If you're interested in Motorsports, or just gettting involved the community come on out to one of our monthly meetings. They are always the first Tuesday of the month, we start



#### Giving back to the Community







#### Spring from the Blahs



# Walk Around the Block - Part 4

property, corner of Old Post Road and

Lower Main Street was a tannery. It was

run by Ralph Perry and William Colpitts

Last month we reached (lower) Main Street, where in 1913 a large foundry had been built by Messrs. J.P. Waterbury and Sons.

Our next stop was at the site of the former Burlington Hotel. The Hotel was first built as a private home in 1881 by Mr James Killam. After he passed away in 1885 the home went to his brother in law David Jonah who ran the Hotel under the name Temperance House. He operated it until 1902 when it was sold to Mr George W. McAnn. The name was changed to the Burlington Hotel.

Following McAnn, proprietors were Mr. T. Graves, Mr Charles Keith and Mr. Bev Coates. Mr P.B. Reynolds purchased the hotel in 1925 and leased it to his son Hurd who then operated it for several years. During those years the Hotel was advertised as "On The American Plan" \$3.00 per day, Free Garage Service. The Hotel catered to the commercial and tourist trade, and the telephone number was "58"

In 1955 Lloyd Pollock bought the Hotel and ran it until approximately 1966. The Hotel had a reputation as a Top Rate Hotel and hosted celebrities, politicians and businessmen.

The Hotel was torn down in 2017, after being sold to M. Ramsey. The corner lot stayed vacant for several years and is currently undergoing a face lift as a future park to be known as Burlington Park.



in 1868. Mr Colpitts left the business and it was sold to William Fowler and Mr Wesley McLeod who would sell his share of the business to G. Fred Fowler and Ed Fowler. A few years later the business

was again sold, this time to Wesley Lowery who operated the business until 1909 when it closed.

The tannery was located in the Village due to the abundance of oak trees. It was the inner bark from these trees that was harvested by peeling the outer layers of bark away and scraping the inner bark which was crushed or chopped and soaked with water to make a "bark tea".

Hides were first fleshed; flesh removed, and scraped, then soaked in the tea. Heavier or thicker hides were soaked in this mixture for nine to twelve months, resulting in a very soft, waterproof leather. Thinner hides were soaked for three months, once the colour of the "tea" was soaked through, the hides were then oiled and worked with tallow or lard to make a sturdy, soft leather. For tougher leather, used for harnesses or belts for machinery the hides were treated with animal brains and water.

After the tannery closed the building was used as a barn and delivery horse stable.

The next use for the building was as a harness makers shop, operated by Teddy Drysdale. When this business closed the property owned by E.C. Rice, a local lawyer, was sold to W.H. Pollock.

1946 saw the next construction start on the site of the former tannery. Lloyd Pollock and his father

Directly opposite the hotel H.Pollock were the inspiration for the construction of a movie theatre and auditorium, with a capacity of 350 seats

> In the spring of 1946 A. Stewart Construction of Sussex broke ground for the building. Local men Parker W. Reynolds, Lloyd Pollock, and Albridge Henry were the carpenters. Building supplies came from H.A. Fawcett and son.

> The projector operators had to be licensed, with the first projectionist being Don McIvor. Lloyd and his son Bill received their licences as well.

> The building contained a full basement in order to pass fire regulations which was equipped with a cement floor.

> With World War II over business soon boomed. Cost of a movie at the time of opening was 39 cents, with 9 of those cents being an amusement tax. Movies played Monday to Saturday, no movies on Sundays.

> Matinees for children cost ten cents. 25 cents bought a seat, a bottle of pop and a bag of chips. Mrs Pollock was often seen helping the children

with hats, mitts, scarves, coats and boots. She often ran the ticket booth.

Besides movies there were amateur nights before а movie played. lot of famous Α people played there, including the country singer Hank Snow. Santa was a Christmas time visitor as well. In May of

1949. Eva Pollock opened a beauty salon in a ground floor section of the building.

1953 saw the installation of a bowling allev under the theatre. It was noted that the pin setters (young men or boys, nothing automated at that time) were of two kinds. The quick kind or the black and blue kind.

In the mid 1950s the advent of Television caused a decline in audience numbers. The theatre licence was sold in 1955 to a Nova Scotia company.

The fate of the theatre and the building will continue in next months News and Views.

#### April 8th - Solar Eclipse

What is a total solar eclipse? It's when the moon completely covers the sun. This is a breathtaking phenomenon and on the afternoon of April 8th the upper part of Butternut Valley is in the path of total eclipse! (Canaan, Cherryvale, Youngs Cove etc) - please check online for interactive maps/times. If you are not directly in the path, don't worry, you'll still see a pretty cool sight, with just the faintest sliver of the sun exposed. Grab a lawn chair and find somewhere to watch (or just view from your back yard) - you won't regret it!

