


Salisbury Lion's Club and Students form Partnership





It was suggested by one of the group of walkers that the names be researched and have a listing posted near the cemetery. This would provide invaluable assistance to anyone researching their ancestry.

At this point we turned the corner and continued our walk down First Street. The first house on the corner, now a private home, was once the Parsonage for the Baptist Church. Built in

the late 1880's, circa 1878-1890, by Mr and Mrs Andrew Pugsley and donated to the Baptist church for that use.

The house was sold by the Baptist Church when a new Parsonage was constructed.

As we continued along First Street, we passed the area of the former Andy MacPherson's Printing shop. Many of us have fond and interesting memories of this shop and its owner.

He started the shop about 1970. He had graduated in 1966 from Petitcodiac Regional High School and then took a course in Saint John at the Vocational School.

Andy enjoyed talking about his antique printing presses, most of them being vintage machines from circa 1885.

The quality of those presses could be seen in the many, many store flyers, business cards, wedding invitations and birth announcements, just to name a few of the items he printed.

Andy became interested in printing presses and printing at the age of 13 when he bought his first press to print business cards. He also did work restitching vintage and first edition books with a stitcher he repaired, using parts from a bicycle.

Andy MacPherson was known as a craftsman who preserved not only the antique printing presses but the knowledge of how to repair them and use them and the knowledge and skills to make a living, while providing a much needed service.

He is quoted in a newspaper interview that "teaching himself how to operate and repair the vintage machines

was "the fun of it".

We continued to the end of First street noting that off to our left along the current railway tracks there was located a small sawmill, run by a steam boiler, and a planing mill that closed approx. 1938.

Also located in the same area were an electrical station, the first one N.B.E. Power Station in the village, and a box factory.

At the next stop we were met by Doug Rogers, his son Darrell and grandson Brinley. Doug was very helpful with the history of the J. P. Waterbury and Sons machine shop built in 1912.

The Machine Shop was built with the intention of repairing train engines, but when the government bought the Havelock Railway all the repair work was done in Moncton.

The shop was used for other repair work. The start of WWII meant that shops such as this were required for the manufacture of parts and equipment for the War effort. Being designated as a War Plant, some of the items manufactured there were, Torpedo parts: servo motors for aerial torpedoes to regulate how far below the surface of the water a torpedo would go before levelling off to strike an enemy vessel; gun parts, landing apparatus, and barge pumps of all kinds to name a few.

During the war years there were Air Raid Patrol Wardens whose job it was to protect plants like this from possible sabotage.

Following the end of the war the plant stayed open and manufactured electrical pumps and did other repair work as needed.

Doug Rogers, J.P. Waterbury's grandson still maintains the building and makes beautiful wooden bowls. Thank you Doug and family for your assistance and showing us a few of your treasures. At the end of our visit at this location Doug's grandson Brinley even sounded an "airaid" warning for us. Well done. Next month we complete our walk around the block.

The first clinic was mid-January, with the subsequent two test clinics to be held in February and March. The goal is to help bridge the gap in rural health. Several WI ladies stopped by to support the clinic which helped to make it a success. The clinic was attended by over 40 individuals as well as dignitaries Hon. Rob Moore (MLA Fundy-Albert), Hon. Tammy Scott-Wallace (MLA Sussex-Fundy-St. Martins), Hon. Sherry Wilson (Minister responsible for Women's Equality, and for Addictions and Mental Health), and Mayor Peter Saunders (Community of Three Rivers). We are pleased that these individuals take such an interest in our small community.

You might ask yourself, "What has this to do with the women's institute?" Good question but the answer from the WI perspective should be obvious. Mary Stewart advocated that we "...put into action our better impulses, straightforward and unafraid." Well, one of our WI members chose to do exactly that. The result is the clinic that is a benefit to this rural community. If we don't pull together as community, helping and supporting one another, then we will slow die. No, I don't mean a physical death. This can mean an emotional death, a societal death, or a community death. 

Everyone who attended the clinic gave a satisfaction score of 8 or above on a scale of 1 - 10 (10 being excellent). We received great comments as to how to improve the clinic and what worked best. We wish to thank all of the participants who attended, and we look forward to serving the community going forward. The data provided by the participants and the community will help Horizon Health get a better understanding of the healthcare issues in our rural communities.

We are encouraging those who attend the clinics to return to have their health assessed to be informed of any changes. Moreover, return visits will continue to inform Horizon Health that gaps in rural healthcare persist and this community is striving to find ways to bridge the gap. Remember, this is a free service that we hope will be able to continue for the Community of Three Rivers.

Finally, we were pleased to have the support of key policy makers who are very interested in our community. Individuals who

stopped by the January clinic were Hon. Rob Moore, Hon. Tammy Scott-Wallace, Hon. Sherry Wilson, and Mayor Peter Saunders. 





