## Local Boy Makes National Team

Oliver Woodworth, at only 12 years of age has made the U13 Table Tennis Canada National Team.

He is a member of the Greater Moncton Table Tennis Club, at the Moncton Coliseum, where he trains three evenings a week and practises 8 to 10 hours a week at home.

In his two years, Oliver has already played tennis in 25-30 competitions. His high hopes are that

one day he will make the Olympic Team.

No New Brunswick table tennis player has made the National team since 1974, so Oliver is excited that he is the first one since then.

Ingrid McPhee, from Saint John, was the last one to make the National team. It is with pride that McPhee, now president of the Greater Moncton Table

Tennis Club, shares this accomplishment with this young athlete, Oliver. Currently she is the New Brunswick Women's Champion and Mixed Champion and is training very hard for the Atlantic Seniors Championship next year.

Good news for the teams, the Greater Moncton Table Tennis Club is hosting the Atlantic Championships tournament in 2024.

## PRs Pathers Golf Captured Provincial Title

The Petitediac Regional School Panthers golf team captured the provincial title for "A" schools for the 2nd consecutive year on Friday at the Restigouche Golf Club in Campbellton.

Team members include Mark Arsenault, Chase Burgess, Myles Colpitts, Oliver Colpitts, Heath Mann and Cole MacPhee.

Chase (70: 1st low gross) and Cole (78: 2nd low gross) won the gold and silver medals for their individual performances. McKinley Green of Grand Manan captured the bronze medal.

Oliver (88), Mark (89), Myles (96) and Heath (100) rounded out the team scoring that was 22 strokes better than 2nd place Polyvalente Roland Pepin of Campbellton. Other teams competing included schools from Hillsborough, Hartland, St. Quentin, Grand Manan, Rogersville and Saint John.

This marks the Petitediac Panther's 9th high school provincial title since 2000.

## From the Desk of Your MLA Ross Wetmore, Gagetown - Petitcodiac

A new Petitcodiac Health Centre is planned for 2025.

In a recent Global news report, the age of our health centre and the dissatisfaction of the whole community was reviewed. Over the last several years, it has been a frustratingly slow process to get a timeline for a new centre. It appears the commitment has been there, but getting the date was the roadblock. between time, I would like you to know that public service as an MLA is one of the greatest honours of my life and I am grateful.

I would like to add a word for those folks who may be considering taking a run for office and have concerns about how they might handle bitter defeat at the polls.

#### WINTER OVERNIGHT STREET PARKING BAN

During the winter months from November 1st through to April 1st, The Community of Three Rivers, Ward 2 (Petitcodiac) has a By-Law in place that does not allow parking on any of our streets between the hours of midnight to 7 am due to snow clearing operations. This allows our works department crew to complete the task of snow removal in a safe and timely manner.

#### BY-LAW NO. 40 Parking of Vehicles

(a) In the months of November, December, January, February and March between the hours of 2400 and 0700 of any day no person shall park or leave a vehicle unattended on any street within the Village due to snow clearing operations.

\*Vehicles left on Village streets will be towed away at owner's expense\*

#### Impounding of Vehicles

(a) No person shall take possession of vehicle removed or impounded under this by-law, until all costs and charges for removal, care and storage of such vehicle have been paid.

We request that you respect this By-Law and park overnight in the parking lot on River Road. *Parking of large vehicles is not permitted overnight on any streets or in any parking lots maintained by the village. Daytime street parking for large vehicles is only allowed for short periods of time for business purposes only.* Thank you for your co-operation.

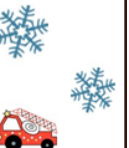



In attendance for the ribbon cutting were Cathy Drury, Director of the Petitcodiac Community (War) Museum; Local History Walk Guide and researcher, Karen Hall-Middleton, Councillor; Community of Three Rivers Councillor the Honorable Tammy Scott-Wallace; NB MLA and Minister of Tourism, Heritage and Culture, Leslie Gogan and Ben Gogan; Jerry's wife and son; and Amy O'Keefe, New Horizons.