What do I need? Staring at the sun without protection will cause temporary or permanent damage to your eyes. In order to watch the eclipse safely, you need ISO certified eclipse glasses. Don't worry, we have you covered! Please check our facebook page to see where Butternut Valley residents can pick up their glasses! Quantities are limited.

Warning: ensure glasses are not damaged or scratched before use, staring at the sun without protection may cause temporary or permanent damage to eyes, always supervise children using the glasses, know when it is safe to remove eclipse glasses - never remove them when looking directly at the sun, put the eclipse glasses over normal eye glasses (not under), know how to properly clean and care for the eclipse glasses

When you're done with your glasses, don't throw them out, because we are in for a partial eclipse in March of 2025!



#### Dogs Must Be Kept On Leashes In Public

A reminder to those with dogs that Highland Park and the Wetland Trail in Salisbury are NOT "dog parks;" that is, dogs MUST be kept on leashes as is the rule for all public spaces in the former village. Allowing your dog to run loose is a violation of By-law No. 41 (Animal Control By-law). The Town of Salisbury, and especially the wildlife, thank you for your understanding with regards to this. ...Meantime, a reminder to residents of Ward 3 (former Village limits) who own dogs to please purchase your dog tags! As of April 1st, a \$15 late fee is in effect. Registration fees are:

For spayed or neutered dogs \$10 + \$15 late fee = \$25 For dogs not spayed/neutered \$30 + \$15 late fee = \$45 In order to buy a dog tag you must show an official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital proving your dog's vaccinations (eg. rabies) are up to date. Dog Tags can be purchased at the Municipal Office located at 56 Douglas Street.

#### **Overdue Sewer Accounts**

Salisbury By-Law No. 45 (the Former Village of Salisbury By-Law, which remains in effect for Ward 3 residents), Relating to the Collection of User-Charges for the Sanitary Sewerage System, allows for the placement of court judgments (liens) and/or the disconnection of services on overdue accounts. Arrangements for payment plans with respect to delinquent accounts must be made. The complete by-law can be read at www.salisburvnb.ca.

Since March 2nd, interest has been applied to any overdue Salisbury sewer accounts (again, this is for the municipal sewer system in the former village). Interest is 2% per month and is applied at the beginning of each month to all overdue accounts dating back to the January billing date. The 2024 sewer rate is \$400.00 per unit.

#### Spring Clean-Up Time!

During the year there are two or three, depending on in which Ward of Salisbury you live, special bulk solid waste collections. These special roadside pick-ups are for items that would not normally be collected with regular household waste each week, such as: appliances, furniture, lumber and yard waste (tied in 4' lengths), tires (limit of two per household) and other large items. (NOTE: Hazardous materials including chemicals, batteries, propane tanks, paint etc. are not to be put out for any form of roadside collection and must instead be taken to the Mobile Eco Depot when it comes to the community.)

#### Hazardous Waste Drop-Off / Mobile Eco Depot

Southeast Eco360's Mobile Eco Depot will be in Moncton and Riverview this month. They will be at Moncton Coliseum (377 Killam Drive) on Wednesday, April 3rd and Thursday, April 4th from noon-8:00pm both days. Two weeks later, they will be set up at Riverview's Operations Center (300 Robertson Street) on Wednesday, April 17th and Thursday, April 18th (same hours). Mobile Eco Depot's next visit to Salisbury will be on May 8th-9th. For more information on this service, which travels to a different community each week to operate as a drop-off location for hazardous waste and bulk solid waste items, visit them online at www.eco360.ca.

#### Ensure Your Weekly Garbage Is Accessible

Weekly collection of garbage works best when we as homeowners ensure that the collector, who is often working alone on the garbage truck, can easily and safely access the garbage bags that we place roadside. If the bags are in a receptacle or bin, please ensure that the correct bags are in there. The growing popularity of permanent-style bins at the ends of driveways has resulted in a few concerns:

1) Some residents are treating these bins as personal dumpsters by putting all bags in them each week, regardless of colour. Please ensure that the bags to be collected that particular week are on top and are easily accessible. It is not the collector's job to sort through your bin.

2) Ensure that these bins do not fall into disrepair. There have been cases of broken boards and exposed nails, which are a safety hazard for the collector.

3) Please keep the bins clean, as they can attract pests. Rats nibbling on bin contents have been reported.

Any fires must be in approved appliances only. Salisbury Fire Rescue reserves the right to order any fires that are not in compliance with Salisbury's Fire By-Law (By-Law No. 48) to be extinguished, and are authorized to issue tickets as they may deem necessary to enforce this By-Law. By-Law No. 48 can be read in its entirety at www.salisburynb. ca/municipal-office/by-laws. This Fire By-Law also follows the direction of Provincial burning advisories/bans.