Surprising Revelation

If you have ever done much body work on a car, you have probably realized a deep truth. The closer you get to perfection, the more the flaws show up. I used to dabble in body work many years ago and never really developed any real skill, but I did notice this truth. You could make a car look reasonably good without too much effort. The paint may not shine much, and it might have lots of "orange peel", but the car was one colour and it looked ok going down the street. But, as you spent more time working out the kinks, prepping the surface better, learning how to spray better, having a cleaner spray booth and so on, the finished product seemed to be disappointing, because now the paint finish was smooth and glossy and the body panels nice and straight, but the specks of dust or the occasional "Fisheye" stood out as imperfections. It was a much better job than what you did at first, but...not perfect, but it did show growth.

I have the same experience in my own Christian walk. Early in my life, when I looked at the more mature Christians, I figured they had obtained a level of "Goodness" and that life was smooth for them. But my experience has been more like my experience with bodywork. The closer I get to God and see His perfections, the more my own flaws and imperfections stand out (And there are lots of them). The good news is that it teaches me that I will never reach a level where I do not need God's Grace in my life. It has taught me that I need it more, the closer I get to Him.

And that is by design. God doesn't want us to grow close to Him so that we don't need Him anymore. That doesn't even make sense. He wants us to get closer and closer to Him so that we realize the truth, that we are totally dependent on Him. There is no room for pride, only worship. No room for separation, only closeness. No room for fear, only trust, because we have grown to know He can be trusted.

So, if you are disappointed or walk and the struggles it brings, remember that the Master Craftsman is sanding and polishing you bit by bit, and there will be a time when you will be a finished product, without blemish, but that will be when you see Him face to face, in complete joy and satisfaction.

Easter Food

Today's article is about Easter Food. The food we eat at Easter is often symbolic, here's what some of these items represent: cooked ham is a sign of good luck and abundance; carrots are the favourite food of the Easter Bunny; and chocolate eggs mean new life, rebirth, fertility, and the brightness of Spring.

In the United Kingdom a traditional Easter food is Hot Cross Buns. Traditional hot cross buns were baked with juicy raisins and eaten on Good Friday. You'll now find various flavors, including those studded with chocolate or salted caramel or packed with berries, for sale all year around.

Hot cross buns are so-called due to the cross marked on the top to represent the crucifixion of Christ. Hanging hot cross buns in your kitchen was also said to ward off evil spirits and prevent kitchen fires. It's said that hot cross buns date back to the 12th century, when a monk baked them on Good Friday as a celebratory feast for the upcoming Easter weekend. They were first mentioned in writing in a 16th century text, which reads: "Good Friday comes this month, the old woman runs, with one or two a penny hot cross buns."

Others claim the buns have pagan roots. In Ancient Egypt, small bread rolls were marked with crosses in celebration of the Gods, with similar breads seen in Ancient Greece and Rome. We may never truly know the origins of the hot cross bun, but the fact remains that they're a delicious treat, particularly split, toasted, and slathered with a generous helping of salted butter. You could even give these buns as a gift to friends, as this is said to strengthen your friendship.

Moving on to Eastern Europe, Pasca is a traditional sweet Romanian Easter bread. In Romania, the bread is filled with a sweetened cheesecake continued the custom at Easter.

mix made with branza de vaci (cow's cheese) with rum and raisins, but blended cottage cheese can be used as a substitute. Bread of the same name but without the filling — is also eaten in Ukraine over Easter.

Pasca was traditionally the first food consumed for Easter breakfast, marking the end of the 40 days of Lent. Today, it is baked and enjoyed throughout Romanian Easter celebrations.

The golden color of Pasca represents the sun, the begining of life, and there are various ancient traditions and superstitions associated with the baking of the bread. It's said that if the bread breaks when you take it out of the oven, or if it doesn't rise, the household will see a death that year. A less morbid belief states that nobody should taste the bread before it's blessed at the Easter Sunday church service, even those responsible for preparing it.

Here in North America Roast Ham is a traditional Easter dish, often glazed with honey, maple syrup, or brown sugar, and sometimes studded with cloves. Many people choose to serve their ham with grilled pineapple slices for a delicious sweet and savory take on this Easter tradition. The day might start with painted eggs, chocolate bunnies, and a trip to church, but the centerpiece of many Easter Sunday meals is the ham. In addition to the many questions you may have about Easter traditions, have you ever stopped to wonder why Americans eat ham on Easter when the majority of the world eats lamb?

