




It's hard to believe that have we reached the half way point of our season.



symptom can be a fatal attack. Most environmental toxins are a concern. people lead their lives unaware of the ticking time bomb within, neglecting lifestyle changes that could radically reduce the risk. The fact is, preventing heart disease needs to be a lifelong

practice, starting in childhood. Pediatric cardiologists and researchers who focus on identifying and mitigating risk factors for cardiovascular disease in children and young adults are proving the case. Studies show that obese children have higher levels of insulin resistance and inflammation than their non-obese peers, both of which are known risk factors for heart disease. Obese children also have stiffer arteries. which can lead to high blood pressure and other cardiovascular problems.

But heart health among children

can begin even earlier in their lives, including before birth. Long before childhood obesity becomes a risk factor for heart disease, low

Heart disease is called the birth weight, maternal smoking during "silent killer". Why? Because the first pregnancy, and childhood exposure to

> In one study, children who were exposed to second-hand smoke had higher levels of atherosclerosis, or the buildup of plaque in the arteries associated with cardiovascular disease, than children who were not exposed.

> The list of health problems caused by second-hand smoke is already a mile long. Adding increased risk of cardiovascular disease for children may not get the headlines this research finding deserves. But any adult neglecting to keep kids safe from smoke is guilty of the kind of child abuse that lasts a lifetime.

Cholesterol is another common consideration in cardiovascular disease. While cholesterol is often associated with older adults, it is also an important factor in the development of heart disease in children and young adults.

In another study, researchers found that children and young adults with elevated levels of LDL cholesterol, continued on pg 17

#### WINTER OVERNIGHT STREET PARKING BAN

During the winter months from November 1 st through to April 1 st, The Community of Three Rivers, Ward 2 (Petitcodiac) has a By-Law in place that does not allow parking on any of our streets between the hours of midnight to 7 am due to snow clearing operations. This allows our works department crew to complete the task of snow removal in a safe and timely manner.

# BY-LAW NO. 40 Parking of Vehicles

(a) In the months of November, December, January, February and March between the hours of 2400 and 0700 of any day no person shall park or leave a vehicle unattended on any street within the Village due to snow clearing operations. \*Vehicles left on Village streets will be towed away at owner's expense\*

#### **Impounding of Vehicles**

(a) No person shall take possession of vehicle removed or impounded under this by-law, until all costs and charges for removal, care and storage of such vehicle have been paid.

We request that you respect this By-Law and park overnight in the parking lot on River Road. Parking of large vehicles is not permitted overnight on any streets or in any parking lots maintained by the village. Daytime street parking for large vehicles is only allowed for short periods of time for business purposes only. Thank you for your co-operation.



### September 30th, 2023 - A Beautiful Day For A Walk Around The Block

This year's History Walk was the food cold. a bit shorter than those in the past, however we had a lot of information to share with those who joined in.

lot across from the Petitcodiac Baptist Church.

We begin in 1866, only six years after the first trains went through Petitcodiac, finding a Public Hall that was built with public funds raised by subscription.

This Hall, located almost where the crosswalk and stop signs are now, served as a community meeting hall and a school. The Tutor was Tobias Addy. This small school house soon became overcrowded and a second building was erected in 1869 on adjoining lands. The Tutor at this time was John Baxter and he lived in rooms above the school. Four years later, 1873 this school also became too small and a larger school was built on Academy Lane.

Years passed and homes were built on this corner including the home of Sherman and Jessie McCully(?) who was a cheese maker, his wife kept the books of the cheese factory. The home was constructed with no indoor plumbing and had a root cellar to keep

Another home on the corner was the MacPherson house that was moved to the corner of Old Post Road The walk started in the parking and Railway Avenue and eventually was used as Chumley's Eatery. This building is currently being renovated for apartments.

> The next home that was located on the corner was the home of Mrs Bessie Murree and her husband. Mrs Murree operated a Birthing Home here and many area people can relate to this address as their place of birth. After the birthing home closed she had a Senior's home there. Mr Clifford(?) Murree, who was a veteran, who served in WWII, passed away from tuberculosis.

> Next house was the Murray McCaulley home. It was the location of the office of what became the Department of Natural Resources. Mr. McCaulley was one of the first District Rangers in this area. The large barn shown behind the house was where the truck and equipment for forest fire fighting were stored until the move to the buildings on Mill Road (now the location of SPOT).

> > The McCaulley house was



renovated years later for apartments.

Thank you to Carol Plume for some of this information. Her childhood church historian for the information. home still stands on the corner. Carol one time called Tannery Road.

Both The Murree and McCaulley homes were torn down to provide parking space for the Baptist Church.

The corner opposite the parking lot is occupied by Petitcodiac Baptist Church. moved to this location August 24th, 1910. This building was torn down August 31st 2016 following a devastating oil leak. On May 6th 2018 a sod turning ceremony was held and Community the building was beyond December 23, 2018 the Ribbon Cutting ceremony took place with Mrs Jean Irving cutting the Ribbon for the new building and the Dedication Service. It was with thanks to Mrs Irving for only a few of the numerous activities her very gracious generosity that the that took place there. Church was rebuilt.





or "bad" cholesterol, were more likely to develop atherosclerosis and other cardiovascular problems. They also found that reducing LDL cholesterol levels through diet and medication can significantly reduce the risk of heart

There are important implications of this research for the prevention and treatment of cardiovascular disease in children and young adults. By identifying and mitigating risk factors early in life, it may be possible to prevent the development of heart disease later on.

To combat childhood obesity, the recommendation is a multifaceted approach that includes healthy eating, regular exercise, avoiding exposure environmental toxins such as second-hand smoke, and behavioral interventions, with an emphasis on starting early.

But there are a few fundamental problems. One, infants and young children have no capacity to lobby for their health. They are utterly dependent contact-us@docgiff.com. Follow us on

#### 2024 Salisbury Dog Tags

\*For Residents Of Ward 3 Only (Former Village Of Salisbury Boundary)\* 2024 Salisbury Dog Tags must be purchased by the end of March to avoid paying a late fee (a \$15.00 penalty will be added to the regular registration fee for tags not bought before April 1st).

Registration fees are: \$10.00 for spayed or neutered dogs; or \$30.00 if not spayed or neutered.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of three (3) months shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against distemper and canine parvovirus and must repeat this process every two (2) years thereafter.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of four (4) months, shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against rabies and every three (3) years thereafter.

In order to buy a dog tag you must show an official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital with the breed, colour and name of dog showing on receipt, as well as the veterinarian hospital tag number.






#### Christmas Tree Disposal
