

Public Safety Day Event to Be Held May 31, 2025 at the Petitcodiac Arena

[Three Rivers] - The Community of Three Rivers will host a Public Safety Day event on Saturday, May 31, from 10:00am to 3:00pm at the Petitcodiac Arena, located at 43 Corey Avenue in Petitcodiac.

Modelled after the popular "Touch-a-Truck" event, Public Safety Day will bring together representatives from local fire and police departments, the Red Cross, Ambulance NB, Tri-County Ground Search and Rescue, the NBSPCA, Municipal Enforcement, Provincial Justice and Public Safety, and the Southeast Regional Service Commission.

"Public safety affects everyone," said Mayor Peter Saunders. "Following the devastating fire last year at Burgess Transport, the Municipality felt it was a good time to bring together our service providers for an event focused on public

"We're working on an Emergency Measures Plan for the Municipality, which we'll be sharing with residents later this year," the mayor added. "Being prepared for emergencies is everyone's responsibility, so hosting a family-friendly event like this just makes good sense."

"We invite residents from Elgin, Salisbury, Petitcodiac, and surrounding areas to come out to meet and thank our first responders," Saunders said. "It should be a fun time for all!"



Last month I talked about that article "The Antisocial Century" by Derek Thompson, and about how most of us are not only lonelier than we are willing to admit, but also probably more lonely than we even realize. I left you off by letting you know that the EEA is a great place to get involved, and that volunteering is a great low-stakes way to practice your socializing while getting the external reward of people telling you how amazing you are for helping the community so much. So hopefully I have you convinced you're all set to come and get involved with the EEA, but what can you do to actually help?

Well, the first thing you can do is to become a member. Membership in the EEA is a great way to support us financially and stay involved through our monthly email newsletter. Membership for a whole year is just \$10 for an individual or 20 per family, and it also entitles you to borrow our kayaks, fat bikes, and snowshoes (which is seriously a ridiculously good deal). Or if you're more into awesome stickers you can support the work on our trail system by purchasing a trail pass for \$30.

Another thing you can do is get involved with our summer activities. The tentative plan is to host five nights of community family-friendly fun. These nights will kick off with a guided outdoor activity, either a hike, bike ride, or kayak trip, for those not interested in that though (or once you come back) you can come to the park for a BBQ provided by the EEA, and a social evening event

(we're thinking campfire, movie night, or live music if we can get it). If you have a band, or other type of entertainment, if you'd like to lead a trip, BBQ a hot dog, or if you'd just like to participate send us a message and come on out.

Another project we are really concerned about getting help next winter is our ice rink. This project is a lot of work, some years it's a really satisfying thing to help with, when the weather is just right and people are out skating all the time, other years it's the same amount of work and the weather just doesn't cooperate and we can't open the rink. At a recent meeting one of volunteers said he wouldn't be able to continue to take a leadership on the rink project without a new set of knees, so if you'd like to get involved with this and can do a bit of physical work it's a great time to learn the role from an expert

If you can't (or aren't ready yet) to do any of that another great way you can help us is by drinking for the EEA! If you drop off your recyclables in the tent at our collection spot on River Road in Elgin Every can of pop you polish off can go towards making our park an even better equipped community hub and keeping the cost of EEA camp affordable for the kids in our community. At \$50 for kids who are EEA members (\$100 for nonmembers), it's our supporters who keep this camp at or below the cost of feeding a kid lunch for the week, not to mention the day-time outdoor actives in and around Elgin led by our volunteers.



In 1950 she interviewed the older community members and wrote about the early years, 1787 first settlers, of the area in the Weekly paper. A tremendous source of accurate local history. 

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



Council Highlights!

Looking for the latest news from Salisbury Town Council? The Town has begun releasing "Council Highlights" on the Town's website following Regular Council Meetings, intended to provide a snapshot at Town decisions prior to formal meeting minutes being ratified. The April 14 Regular Council Meeting was a busy one! It included awarding the first batch of capital projects for 2025 (including MacDonald Road sidewalk extension and re-surfacing, railway trestle upgrades, and heating upgrades at the Salisbury Lions Pool), the approval of four grants (including three multi-year grants), third reading for five by-laws, and the approval of a lease agreement for a licensed refreshment hub at Highland Park on a pilot basis this Summer. Residential Development Incentive Program

It's no secret: we need more housing in Salisbury. The Town is doing our part to make that happen. Following a year-long process to develop a made-in-Salisbury program, Town Council has approved a Residential Development Incentive Program. This incentive program will assist in lowering the cost of development to make housing more affordable and spur much-needed housing developments. It includes municipal contributions for items such as, depending on project eligibility:

- Pre-Application Grant for preliminary stages, such as water studies or engineering work
- Residential Incentive Grant, for a perunit amount on eligible projects
- Building & Development Fee Rebate, to refund all permit fees for projects that integrate affordable unit(s)
- Subdivision Cost-Sharing Grant to assist with costs related to municipal infrastructure



Creative Repurposing: Essential Skills Students Collaborate with Petitcodiac Boys & Girls Club
