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

WINTER OVERNIGHT STREET PARKING BAN

During the winter months from November 1st through to April 1st, The Community of Three Rivers, Ward 2 (Petitcodiac) has a By-Law in place that does not allow parking on any of our streets between the hours of midnight to 7 am due to snow clearing operations. This allows our works department crew to complete the task of snow removal in a safe and timely manner.

BY-LAW NO. 40

Parking of Vehicles

 (a) In the months of November, December, January, February and March between the hours of 2400 and 0700 of any day no person shall park or leave a vehicle unattended on any street within the Village due to snow clearing operations.
Vehicles left on Village streets will be towed away at owner's expense

Impounding of Vehicles

(b) No person shall take possession of vehicle removed or impounded under this bylaw, until all costs and charges for removal, care and storage of such vehicle have been paid.

We request that you respect this By-Law and park overnight in the parking lot on River Road. *Parking of large vehicles is not permitted overnight on any streets or in any parking lots maintained by the village. Daytime street parking for large vehicles is only allowed for short periods of time for business purposes only.* Thank you for your co-operation.

Remembrance Day

November 11th, we stop, pause and remember all those men and women who over the years have sacrificed so much, including their lives, to keep our country free.

Many are remembered by their family members and friends.

Many are remembered by total strangers who want to show the Respect they deserve for their sacrifices.

Recently the picture and some items of a young man who lost his life in World War One were brought into the Three Rivers Community (war) Museum.

After reading the information that was brought in, Museum staff decided to try to get more information on this person. Why this person you might ask?

The young man, John May, was killed in action only 23 days before the war ended. On October 17th, 1918 just 23 Days before the Armistice was signed November 11th 1918. We looked at it and thought, 23 short days. Who was this man and what was his story?

We knew he was a member of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment but we wanted more information.

We found that he was from Pilleys Island, Twillingate District.

He turned 18 on October 5th of 1917.

He left his home and joined up on October 31st, 1917

He stated at the time he had his Fathers approximately 352 days. permission.

His occupation at that time was Fisherman, his father Frederick May was a blacksmith.

His religion was listed as Salvation Army

He was 5 feet, 4 inches tall, (162.6 cm)

Shortly after his enlisting a letter was sent by his mother, November 2, 1917, to protest her son's enlistment. However since he was of age, 18, there wasn't anything that could be done.

John May left Newfoundland, his home, December 11th, 1917 on board the S.S Florizel. He was posted with the 1st Battalion of the Newfoundland Regiment.





On October 17th, 1918 John May, aged 19, soldier, son, brother and fisherman was killed in action. He is buried at Terlincthun British Cemetery, 1 mile from Boulogne France.

The Memorial plaque, known as a Dead Man's Penny was sent to his father September 27th 1921.

His final wages of 39.89 were forwarded to his family September 5th 1919. The money paid to John May averages out to .11 cents per day.

John May served as a soldier 23 days from peace.

Remember this man, and all those who like him gave everything for his Country and Freedom.

Always Remember them, Respect their sacrifice, not just on Remembrance Day.



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

PICKLED BEETS

This takes 8 cups of ready beets. Clean and wash beets. Cook them until tender, size will determine how long it takes to cook until tender. Drain and put cold water on them, 2 or 3 times. The skin will slip off very easy when you rub them with your hands. Cut off any bad marks. If beets are small leave them whole, if larger cut into pieces. Make a syrup: 4 cups white vinegar 3 cups white sugar 1 teaspoon whole cloves or 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves Bring to boil and add ready beets.

Simmer 15 minutes. Put in steril bottles and seal.

Meantime, the November Salisbury 250 theme will be Veterans.








Salisbury 250 Focused on Churches and Cemeteries in October

Arriving from Yorkshire, many of the 💹 first permanent settlers of Salisbury were members of the Church of England; though, the first protestant church in the area was Baptist. Following shortly thereafter. United. Anglican, and Roman Catholic churches were erected within the Village as well. The first Baptist Church was a log cabin built about 1800. Due to its early presence, it is believed that many of the Yorkshires adopted this faith, as the Anglican Church wasn't constructed in Salisbury until 1887.



The establishment of the Baptist Church is largely due to Rev. Joseph Crandall. To read more on him and his impact in Salisbury, visit our Salisbury 250 Banner Program webpage here: https://salisburynb.ca/salisbury-250-banner-program/. Pictured here is the church choir in front of the new church hall that was built in 1900, taken around 1910. R.A. Brown (also listed in the banner program) was the choir director and can be seen in the front row holding a book. The United Church in Salisbury was first constructed in 1849 and was originally located where the Salisbury Pharmacy is today. The Roman Catholic Church was constructed in Salisbury either before or during the 1850s. The name, St. Jude's, was chosen as it was originally thought hopeless to even consider having a Catholic Church in Salisbury, leading to naming the church after the patron Saint of Hopeless Causes, the Blessed Saint Jude. There are also many cemeteries in the area; though, it is unknown which is the oldest. According to George Taylor's History of Salisbury book, there are three on the Salisbury Back Road, all believed to be in use in the early 1800s and probably before. These include the Pioneer Cemetery, the Burnt Hill Cemetery, and a private family burial ground. Other private burial grounds in Salisbury include the Wright family cemetery (on the Salisbury Road) and the Parkin family cemetery (off Parkin St.). Today, there are almost over a dozen churches in the area, along with several cemeteries.


Wellness Expo Returns to Salisbury!

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Trail Counter Data for Highland Park and Wetland Trail

The Town of Salisbury has partnered with the Fundy Biosphere Region to collect data using trail counters at Highland Park and Wetland Trail throughout July and August. This helps us understand how our beautiful outdoor spaces are being used and ensures we continue to provide the best experience for all visitors.

Here are some takeaways from the trail counter data:

- Average daily trail use was 92 people
- The park was most used at 7:00 PM
- The busiest days of the week were Saturdays, Sundays, and Mondays
- The busiest day was July 1 (Canada Day) at 446 counts
- Nearly 6,000 users between July 1 and August 31

Trees Planted Through Partnership with Tree Canada


