
- Be on alert! If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol don't use the stove or stovetop.
- Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, boiling, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- If you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- Keep anything that can catch fire oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains — away from your stovetop.

If you have a small (grease) cooking fire and decide to fight the fire...

- On the stovetop, smother the flames by sliding a lid over the pan and turning off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled.
- For an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the

If you have any doubt about fighting a small fire...

- Just get out! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire.
- Call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number from outside the home.

DO YOU LIKE HELPING OUT IN THE KITCHEN and cooking up tasty snacks for your friends and family? Preparing yummy treats can be lots of fun, but it's important that kids who like to cook know how to be safe in the kitchen. These tips can help you figure out what you're old enough to do on your own-and when it's time to ask an adult for help.

Getting Started: Before you get cooking, you need to get a grown-up's permission. If you plan to use a recipe, look it over with a grown-up first to decide what you can do on your own and what you need help with. And once you get started, never be afraid to ask for help. Even the best chefs rely on their assistants to help them out in the kitchen.

Helping Out is Fun: From mixing up cake batter to cutting shapes out of cookie dough, helping out a grownup in the kitchen can be lots of fun. So if you're not old enough yet to cook on your own, not to worry; being the chef's helper is the most important job in the kitchen.

Cooking for All Ages: All kids are different—and a grown-up should always decide what is safe for you to do in the kitchen—but here are some guidelines that you can use.



- Get ingredients out of the refrigerator
- Measure and mix ingredients together in a bowl
- Pour liquids into a bowl
- Wash fruits and vegetables off under cold water
- Use a cookie cutter to cut shapes out of cookie dough or sandwiches
- · Lick the cake batter off of a spoon (yum!)
- Open packages
 Use a butter knife to spread frosting, cream cheese, peanut butter or soft cheese
- Peel vegetables
 Measure ingredients
- Stir ingredients in a bowl
 Set the table



- Begin to follow a recipe
- Open cans
 Use electrical kitchen appliances, such as a microwave oven, when a grown-up is present
- Use a grater to shred cheese and vegetables
 Turn stove burners on and off and select oven temperature when a grown-up is present
- Help plan the meal



- Operate the stove or oven without an adult present
 Heat food up in the microwave without an adult present
- Drain cooked pasta into a colander
 Take a tray of food out of the oven





Here are a couple of small pickle recipes

CUCUMBER PICKLES
Take 4 cups small
cumbers (sliced thin)
Sprinkle a ¼ cup of salt over

Cover with cold water
Lay a tea towel over,
and set over night
In the morning drain,
then put in a cooking pot
and add 1 sliced onion
In a small bowl mix:

- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 teaspoon celery seed
- 1 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/4 teaspoon turmeric Sprinkle over vegetables

Pour enough vinegar to almost cover Let come to a simmer for about 10 minutes

Bottle, makes about 3 small bottles



MUSTARD PICKLES

- 8 cups cucumbers cut in cubes
- 2 cups diced onions
- 2 cups cauliflower cut in small pieces

Put all vegetables in a medium pot Cover with boiling water and 1/3 cup salt

Let this set for 2 hours, then drain Sauce:

- 2/3 cup flour
- ullet 1 ½ tablespoons dry mustard
- 2 ½ cups white sugar
- 2 ½ cups vinegar

Cook over medium heat until thickened as a sauce

Mix 1 ½ tablespoons turmeric with ½ cup cold water

Add to sauce

Pour the sauce over the vegetables and cook until they turn quite clear Scold 3 small bottles (may need 1 more)

Put hot pickles in bottles and cap right away






GET A KIT

A basic emergency kit should contain the following supplies:

- Water (two litres per person per day)
- Non-perishable food (Canned and dried goods, energy bars, etc. Replace each year.)
 - Manual can opener
- Wind-up or battery-powered flashlight (and extra batteries)
- Wind-up or battery-powered radio (and extra batteries)
 - Candles and matches or lighter
- First aid kit
 - Extra cash money (smaller bills and change)
 - Spare house and car keys
 - A copy of emergency plan and contact information
- Presciption medications
- Special items such as infant formula, equipment for persons with disabilities or food, water and medication for your pets or service animal.

Check at home to see if you have everything you need.

A Number of Ways to Report Criminal Activity

If you see crime happening in your area, or wish to report that criminal activity has taken place, there are a few different approaches to take:

- (1) If an incident is still in progress or is an emergency, please call 911.
- (2) There is also the daytime non-emergency phone number for Southeast District RCMP Caledonia Regional Detachment, which is located at the corner of Pine Glen and Whitepine in Riverview: 506-387-2222.
- (3) There is also the Online Crime Reporting (OCR) website (https://ocre-sielc.rcmp-grc.gc.ca/en) that was introduced in recent years.

Types of crime that can be reported using this online tool are mischief/damage to property under \$5,000, theft under \$5,000 (including theft of a bicycle and theft from a vehicle under \$5,000), and lost property.

This tool can take the place of having to phone the province-wide RCMP non-emergency line (1-888-506-RCMP) or visiting a detachment such as Caledonia.

At the end of filing a report using OCR, you will receive an e-mail confirmation with an incident number and a report, which can be used for insurance purposes.

(4) Another option is the New Brunswick Department of Justice and Public Safety's Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods (SCAN) Investigative Unit.

SCAN works closely with policing services such as the RCMP to remove the criminal element from communities.

The difference is: with the SCAN Act not being criminal legislation, this is a civil law approach through Court of King's Bench in which property owners and occupants are held responsible for criminal activity such as prostitution, drugs, illegal liquor, illegal gaming, illegal firearms and organized crime, including fortified houses.

Another difference under the SCAN Act as opposed to a criminal investigation is that the complaint remains confidential and it is the SCAN officer, not the complainant, who appears in court.

SCAN is a community-driven program in that it takes complaints directly from public complainants who are affected in cases where safety is an issue.

The goal of SCAN is to make an area feel safe again through both non-judicial and judicial actions.
