yet here we go again.

Good luck to students, teachers, parents, bus drivers and everyone involved in making our schools vibrant. Plus, a great big round of applause for all the volunteers who make up such a large part of our school's learning, nutrition and extra-curricular activities.

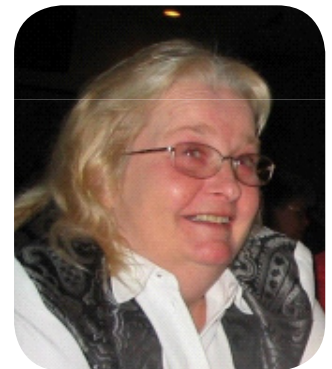

If you read my article from last month, I wrote about Loving God and pursuing a relationship with Him. This time I want to focus a bit on what that will look like in our daily lives. In other words, "How does my Love for God show in my life?"

First, I think it is important to say that if my relationship and Love for God makes no difference in how I live or relate to others, then it is an empty relationship and not of any value. You may think I am harsh in saying so, but there are times the truth is a harsh reality.

Any relationship that affects my life and my behavior in positive ways is an effective, real and valuable relationship. Anything short of that is more of a burden.

In James 2:20, we read "You foolish person, do you want evidence that faith without deeds is useless?" (And you thought I was harsh) James is saying that if we have faith in God, which is a way of loving Him, and it doesn't change the way we live, then it is a useless, dead faith.

Our Love and Faith in God should motivate us to humbly come to Him and His word, and say "Lord, how do you want me to live and behave?" And we need to take His answer, not the answer we would prefer to hear.

Salisbury Happenings

Salisbury Wins National Participation Prize!



With the help of over 750 residents and 50+ organizations, the Town of Salisbury has been named Canada's Most Active Community as part of the fourth edition of the ParticipACTION Community Challenge. Throughout the month of June, Salisbury residents and organizations tracked over 10.4 million minutes of physical activity as part of the national physical activity and sport challenge, winning the Municipality a \$100,000 prize towards recreation activities.

"Salisbury's residents now look forward to the month of June to showcase to other Canadian municipalities on a friendly-competition level how active our community is," says Mayor Robert Campbell. "Winning this title in 2023, the first year with the Town's new municipal boundaries, is a testament to our sense of community and showcases how being active is in our nature."

Throughout the month-long

challenge, the Town had over 70 sessions of free, public activities to get residents moving, ranging from walking groups, Zumba classes, and kayaking/hiking excursions to Learn to Play Clinics (baseball, soccer, and pickleball), a kick-off event, and a ball hockey tournament. Countless community partners held their own activities for ParticipACTION and/or tracked the Move Minutes of their team(s) and staff throughout the month. In addition to this, the Town

hosted multiple age-friendly activities at local nursing homes, had a Council versus Staff challenge, and partnered with the BGC Salisbury for a \$5,000 grant to get residents moving throughout the month.

"Our team of staff and volunteers began working on this

year's efforts in early 2023, had pop-ups throughout the community to encourage residents to download the ParticipACTION app in May, and had banners and lawn signs throughout the Town by the start of June," says Austin Henderson, Chief Administrative Officer of Salisbury. "We look forward to working with residents to determine how the prize can keep our community moving and would like to thank the volunteers, organizations, and residents

who all played an essential role in winning the national prize".

In 2022, Salisbury was named New Brunswick's Most Active Community, winning the \$15,000 provincial prize. This June, the Town issued a survey at the start of the challenge requesting input from residents on what they would like last year's prize to be spent on, with 54% voting for the option to hold off on spending the funds in pursuit of the \$100,000 prize in 2023. In the coming weeks, the Town will be issuing an updated survey with a number of more concrete plans for community input to determine what the prize will be used for.

Salisbury has participated in the national challenge for the past three years. From June 2-30, the Town held the top spot for the number of minutes tracked in New Brunswick, and fluctuated from first to fifth place Nationally, often competing with the City of Toronto, the City of Red Deer (2022 National Winner), and the Town of North Grenville (2021 Winner).
