Prep Time: 25 min. | Total Time: 1 h. 40 m. | Serves: 12

This exclusive recipe is a modern take on a classic Canadian dessert from the Prairies. If you know of Flapper Pie, it's more than likely because you have a personal connection to the Prairies. We guarantee this modern take on the Local Legendary dish is (almost) as good as grandma's.

Directions

- 1. For the crust: With the rack in the middle position, preheat the oven to 180°C (350°F).
- 2. Butter a small 13 x 9-inch (33 x 23 cm) baking sheet and line with a strip of parchment paper, letting it hang over two sides.
- 3. In a bowl, combine the graham crumbs, butter and honey Press evenly along the bottom of the baking sheet. Bake for 10 minutes or until golden. Let cool.
- 4. For the pastry cream: Meanwhile, in a pot off the heat, whisk together the sugar, cornstarch and flour. Add the egg yolks and mix well. Stir in the milk and vanilla. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring constantly and scraping the bottom and sides of the pot.
- 5. Strain the pastry cream through a sieve set over a bowl to remove any lumps. Spread over the cooled crust. Cover with plastic wrap directly on the surface of the cream. Let cool at room temperature while you prepare the meringue.
- For the meringue: In another bowl, whisk the egg whites and cream of tartar with an electric mixer until soft peaks form.

 Gradually add the sugar while whisking constantly until firm peaks form.
- Spread the meringue over the cooled pie. Using a small kitchen torch, brown the surface of the meringue. Refrigerate for 1 hour before serving. Cut into squares.



That reminded me of an article I read recently titled "The Anti-Social Century" by Derek Thompson, which said since the nineteen seventies we have become increasingly isolated, it went on to detail example after example of ways technology is making us more alone.

That's not a fresh take though. The interesting part was that very recently (like within the last five years or so), even as people have been reporting they spend more time in their homes by themselves they are feeling less lonely. Depression, hopelessness, and anxiety unsurprisingly were all on the rise, but loneliness itself shockingly wasn't.

The point of the article was, that in a similar way that junk food will fill you with calories, but also leave you craving more, our technology is providing us with para-social relationships where we feel like we're hanging out with friends and meeting our social needs, but actually we're not getting what we need out of being with other people.

Actually, at this point I better get

engage in probably too much for my own good, keep an eye out for ones around you. It's not just "kids these days" who are always on their screens, if you always have the CBC radio playing in the background, or there's that friend you call and you always hear the TV chattering, it might just be a sign of masked loneliness. Our little distractions are pain killers for loneliness, and like taking a pain killing drug, but not actually dealing with an injury, we're just making it worse. The more isolated we are the easier it feels to isolate ourselves, we get out of practice, we feel like we're awkward and/or don't need other people.

So rather than threatening you all with the bait line I was going to start the article with: "due to lack of interest there will be no summer EEA events" I'm going to take a gentler approach and ask that even if you don't really feel lonely, come out to an EEA event.

In fact a great way to practice getting out is to help at one of our events. I find it hard to show up and just "visit" with people, but put a spatula in my hand and plant me behind a BBQ, somehow I can be an outright social butterfly, and thank goodness there's no shortage of tasks.

Are you getting the 10% rebate on your Electricity Bills? Since January 2025, eligible residents are receiving a 10% rebate on their monthly electricity bills, which covers the provincial portion of the Harmonized Sales Tax (HST). This initiative aims to alleviate rising living costs. The rebate applies directly to electricity consumption (kilowatt-hours) for residential customers of NB Power. It appears automatically on bills as "GNB 10% Rebate." You do not need to apply.

Eligibility is limited to residential customers who directly pay HST on their electricity. Those whose electricity is included in rent or who

ineligible. With 400,000 eligible households, the Anagance government intends to address the significant portion of home energy use represented by electricity

The average annual savings is estimated at \$216 per customer. Those on equalized billing will see the rebate applied per billing cycle and may need to adjust their payments. The government has allocated \$32 million for the current fiscal year, with a planned permanent annual investment of \$92.6 million starting in 2025-2026.





This is an exciting time of the year.



Our next stop was in front of the MacPherson and Stewart building. Memories of running in to the store, looking for that hard to find item, or one of a kind replacement part were shared.


The building, built on the site of a former livery stable and shoe repair shop, was constructed in 1947-1948. Built by Walter MacPherson, the materials came from the former military barracks buildings from the World War Two training camps in Sussex. The store was located on the main floor with four apartments in the upper two stories.

The store was operated by Walter MacPherson, Bronston MacPherson, and Charlie Stewart. Following their retirement the store and building were operated by Bob Babcock.

A fire on July 20th, 2014, which started in a car parked behind the building meant the apartments were no longer habitable.

The next building our group stopped at was the former Masonic Lodge # 37. This building was constructed in 1956.

The history of the organization goes back to 1902, organized by Mr W.A.D. Stevens in the village, meetings were



After trading some great stories and held in various homes, then at the memories about the activities many in Burlington Hotel. Later until the new building was completed meetings were held upstairs in the William Blakeney Shoe Store.

> Numerous business owners, local doctors, lawyers, and others became members and Masters of the Masons. The first Mason was Rev. Joseph Pascoe.

> Located in the building as well was the Regina Chapter #39 of the Eastern Star, started September 18, 1953. Each year the Eastern Star gave a scholarship to a local graduate.

Public Opinion

There is no doubt that rising prices are having a detrimental effect on our quality of life. And while this is widely reported on and discussed, there is one other problem that does not seem to receive quite the same attention. OUR GOVERNMENT.

And while New Brunswickers just had a short period of tax break, I could point out that those who benefited the most from that break were the wealthy and the well off. Those who struggle to afford even the most basic of necessities did not benefit from a system that forced them to spend money that they don't have. What happened to the original plan to give everyone a lump sum cheque, a plan that would have given the marginalized some real money in their hands? Need I remind that the outrageous New Brunswick 15% HST is one of the highest in Canada in one of its poorest provinces?

Recently we got new SMART (haha) meters and all of a sudden our electrical bills are up by \$100 to \$200 a month.

Oh but that's not all. Then we have the real bee in my bonnet which is the ever increasing government revenue from yearly property reassessments which can only be characterized as a complete rip-off. Where do these artificial values come from and how are they fair or accurate in a real estate market that rises and falls a couple times yearly? The assessment of my personal home for example has more than doubled in the last two years so I'm now paying \$2000 when it was \$900. How do we know if the re-assessments are being done by someone who is honest and ethical or by someone who gets a bigger bonus the higher the value?

A 50% yearly increase is financially devastating to both young families and seniors alike who are fighting to keep their heads above water. If the government had any sense of fairness and compassion they would adopt a new and more affordable level of taxation for those who really need it.

My suggestion is a reduced system for citizens owning one home valued under \$400 or \$500 000 for example, to replace the current reassessment with one based on the cost of living. That would feature yearly assessments rising only by the rate of inflation at about 2 to maybe 3 per cent yearly. Considering that wages and pensions only go up yearly by about that same amount, this to me is far more fair than the current 50%

Homes valued at over at the maximum \$400 - \$500 000 do not qualify for this reduced system and would continue to be re-assessed yearly as per the current system. This to me is a far more fair, reasonable and affordable system for citizens with lower value housing and would be welcome relief to their financial burden and a tangible tax break for those who really need it.