This addition to Maple Street Park is the result of the sponsorship from many local businesses, organizations, and individuals, along with the effort of many volunteers. Signage is installed at the site paying tribute to Jerry, sharing the history of the site, and thanking our sponsors. It was a beautiful sunny day, and it was heartwarming to see over 300 people come out for the event and enjoy a BBQ, ice cream, Super Mario Bus, bouncy castles, miniature ponies, and live music. Remembering the Veterans on Remembrance Day, November 11th, is an important part of every Community in Canada, something we must continue to do. 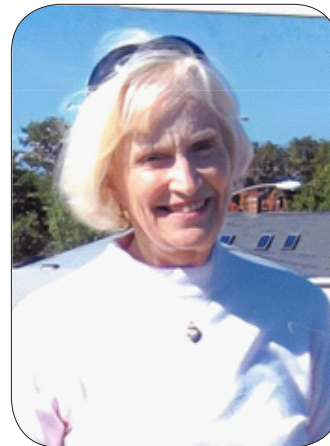

Ellie, as she was known to family and friends, was preceded in death by her parents and her former spouse, John Douglas Northrup.

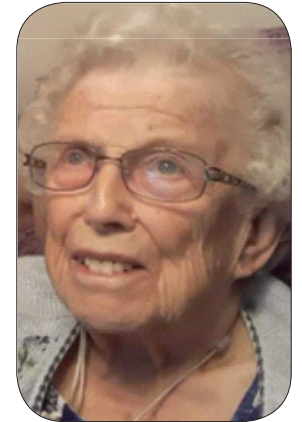

## Public Input Sought on Proposed ATV By-law

Salisbury Town Council has initiated a public consultation process to consider regulating all-terrain vehicles (ATV) on some streets within the Town.

Residents may recall that this process began in 2022, but was paused in light of local governance reform. To reflect the changed municipal landscape, the public consultation process has been re-initiated.

First reading of the proposed by-law took place at the October 10 regular meeting of Town Council. Prior to any subsequent readings, summary information of all public input received will be presented to Town Council as the consultation process unfolds. Changes and amendments to the by-law can occur all the way until third reading and enactment of the by-law.

As a reminder, until such a time where the by-law is in place and approved by the Province, it remains illegal to operate an all-terrain vehicle on the streets of the Town of Salisbury.

## Lighting of Open Fires Prohibited in Salisbury Ward 3 (Former village limits)

A reminder that the lighting of any open fire in Salisbury Ward 3 (village) is prohibited.

With respect to this, any fire must be in an approved wood burning appliance as outlined in the Salisbury fire by-law (By-Law No. 48, which can be read in its entirety at [www.salisburynb.ca](http://www.salisburynb.ca)).

Salisbury Fire Rescue reserves the right to order any fires that are not in compliance to be extinguished.

Land Cleared for New Salisbury Fire Hall

Site-clearing has taken place at the location of the future Salisbury Fire Rescue Station (3013/3017 Main Street, Salisbury). As design work continues in the coming months, the Town looks forward to sharing additional details and renderings.

Highland Park Washroom Under Construction

Construction began in October on a new ADA-compliant (wheelchair accessible) four-season washroom facility at Highland Park.

The construction area between the new washrooms and the wells will remain taped off for the duration of construction. This means that throughout construction, certain trails in the upper level of the park are closed.



The Wetland Trail remains accessible from the upper level via the outer perimeter of the trails. The playground will also remain open.

The washroom will be an 18' x 14.5' ICF building with two washrooms, one of which will be fully accessible. This will replace the former washroom building, provide an accessible facility with additional amenities (such as changing tables), and ensure that the splashpad well is not required to feed washroom facilities too. The project is expected to be completed in late 2023.

ParticipACTION Community Challenge Grand Prize Survey

Salisbury's Director of Recreation and Wellness recently made a presentation at Town Council on the findings of the recent online survey in which residents were asked for their thoughts on how to invest its ParticipACTION winnings.

Following the nationwide 2023 ParticipACTION Community Challenge, the Town of Salisbury received a \$100,000 prize for first place overall. This is in addition to a \$15,000 prize from 2022 for placing first in New Brunswick.

The presentation by Massimo Caracristi on September 25 provided an overview of the survey responses and a verbal update on project(s) status: (1) The survey validates that trail connectivity is the primary request for large infrastructure and the Town continues to actively work with funding partners in hopes of constructing a connection element in 2024. Numbers two and three in the overall ranking were (2) a New Outdoor Rink and (3) Additional Court Space at Highland Park, while (4) a Highland Park Amphitheatre, the project with the fourth highest score overall but still the second-most first place votes in the survey, continues to be pursued through other funding avenues without a ParticipACTION contribution. (5) The option scoring fifth overall was Outdoor Fitness Equipment at Highland Park.

Meantime, the survey's ranking of preferred passive infrastructure was led by Playground Equipment in former Local Service Districts, followed by: Acquiring more Rental Equipment, Concrete Ping Pong Tables, and a Shuffleboard Court.

Other projects mentioned include Pool Enhancements, Lawn Bowling, and Gym Flooring at Salisbury Regional School.