The answer isn't as complicated as you might think. Simply put, ham is eaten on Easter because it's practical and in season. Historically, lamb was the main course for Easter dinner and it still is in many parts of the world. It's a tradition that's about 3,000 years old that stems from the Jewish holiday Passover, which celebrates Israelites being liberated, and their exodus from Egypt. The sacrificial lamb has always been an integral part of Passover, from a shank bone on the seder plate to a roast on the dinner table. When some converted to Christianity, they

This custom originally continued to wane, fewer legs of lamb became available for Easter.

Ham became a great alternative to lamb because farmers could preserve the meat during winter months by curing it and, by the time spring arrived, it was ready to eat.

Ham also became a practical in the United States because wool was a alternative for lamb because it was popular fabric during World War II, but more affordable and came in a larger as soon as the demand for wool began serving size. In 1950, a leg of lamb cost around 74 cents, while a whole ham was available for about 62 cents. Not to mention there are many ways that you can prepare a ham - it goes great with brown sugar, maple syrup, and pineapples. Not many foods can pull that off. HAPPY EASTER!

Salisbury: A Crossroads Town

The old Village is, of course, at the head of tide on the Petitcodiac River. As we know, the River drains into the Bay of Fundy, which has the highest tides in the world, so this is no small thing. The Coverdale River (referred to locally as Little River) and the Pollett River (just a bit upstream) join the Petitcodiac.

In times before roads existed, the rivers were how people travelled. The thing about travelling on a river is that you have to deal with going against the flow when going upstream. But with the tide coming twice-a-day to help carry you, you could come upriver with much less effort if you were skilled enough in your boat. The same goes for travelling down the river with the tides, too. There even were ships built to take advantage of the tides. This was the way the earliest

I like to think of Salisbury as a native settlers travelled - in birch bark canoes, no less. The Petitcodiac River was also used to travel by canoe to both Saint John and Fredericton areas by portaging. Quite a skill to ride up on the Tidal Bore!

> The Acadians, the Yorkshiremen, and the United Empire Loyalists who came later all arrived by boat, along with all the goods and supplies that made it here along with them.


> When people started travelling on land, they naturally followed the rivers as that was where they had settled. These early roads started out as trails until, eventually, they had to cross the river. The tides made it hard to build and keep a bridge further downstream when it got pounded twice a day by the fast-moving waves of water. So, they built one here and Salisbury was on its way to being a true crossroads. We even had an early place of accommodation, Jaques Tavern, situated to be visible from the river and the road.

Among the roads that evolved on the north side of the river were the Westmorland Great Road - or Post Road - linking Saint John to Nova Scotia (now known as Route 106/Main Street), and the Fredericton Road (Route 112). On the south side of the river, what became the Coverdale Road forked in two directions:

To the right, the road (now known as the Salisbury Back Road) went to the settlements on the Pollett River. To the left, the road continued down and across the Coverdale River and forked again:

To the left of this, it continued down the Petitcodiac. To the right, it (cont. on pg 19)

To the right, it went back across the River (now Route 895) and went onto Little River and Thriftyville (now Synton. Then, that road went straight through to Nixon, Turtle Creek, Dawson, and Hillsborough. On a map, you can see how this is quite a direct way from Salisbury to Hillsborough and is much straighter than following the Petitcodiac all the way around the bend.

The Westmorland Road (now known as Main Street/Route 106) became travelable enough by horse drawn carriage that a stagecoach service linking Saint John to Nova Scotia began about 1836. This spelled the closing of Jagues Tavern, as the stagecoach would stop overnight in Petitcodiac instead, before moving on to Amherst the next day.

In 1860, the arrival of the European and North American Railway through the Village furthered the transportation within Salisbury. The railway connected Saint John and Shediac/Pointe-du-Chene, mainly to avoid sailing all the way around Nova Scotia to send goods via ship to Upper and Lower Canada. Soon after, with the flying, too, other than being on a flight

went up the Coverdale River (now the for building rail lines, these routes increased quickly. Such was the case here in 1876 when the tracks were laid for the Albert line to Hillsborough/Albert.

It's interesting to note that Parkindale). To the left, it continued to the rail line ran roughly parallel to the road to Hillsborough. As rail lines were constructed, passenger service quickly became the 'way' to travel, and a mixture of freight and passengers for a time made these railways profitable enough to keep them operating. This was largely before cars became very common, and for some time, passenger trains were used extensively.

My great, great Aunt 'Bell Wilmot would take the 'coach' to Saint John to collect land rents and return the next day. Many people, including me, remember the Dayliner connecting to Moncton and Saint John, and I've been told people in Boundary Creek and Allison referred to it as the 'Grey Ghost', because those Budd Cars were much quieter than the regular trains. Salisbury is still a railway town with the rumble and whistles announcing their passing. If you live here long enough, you won't even notice each one.
